Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 30 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time of whistle blows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 3 hours, 0 minutes. The Sun and moon are for local time for the whole group.

LAHAINA LOCALS.

LAHAINA, August 5—It is stated that by the removal of a partition a three-room schoolhouse will become a two-room building and one teacher will be discharged.

For a considerable length of time, electric power has been utilized at the Lahaina Pumping Station, and also for a portion of the work in the Pioneer Mill. The current is generated in the northern portion of the town, and is distributed by wire at the points where it is needed.

HEAVY FLOOD ON MOLOKAI

GREAT DAMAGE DONE BY CLOUD BURST AT WALALUA—BRIDGE AND WHARF WASHED AWAY.

A heavy flood is reported from Wailua, Molokai. News of a heavy cloud burst was brought by the steamer Like, like, which arrived on Saturday from her regular run to Molokai, Maui and Lanai ports.

Wailua is situated between Pukoo and Halawa. The cloudburst occurred about 4 o'clock last Thursday morning. Vast torrents of water rushed down the gulches on to the village of Wailua. Taro lands were inundated and the crops washed away by the rushing waters. A bridge was swept away and the little wharf at the land was destroyed by the sudden rise of water. Houses were flooded and the occupants driven to seek shelter in higher places. The water banked up to a height of four and five feet at places in the village. The damage done was very great. Nobody was drowned by the flood.

MAIL FROM SAN FRANCISCO.

The transport Logan has the mail from the Mainland. She is due tomorrow morning but may arrive this afternoon or tonight. The next regular mail is due here on Friday morning by the S. S. Alameda. The S. S. China sailed the same day with the Alameda but will not be apt to reach port until Friday afternoon.
