Japanese At Port Arthur

(Associated Press Cable to The Star.)

TIENTSIN, August 5.—It is estimated that the Japanese have 100,000 troops before Port Arthur.

Russians Lose Guns And Men

Washington, August 5, 1904.

To Japanese Consul, Honolulu:

According to General Kuroki's detailed report, one of the enemy's heaviest reverses during the engagement of Yushulingtzu on July 31st was at Pynling, five miles to the south of Yushulingtzu, where our detachment turned to the flank of the retreating enemy's column which was consisted of 3 regiments of infantry and 4 guns, and severely fired upon its whole line at a distance of from 200 to 1000 metres. In the afternoon of the same day the Russian approached to the scene with red-cross flags for carrying away their wounded which we permitted, stopping our fire.

To SAITO, Honolulu.

Our army which attacked Tomuching reports that in that engagement our casualties totaled 860, whereof 194 were killed and 676 wounded; that we buried about 700 of the enemy's corpses with due respect; that we captured six field-guns, many rifles and shells, and large quantities of flour, barley and ammunitions, etc.

General Kuroki reports that in the engagements of Yushulingtzu and Yangtuling our casualties totaled 946 including forty officers; that the enemy's casualties are estimated at 2000 at least, that we captured eight officers and 145 men, and also two field-guns, many rifles, tents and shells, etc.



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THE FLEET WHICH HAS GUARDED PORT ARTHUR ENTRANCE FOR SIX MONTHS



The above picture clearly depicts the magnificent collection of war vessels with which Admiral Togo is blocking Port Arthur. It is now within a few days of six months since the ceaseless vigil of the Japanese vessels began. Since February 8, day and night, they have watched and waited for the Russian vessels to come out. Early in June the Russian admiral tried it. When the Vladivostok squadron made its first sortie, the Port Arthur fleet came forth, evidently supposing that Togo would reduce his strength by sending vessels after Skrydloff's squadron. But the Japanese admiral was on the spot in full strength, and the Russians were driven back with more damages inflicted on their vessels. Togo began his watch again, having saved the command of the sea, so necessary to his country, and while the armies maneuvered and fought on land he waited for the day when the Russian admiral, attacked from the land side, must come forth to do battle.

A LEPER COLONY

REPUBLIC OF PANAMA ESTABLISHES ONE, SETTING ASIDE \$50,000, AND WILL APPROPRIATE \$20,000 EVERY TWO YEARS FOR MAINTENANCE—THE SEXES ARE TO BE KEPT SEPARATE IN PANAMA'S LAZARETTO.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 20.—The government of Panama has made arrangements for confining all leprosy cases in one place, called a lazaretto, and for this purpose the national convention of Panama has appropriated \$50,000, this to include the construction of the necessary buildings and grounds, agricultural implements, that the patients may in a measure help to care for themselves, and tools, seeds, etc., for planting. A library will be installed for the benefit of the inmates, and 20,000 will be appropriated every two years to maintain the institution, which is to be built in two parts, one for men and the other for women. Under the law adopted by the convention the national board of health must designate a place in which to establish a lazaretto capable of isolating all the lepers in the republic, with land adjoining for cultivation and the raising of domestic animals.

The director of public works must submit to the national board of health a detailed plan of this lazaretto, divided into two sections, one for men and one for women, distant and separated one from the other. The plan shall be approved by the national board of health, before any work is commenced upon its construction.

All persons suffering from leprosy, and known as such by the medical officer of the province in which they reside and by one or two other doctors, must be sent by the governor of the province without loss of time and at the expense of the public treasury to the proposed lazaretto. In each case that occurs the governor of the province must send to the administrator of the lazaretto, with the certificate required for his admittance, an authenticated copy of the medical certificate.

COHEN'S LINE OF STEAMERS PAU

"Joe" Cohen's competing steamer line is pau. It "died abornin'." According to advices received here by the last mail from San Francisco, Cohen had given up the project, either because he didn't see any profit in sight, or did not have the necessary backing.

When Cohen left here there was considerable agitation for lower steamer rates, and Cohen proceeded to look into the matter, with the result that he announced soon after his arrival at the other end, that the Cohen competing steamer would soon be ready to start. He proposed to make a round trip passenger rate of \$100 and declared that the success of the line depended only on the amount of patronage it received. Now the scheme has been thrown up and Honolulu will have to be content without the Cohen line.

A DEAL IN POLITICS

PLAN TO CHANGE OUTLINED PROGRAMME OF REPUBLICAN TERRITORIAL CONVENTION BY A SWITCH IN CANDIDATES—PRINCE KUHIO IS TALKED OF FOR PRESIDENT OF THE SENATE BUT HAS THE NECESSARY VOTES FOR RE-NOMINATION.

A new political deal is being talked of in the distribution of important nominations in the coming Republican convention. The proposition includes the retirement of Prince Cupid as Delegate to Congress and his switching over to the Territorial Senate. Some of the party leaders believe that such a plan would strengthen the ticket generally, but it is not likely to be done, it is said, unless it is approved by Kuhio himself, who, in the words of a former commander at Manila "has the situation well in hand."

Senator Crabbe is to retire from the Senate this time, it is understood to take the postmastership. According to those who propose the new plan Kuhio would be President of the Senate in place of Crabbe, and some one among a number of professional men would take the candidacy for Delegate to Congress. It is conceded that the position is one for an attorney or business man of experience, and there is opposition within the party to Kuhio on this ground, even by many who are friendly to him and realize his efforts and admit his chances of doing better in a second term.

Among leading Democrats there is talk of a revolt against the Iaukea programme. One man prominently mentioned for the nomination is Attorney W. A. Kinney, whose qualifications are conceded. Iaukea, on the other hand, is admittedly without the training and professional or business experience necessary to make a success of the job. His election, as it is regarded, would be for the good of Iaukea and might make some Democrats happy by victory, but there is nothing in it for the Territory.

It is claimed that the nomination of a man like Kinney by the Democrats would endanger Republican success.

unless the Republicans had a candidate who was also an experienced attorney or man of business. The Democrats, it is believed, would draw considerable Republican strength for their candidate. The Home Rulers are generally thought to have put themselves out of the running by the nomination of Notley. Moreover the dullness of their convention showed the party to have lost its vitality. Hence, it is claimed, as much of it has doubtless gone to the Democrats, with some Republican defections the latter might win. The Republicans, by running Kuhio for the Senate and a man who has the business support for Congress could, it is claimed, hold all their past strength and gain more.

Many of the precincts throughout the islands have already declared for Kuhio, and it is thought that he can command enough votes to nominate him for
