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SCHWAB WAS NOT A SUCCESS



Charles M. Schwab, the protege of Andrew Carnegie, is out of the billion dollar steel trust. Schwab is said by some Wall street financiers to have been a failure in the big position to which Carnegie elevated him, and he no longer has any influence with the directors. Schwab's reported escapades in Monte Carlo did not do him any good in the financial world. At a meeting of the directors of the United States Steel corporation on July 26 Schwab's resignation was accepted and Thomas Morrison of Pittsburg was elected in his place. Incidentally, a dividend of over nineteen million dollars was declared. Schwab was also in the big steamship trust, and recently he has attracted much notice by repaying investors who lost money through him in the collapse of that financial bubble.

NEW JAIL READY IN TWO MONTHS

WORK ON NEW EDIFICE PROGRESSING RAPIDLY—NEW WALL TO BE TWENTY FEET HIGH.

The new jail will be completed within two months. The jail building will probably be completed before that time but the wall will take the full two months time for completion. The wall is to be twenty feet in height, four feet at the base and two feet at the top. No one will be put in the new jail until after the wall shall have been completed. Appropriate ceremonies will be held when new jail is thrown upon for occupancy. The new jail will enable about 180 prisoners to be housed. Only misdemeanor men and defendants awaiting trial will be put into the new jail. The old jail will be utilized for the quarters of the convicts. It is intended to increase the height of the wall around the old prison. The old wall is now about 12 feet in height and the wall will be raised to a uniform height with the wall about the new jail. The segregation of the prisoners has been largely influenced by the ruling made some time ago by Judge Gear in the matter of housing misdemeanor prisoners with actual criminals and also with the working of misdemeanor men. The Supreme Court will probably hand down a decision this year regarding this ruling. Both High Sheriff Brown and Warden Henry are favorably impressed with the ruling that a distinction between misdemeanor offenders and those convicted of penal crimes, should be maintained.

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, July 30.—Frederick Schneider, a Stanford man who took the degree of Bachelor of Laws at the last commencement, has been appointed assistant registrar of the Kamehameha schools at Honolulu. He will leave for the Hawaiian Islands to assume his new duties in about two weeks. Mr. Schneider was one of the best known men in the law department of Stanford. He is a member of the Phi Delta Phi legal fraternity, and since graduation has been a practicing attorney at Palo Alto. While in college he acted as assistant in the office of the registrar, and it was the result of his work there that brought about his present appointment. In Honolulu Schneider will work with Walter Clark, former assistant secretary to President Jordan, who was recently made registrar of the Kamehameha schools.

COLORADO SPRINGS, Col., August 8.—Seventy persons were drowned in a wreck on the Denver and Rio Grande Railway today. Heavy rains and a cloudburst had weakened the trestle crossing the Rio Grande and six cars went through at a point near this city, falling with their occupants into the river below. The cars and the bodies of the drowned were carried miles down the stream. For a long distance from the scene of the disaster the river banks are crowded with lamenting relatives of those who lost their lives, seeking to recover bodies.

Japs Threaten Mukden

LIAOYANG, August 8.—Heavy fighting is reported north of Haicheng. Japanese are said to be threatening Mukden from the northeast.

MAUI ALSO WANTS A BREAKWATER

THE ANSWER TO ACTING GOVERNOR ATKINSON'S REQUEST FOR SUGGESTIONS ABOUT FEDERAL APPROPRIATIONS—A PUBLIC BUILDING, A BREAKWATER FOR KAHULUI AND CORRECT CHARTS OF THE OCEAN.

WAILUKU, Maui, August 6.—The executive committee and the officers of the Maui Improvement Association, together with other citizens, met at the Wailuku court house last Friday evening to consider what particular improvements were desired from the Federal government. This meeting was called in response to a wireless message from Acting Governor Atkinson to Judge Kepoikai of the Improvement Association.

