WONDERS OF YOSEMITE

CHARLES L. RHODES WRITES OF THE GREAT SCENIC RESORT OF CALIFORNIA—ONE OF THE GREATEST OF CALIFORNIA'S MANY FAMOUS ATTRACTIONS DESCRIBED — A WONDERLAND OF HEIGHTS AND DEPTHS.

SAN FRANCISCO, August 1.—Californians, who have such a surfeit of natural wonders to attract them and furnish sight-seeing or vacation tours for every season of the year, will tell you that early in the season is the best time to go to Yosemite. Perhaps it is. But having just returned from there I can give earnest testimony to the fact that earlier or later, any time is a good time to visit Yosemite. Nothing that I have ever seen is so impressive in grandeur, so satisfying in beauty, so rich in marvels. Nature, in this heart of the Sierras, has rioted in the profusion and sublimity of effects she is able to produce by means of height and depth. In Yosemite space seems defined by that one dimension, so wondrously is it handled. Extension is lost or forgotten in the overwhelming effects of sheer height and depth. Domes and peaks and spires, and above all El Capitan, rise sheer in precipitous grandeur to shut out all sensations of magnitude except height; while waterfalls that thunder and echo, that spread out into curtains of spray imprisoning the sunlight till it escapes through the mist in rainbows, fling themselves down till depth seems the dominant note in the grandeur that oppresses while it enralls you. From every point in the valley new combinations of the deep and the high, greet the eye and awe the mind, changing the aspect but never the effect of space, illimitable, but ever bounded by depth and height; till, rising to the summits that crown the gorge, as if in very wantonness and mockery, breadth and extension become the dominating notes. The Sierras spread out before the eye, their streams and lakes, their glaciers and fields of snow glistening and sparkling in the sun till the landscape culminates in Mt. Lyell and its kindred peaks, that line of mountain fortresses that overlooks the continent.

A visit to Yosemite yields one of those jewels of memory that is ever satisfying and ever a joy.

The journey to Yosemite is one of interest. The Southern Pacific carries you in luxurious comfort to Raymond in the foothills of the Sierras and just on the southern edge of that land of romance Bret Harte peopled with the characters of his immortal stories. Here the Yosemite Stage and Transportation Company takes you, or rather the brother's Washburn, for they are the soul and life of an enterprise which challenges your admiration. It has been their life work to open the gate to Yosemite. Nearly forty years ago A. H. Washburn, the elder of four brothers, began taking people into the valley. There were no roads then, only mountain trails. But where the eye of the inexperienced visitor could then scarcely follow the trail, the vision of Washburn saw a great highway in the future. With the aid of his brothers E. P. Washburn, John S. Washburn and J. F. Washburn, that road has been built. It winds among the foothills, climbs the precipitous sides of the mountains as it proceeds toward the heart of the Sierras. On one side the mountain rises steep above it; on the other it falls sheer below it. Even the road is firm, well built, and for many miles oiled so that it is dustless even in the heart of summer.

Over this road staunch, comfortable stage coaches, drawn by four or six horses changed every eight or nine miles, roll along at good speed, carrying the mails and eight or eleven passengers through wooded hills and up into the mountains, following for a mile or two the great forty mile flume that carries the lumber from the saw mill of the Madera Lumber Company in the mountains down to the railroad in the San Joaquin Valley; crossing the logging chutes and railroad of the Sugar Pine Lumber Company; through Grub Gulch, a name fragrant with memories of days long ago; and to Ahwahnee, one of the hotels maintained by the brothers Washburn. Your first glimpse of the hotel is of quantities of roses in vases made of old Indian mortars, on the wide porches. Roses grow profusely here. It is lunch time when the stage arrives, and passengers are unusually ready for the meal for there is beginning to be a zest in the mountain air.

From Ahwahnee the road climbs higher and further into the mountains through scenery growing always ruder and more impressive until Wawona is reached at dinner time. Wawona Hotel, another one of the excellent hostleries maintained by the brothers Washburn, is just at the edge of the Yosemite National Park, and 26 miles from Yosemite Valley. It is in a valley of the same name, a name given it by the Washburns in honor of a famous old Indian who formerly lived there. Of this place General Grant said, "This is one of the most beautiful spots I have ever visited, and may be justly termed one of the gems of the world."

The journey to Yosemite Valley may be interrupted here to spend a day at the Mariposa Grove of Big Trees, the giant Sequoias. It is well worth while to make the interruption. A more delightful spot to stay to idle away a week or a summer, cannot be imagined.

In another article I shall tell of the big trees, how they grow on you, how their magnitude seems to numb the senses at first, their fascinating weirdness, and of the one that is named "Honolulu."

ANOTHER RUSSIAN WAR LOAN.

CLOSING UPON KUROPATKIN.

Associated Press, Morning Service. LIAOYANG, August 8.—The Japanese are advancing toward Mukden. It is probable that a simultaneous attack will be made on Mukden and Liaoyang. With the Japanese simultaneously

threatening Mukden and Liaoyang. Russia's situation in Manchuria is a serious one. Should General Kuroki's army in attacking Mukden succeed in cutting off the Russian forces at Liaoyang, Anping and Anshanchan, all to the southward, the latter would be at the mercy of the two large armies under Generals Oku and Nodzu which are advancing upon Liaoyang from the south, southeast and southwest. Mukden is about fifty miles north of Liaoyang. According to recent reports the Japanese had one army about forty-five miles southeast of Mukden and about fifteen miles to the eastward of Liaoyang. The forces of Oku and Nogi, advancing. The forces of Oku and Nodzu advance about twenty miles from Liaoyang.

PLUCKY NAVAL ATTACK.
