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AGRICULTURE AND FORESTRY

FOREST FIRES AMONG THE MATTERS DISCUSSED AT THE WEEKLY MEETING YESTERDAY.

The Board of Agriculture and Forestry met yesterday afternoon. The first matter taken up was the question of forest fires. Forester Haughe's report to Superintendent Hooper concerning recent fires was submitted. It was found that in the fire on the Kipahulu tract some ten acres had been burned over but that only a few of the koa trees had been destroyed. The direction of the wind and the green vegetation had prevented the fire spreading into the forest tract. After a discussion the board decided to draw the attention of the Attorney General to the matter and to ask him to prosecute if the law permitted. Superintendent Holloway remarked that if there were no laws to make fire starters use proper precautions, such a law should be made.

Assistant Entomologist Terry reported the confinement and destruction of quantities of *Acanthosia limes* brought here from San Francisco, on account of their being affected with scale. Twenty-seven boxes of California peaches affected with borers were also destroyed. Entomologist Kirkaldy wrote a strong letter urging the board to declare an embargo on all fruit from Australia, Australia and China but it was decided to leave the matter for the decision of Entomologist Crow who will arrive from California on the 12th.

The need of a bulletin on raising citrus fruits was referred to the Federal Experiment station.

It was reported that the bluefield bananas are thriving but that there will be none for distribution until later when they have increased sufficiently.

It was stated by W. M. Giffard that California is now paying half the salary of the Australian entomologist Comper who is searching in India for a parasite to prey on the melon fly.

The plan of the Tropic Fruit Company to ship island pineapples away well packed in small lots was heartily commended but it was recommended that every care be taken to remove fruit lice before shipment is made.

AMERICAN ART AT THE WORLD'S FAIR

IT IS SAID THAT THE YANKIES LEAD ALL IN SCULPTURE—WESTERN ARTISTS A SURPRISE.

Those who visit the Fine Art Palace at the St. Louis World's Fair can have no doubt but that there is a pronounced school of American art. The superb collection of paintings by our own artists seem to have a certain individuality all their own.

Of course there are many artists that show the influence of French or German schools, but, as they get down to work, they develop a style which is distinctive. This appears to apply especially to sculpture, of which there are very many notable examples. Of course, we have the advantage over other countries exhibiting sculpture, because it is very hard to ship from a distance, but America need not be afraid to compete with any country in this branch of art.

The work of Western artists is an agreeable surprise, almost all the cities being represented.

In fact there seems to be strong men in all branches of art and the best examples of their work will be shown in "The Forest City" World's Fair Art Portfolios. The masterpieces in the Art Palaces will be faithfully photographed and reproduced in this work. We are confident that our readers will appreciate this feature almost more than any other, as photographs of great pictures, although they lack color, are generally extremely satisfactory.

One of the numbers soon to be issued will be devoted entirely to reproductions of paintings, the photographs of which have already been taken by the official photographer of the Fair and the descriptions of which will be written by Walter B. Stephens, Secretary of the Exposition. Seven parts now ready.

SIVOITCH BLOWN UP.

Associated Press, Morning Service. NEW-YORK, August 4.—The crew of the Russian gunboat Sivoitch destroyed her and escaped to Liaoyang before the Japanese came.

The small Russian gunboat Sivoitch has been at Newchwang for over a year. She spent last winter frozen up in the mud at Yinkow in company with the British gunboat Espiegle and the American gunboat Helena. Early in March the Russians announced that the armament of the Sivoitch had been removed and that the vessel would be blown up to escape capture in case the Japanese should take Newchwang.

CHICAGO STRIKE EXTENDING.

DOCTORS WANT MORE MONEY

A LONG RIDE OVER A BAD TRAIL FOR A TEN DOLLAR FEE—BOARD OF HEALTH RECEIVES REPORTS

A letter from Dr. R. J. McGettigan of Hana, Maui, received the attention of the Board of Health at its meeting yesterday afternoon. The doctor had to ride thirty-two miles over a dangerous trail to look after the body of a Chinaman which had been washed up on shore. He put in a bill for \$50 but the clerk of the High Sheriff wrote back cutting the bill down to \$10.

It was agreed that in such cases some special provision should be made and on the suggestion of Assistant Attorney General Fleming the matter was turned over to the Attorney General's Department.

James Nott Jr., inspector of plumbing reported for the month of June as follows:

- Plumbing plans filed and permits issued for same, 42.
- Separate pieces of plumbing finished and accepted, 22.
- Plumbing fixtures installed in above, 195.
- Sewer connections made 22.
- Houses connected with the sewer, 23.
- Building permits received, 20.
- Inspections of building sites, 7.
- Reports made where interior changes were contemplated 8.
- A total of 234 inspections were made during the month, of which 177 were for plumbing.

The report of Dr. J. S. B. Pratt, chief sanitary officer and inspector of cemeteries was as follows:

"During the month four complaints of nuisances have been made and where found to exist were abated. Three 48-hour notices were served and the orders complied with.

"Two deaths were investigated and post mortems ordered in both cases. "Severely recommended for hotel, restaurant and lodging house licenses were issued and 901 persons can be lawfully lodged in the buildings. Four are still held over from previous months and one from this month.

"There were 55 inspections of graves made. In the King street Catholic cemetery four coffins were exposed and one buried in 12 inches of water. In Maunaloa cemetery the edge of one coffin was exposed, also the same at Puca. A burial was made at Waikiki in 12 inches of water."

MAUI HAS MEAT TRUST

IT IS FORMED, HOWEVER, WITH AN AGREEMENT THAT PRICES SHALL NOT BE RAISED.

WAILUKU, August 4.—A meat trust has been formed on Maui between the principal ranch owners and the beef retailers in Wailuku and Lahaina. This trust however will not affect the public, inasmuch as the contracts between the graziers and the sellers are to the effect that meat shall not be sold for a higher price than it is selling for now.

J. A. Drummond of Hana and W. H. Cornwell of Wailuku will run the new butcher shop, which will take in the two present markets in Wailuku, while W. L. Decoto will continue to operate the Lahaina market. It is stipulated between the cattlemen and Messrs. Cornwell, Drummond and Decoto that the former party will keep off all competition of whatsoever nature, and that if any other market should be organized in Wailuku or Lahaina that will lower the present price of meat, they on their part agree to lower the cost of meat to the retailers. The price of meat to the public will continue at 12½ cents and 16 cents for choice meats.

All the above arrangements were completed last week while R. W. Shingle of the Henry Waterhouse Trust Co. and Dr. Raymond were in town. A meeting had been held in Wailuku on last Wednesday evening which was attended by Hon. H. A. Baldwin, R. W. Shingle, W. L. Decoto and Dr. Raymond, and the above agreement is the result of that meeting. This therefore gives the monopoly on the meat market to Messrs. Drummond and Cornwell in Wailuku, but at the same time assures the cattle men of the purchase of beef from their stock.

INDIANA NOMINATION.

John Worth Kern, the Indianapolis lawyer was an unsuccessful Democratic candidate for Governor of that state in 1900. The Democrats under the leadership of National Chairman Tammart, an Indianapolis man, will make a strong effort to carry that state this year.

PREPARING WINTER QUARTERS.
