MAY PREY ON COMMERCE

RUSSIAN VLADIVOSTOK SQUADRON SUCCEEDS IN ESCAPING INTO THE PACIFIC OCEAN—THREE FAST CRUISERS WHOSE DESTINATION IS UNKNOWN AND WHO MAY INTERCEPT THE KOREA, NOW ON THE WAY TO YOKOHAMA.

TOKIO, July 20.—The Vladivostok cruisers Rossia, Rurik and Gromobol have passed through the Tsugaru strait into the Pacific.
The Russian Vladivostok squadron in passing through the Tsugaru Strait has performed a remarkable feat and is now practically free to make a dash for vessels carrying contraband of war from the United States to Yokohama and Kobe. Vladivostok is located on the Japan Sea and in order to get out of that place to prey upon Pacific commerce or seek Port Arthur the Russian fleet would either have to pass through Tsugaru Strait or through Korea Strait. Sometimes ago Admiral Skrydloff attempted to take his vessels through Korea Strait and managed to destroy three Japanese transports, but was turned back by Vice-Admiral Kamimura's cruiser squadron when he had almost made the passage.
Tsugaru Strait is 400 miles due east of Vladivostok and about the same distance north of Yokohama. The strait is about fifty miles long, wide in the center and tapered at each end to a width of about twelve miles. At one end is the fortified city of Fukuyama and at the other Hakodate, a port from which a number of vessels have come to Honolulu with cargoes of sulphur. The Strait is so narrow there that one or two cruisers or even torpedo boats would be able to block the passage of the Russian squadron.
The Korea now en route to Yokohama from Honolulu carries a large amount of railway equipment and other goods which could be used by the Japanese for war purposes. Its departure with such a cargo was well advertised.

The Rossia, Rurik and Gromobol are very fast cruisers.
REINFORCEMENTS FOR OKU.
YUIKOW, July 20.—The reinforcements awaited by Gen. Oku are being disembarked under the protection of seven cruisers. Troops are also landing north of Port Arthur. Important events are expected within a week.
JAPANESE STILL ADVANCING.
TATCHEKIAO, July 20.—Ambuscades and skirmishes are of daily occurrence. The Japanese are moving northward toward Huiyau and Simouchen.
OYAMA'S NEW PLANS.
ST. PETERSBURG, July 20.—Experts are convinced that the Japanese have changed their plans in favor of a flanking movement on Liaoyang instead of a direct movement to Tatchekiao. The change is attributed to the arrival of Field Marshal Oyama.

JAPAN'S WONDERFUL EXPLOSIVE

DR. SHIMOSE LECTURES ON THE POWDER NAMED AFTER HIM ITS TERRIBLE POWER AND IMMUNITY FROM ACCIDENTAL EXPLOSION DESCRIBED BY THE INVENTOR—SAILOR WOUNDED IN 160 PLACES BY ONE SHELL.

The explosive used in the Japanese navy bears the name of its inventor, Dr. Shimose. The destructive power of this explosive was demonstrated during the recent naval engagements. A few days ago the inventor, Dr. Shimose, delivered a lecture in Tokyo, in which he explained the nature and use of the powder. The inventor said that, according to their use, explosives were classified under two headings, namely, those for mining and those for military purposes, the latter being again classified into those for destructive purposes. "Shimose" belonged to the latter category, and was never used for the purpose of discharging shots. The explosive used by the European powers for warlike purposes was gun cotton. But manifold inconveniences attended the use of gun cotton; for instance, when dried too much, it exploded even by slight friction.
In order to prevent this danger, it was necessary to combine it with water to the extent of 20 per cent, in which case it burned with difficulty when ignited. But when the water exceeded 20 per cent gun cotton would not explode. Again, owing to possible evaporation, the water contained in gun cotton did not maintain an equal quantity, making its safety unstable. Sometimes it would become moldy, thus losing most of its explosive power, which could not then be easily restored. At present the most powerful explosive in the world was blasting gelatine, which was used by Americans, though not for military purposes. It was far superior to gun cotton in destructive power, and could be quite safely handled in ordinary times. One defect, however, of gelatine was its easy freezing. Frozen gelatine would explode from the slightest cause, and the fact made it unfit for military purposes. The "Shimose" explosive was very simply constituted, but it was sufficiently safe to be used by the navy.
Continuing, Dr. Shimose said neither the falling of an iron hammer upon it, nor ignition, nor the firing of a bullet into it, would cause his explosive to explode. In such cases it would burn like turpentine, but the fire could be extinguished by a cupful of water. Combined with a certain ingredient, it had sufficient explosive power for warlike purposes. Among the explosives in the world the American gelatine had the greatest destructive power; Shimose came next, gun cotton and dynamite following in order. To illustrate the explosive power of Shimose, a small quantity placed upon an iron plate one or two inches thick would, when exploded, perforate the plate for the area covered by the powder. At an experiment carried out at Kugenuma, Soshu, a six-inch Shimose shot was fired at a coal store protected with armor plate similar to that of a certain cruiser. The shot made a hole of about three feet in diameter, whereas in the case of the ordinary shot the diameter of the hole was only six inches. It burst on contact with the plate, while the other exploded only when it had traveled about three feet after passing through the plate. The Shimose shell was blown into two or three thousand pieces, while the other broke up only into ten or fifteen fragments. This tremendous power was testified to by the fact that a bluejacket on the Variag was struck by more than 160 fragments of shell. The placing of one such shot on a deck would mean the wounding of all the crew there. But the explosive was not intended for the killing of men, but for the destruction of warships. One more noteworthy feature of the Shimose powder, concluded the doctor, was the fact that its cost was about half that of gun cotton.—Shanghai Times.