The matter of a county building was the first topic discussed and the matter of financial assistance from Washington. Judge Kepoikai introduced the following resolutions:

"Whereas, at the last regular session of the Legislature of the Territory of Hawaii, \$3500 was appropriated for a country building to be located in Wailuku, and whereas the Wailuku Improvement Association believe the sum appropriated is insufficient.

"Resolved, That plans be drawn and presented by the Department of Public Works to the Federal government and that the Federal government be asked to assist."

The intention is to have a building of sufficient dimensions as will warrant space for a postoffice, U. S. district court chambers, and deputy U. S. marshal's office, in conjunction with the county building.

R. W. Filler being called upon to suggest other needed improvements said in part:

"There are one or two things pertaining to Maui which must be looked upon as very much needed and an absolute necessity. The S. S. American which sailed from Kahului last week en route to New York from Honolulu, went on an uncharted shoal off Mo'okai.

"While these islands have been charted the survey was of an elementary nature only, but have never been properly charted, as could be vouched for by two sea captains who upon asking for late charts found them unobtainable.

"On leaving Honolulu ships encounter 30 miles of dangerous current running from three to five miles an hour, and ships could drift out of the course, as there are not lights after passing Diamond Head light until that of Mo'okai was sighted, and after that the Lahaina light, which was not of sufficient magnitude as was proven by the Kiloahna going ashore. Four miles out from Kahului the coast line, on account of the high mountain gackground, was very deceptive and a sea captain depending upon his charts jeopardized his vessel in entering Kahului at night or in heavy weather."

Filler suggested three powerful lighthouses for Mo'okai, one at Lahaina, Kahakuloa Point, Kahului, Huelo, Nahiku and Hana. Proceeding he dwelt very fully upon Kahului as a port of call. In conclusion he asked the hearty co-operation of the citizens as well as unity of action to obtain a breakwater for Kahului, when other needed improvements such as wharves would naturally follow.

Manager Burnham of the American-Hawaiian line while on his tour of inspection realized the importance of a breakwater, coast survey, and dredging of Kahului harbor, and asked that copies of charts both old and of recent origin be given him and that Maui could depend upon his influence and support whenever needed in this direction. Prior to adjournment a motion was adopted that the recommendation of lighthouses be left to a committee of which R. W. Filler should be chairman, to draw up all the recommendations and resolutions and forward them to the Acting Governor.

HOW TO FUSE

DEMOCRATS AND HOME RULERS ON MAUI ANXIOUS TO GET TOGETHER AGAINST THE COMMON ENEMY BUT EACH PARTY WOULD LIKE TO SWALLOW THE OTHER AND OBJECTS TO BEING SWALLOWED.

WAILUKU, August 5.—The political situation on Maui is peculiar with reference to the Democrats and Home Rulers. Many of the Home Rulers, at least the more intelligent of them, are anxious to fuse with the Democrats under the Democratic banner, while the more ignorant class desire the fusion but it must be conducted under the Home Rule constitution. That is precisely how the matter stands at present. No meetings of any importance or conferences have as yet held to discuss the matter, excepting one some two weeks ago, when the matter of fusion was turned down. However, as there were no Democrats present at that meeting, the action of the Home Rulers present is not taken as the party's intent. In fact they know only too well that without the assistance of the Democrats, who comprise the more intelligent of the Home Rule vote at the last election, the Home Rule party has no chance of victory at the next election.

PARCELS DESTINED FOR JAPAN.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 25.—In connection with the parcel-post convention recently concluded between the United States and Japan, which will go into effect on the 1st of next month, it has been ordered that parcel-post mails for Japan shall be made up at the offices of San Francisco, Cal., Seattle and Tacoma, Wash., and Honolulu, T. H. "Parcels" for Japan should be forwarded to those offices for dispatch by means of steamers sailing from those ports. No provision has been made for the conveyance of parcel-post mails via Canada. Consequently "parcels" should not be forwarded to Seattle for dispatch to Japan by means of steamers sailing from Vancouver or Victoria, B. C.
