HE HELPED A COUNTRYMAN

MARSHAL HENDRY ARRESTS A CHINESE FOR NEW KIND OF VIOLATION OF LAWS.

An important arrest was made yesterday by United States Marshal Hendry at Wai'alua, his prisoner being Leong Shing Lee, a well known Hawaiian born Chinese. Leong was arrested on a charge of having transgressed Section 8 of the United States law respecting immigration. It is understood that the case is the first of its kind arising in the islands as the accused is charged with having attempted to bring into the Territory of the United States a Chinaman who had no right to land. The Chinaman in question arrived on the Siberia on May 20 and was deported by the Korea on July 18. His name was given as Leong Sha Lee and it is alleged that under this similarity of names Leong Shing Lee sought to aid the man in landing. The section under which the charge is laid runs as follows:

"That any person including the master, agent, owner or consignee of any vessel who shall bring into or land in the United States by vessel or otherwise or who shall attempt by himself or through another, to bring into or land in the United States by vessel or otherwise, any alien not duly admitted by an immigrant inspector or not lawfully entitled to enter the United States shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall on conviction be punished by a fine not exceeding one thousand dollars for each and every alien so landed, or attempted to be landed or by imprisonment for a term not less than three months nor more than two years or by both such fine and imprisonment."

Marshal Hendry brought his prisoner back to the city and attorneys Humphreys and Crook were soon interested in the case. Leong being their client. He secured his liberty under bonds of \$1,000, his sureties being Yim Quon and Lam Kam Chin. He will appear before the United States Commissioner on Friday next at 2 o'clock. The accused is an educated man. He is a son of Alimn and was at one time a teacher in the Frank Damon school.

LABORERS' RESOLUTIONS

ACTING GOVERNOR ATKINSON'S PROCEEDINGS WITH REGARD TO ASIATIC LABOR ON A HAWAII GOVERNMENT CONTRACT HEARTILY ENDORSED BY THE HONOLULU TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL—A COMMITTEE PRESENTS RESOLUTIONS.

Prompted by the work done by Acting Governor Atkinson in insisting that only citizen labor be employed on the work of constructing government roads, the Honolulu Trades and Labor Council at its meeting last evening passed a resolution publicly thanking him. This morning President Cahalan was a caller at the capitol and he personally handed to the Acting Governor a copy of the resolution which ran as follows:

"Whereas, The Honolulu Trades and Labor Council, Territory of Hawaii, has noted the firm stand taken by the Honorable Acting Governor of Hawaii in upholding citizen labor, and

"Whereas, citizen labor is the very foundation of a sound body politic, and

"Whereas, citizen labor only asks the consideration due from one right thinking man to another right thinking man, and that due to a scale of respectable self-respecting living and progress.

"Resolved, without this standard the political and social standards of the Hawaiian Islands must fall to an un-American and debased plane of thinking and living, therefore, be it

"Resolved, That the Labor Council publicly thanks Acting Governor Atkinson for the most decided stand he has taken and that we urge him to be keenly watchful and persistent that the citizen may not be robbed of his American birthright, a respectable living to the industrious and absolute self-respect and political equality; and be it further

"Resolved, That the President of the Trades and Labor Council be instructed to personally hand to Acting Governor Atkinson a copy of these resolutions.

"Signed this the fifth day of August, A. D. 1904.

"HONOLULU TRADE AND LABOR COUNCIL.

The Acting Governor made no secret of his gratification over the receipt of the Council's message and this he expressed to President Cahalan.
