JAPANESE FORMS OF ATHLETICS

A FINE EXHIBITION OF JIJUTSU GIVEN BY PROF. TAKAHASHI AT THE BOYS' FIELD.

A large crowd attended the exhibition of Japanese athletics given at the Boys' Field last evening. KUHIO GETS MANY DELEGATES

MANY PRECINCTS DEFINITELY INSTRUCT FOR HIM—SELECTIONS OF DELEGATES MADE.

KRUGER'S LAST WISH HONORED

BRITAIN GRANTS PERMISSION FOR HIS BURIAL IN THE LAND HE LOVED AND LOST.

LONDON, July 15.—At a meeting of the Privy Council today in Buckingham Palace, at which King Edward presided, the request of the relatives of the late Paul Kruger, former President of the South African Republic, for the interment of his body in the Transvaal was considered and it was subsequently announced that the desired permission had been telegraphed to Clarendon, Switzerland, through the British Minister at Bern.

JOHANNESBURG, July 15.—The announcement of Paul Kruger's death was received with general regret here. The newspapers make generous references to him and warmly support the suggestion of the burial of his body in the Transvaal.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 15.—All of the papers today pay warm tributes to former President of the Transvaal Kruger. The Russ says: "However preoccupied with the Far East, we cannot forget our sympathy for the Boers."
