Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 56 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time whistle blows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 9 hours, 0 minutes. The Sun and moon are for local time for the whole group.


