NAMING PARKS

EDITOR STAR: No doubt, the public greatly appreciates the efforts our popular acting governor is making to beautify the city in transforming mere spots of waste land into city parks. We now have a number of squares and more to come but still unnamed. I take liberty to suggest a few names to perpetuate and honor our leaders past and present. The gorge lot on Richard street should be called "Jack's Corner." The future Postoffice site on Bishop street might be named "Coker's Square." For the Nuuanu Avenue plot "Roosevelt's Square." "Kalaikoa Square" would do nicely for the vacant lot opposite the Station House. As a fitting compliment to ex-Secretary Cooper who has done much signal service in rejuvenating our parks I humbly propose to name the big space opposite the R. R. Station as "Cooper's Square." These are merely suggestions, but if you name a thing it gets more popular with the masses and the public will take more interest therein. I also propose for each of the squares a rustic pavilion such as is now put together in Kapiolani Park. It gives the parks a quaint and interesting look. Rustic Benches would not be out of place either. The native lot vendors should be encouraged to ply their interesting trade in busy times under these actions. This would give the squares and decidedly prove a great tourist attraction. Travellers and tourists have so little chance to see any phase of native life. COSTS IN FIRE CLAIMS SUIT. The question of costs in the treasury cases brought to decide the distribution of certain fire claims awards was argued before Judge Dole in the District Court yesterday afternoon. The contention was made on behalf of several awardees that the insurance total of all costs as they had put the holders of awards in the position of having to protect their interests in court. This view was argued by W. A. Whiting, S. M. Callou and W. L. Stanley representing different awardees. A. G. M. Robertson for the insurance companies denied that his clients were in any way responsible for the litigation. It was the principle that had to be settled. The case was taken under advisement.

JAPS ENTER CHEFOO. Associated Press, Morning Service. CHEFOO, August 12.—Two Japanese torpedo destroyers entered this harbor during the night and seized the Russian torpedo destroyer Riestelini and towed her away after a hand-to-hand fight with the Russian crew. Chefoo is a Chinese port and its violation by a Japanese naval force constitutes a breach of neutrality for which China will probably go through the form of asking indemnity.

THE BALTIC FLEET. Associated Press, Morning Service. CRONSTADT, August 12.—The Baltic fleet will sail for the Far East on August 14.

KUROKI'S PLANS FEARED. Associated Press, Morning Service. MUKDEN, August 12.—It is feared the Japanese will seek to turn the Russian position above here and cut the railroad.

WIRELESS FOR STEAMERS. NEW YORK, July 30.—Contracts have been closed between the Marconi Company and the Holland-American Steamship Company for the equipment with wireless apparatus of the steamships Rotterdam, Potsdam, Amsterdam, Noordam, Statendam and Ryndam, and a new ship now in course of construction. The first installation will be made on the Rotterdam. A new steamer now building for the Allan line will also be supplied. The Canadian Government has announced that its new Marconi stations on the St. Lawrence river at Heath Point, Fame Point and Anticosti are now open. The Dominion service boat Stanley has been equipped with the system.

SEA SERPENT IS VERIFIED

PARIS ACADEMY OF SCIENCE READY TO ADMIT IT, BUT WOULD LIKE PHOTOGRAPH.

PARIS, July 21.—Avoidance of the camera is all that stands between the sea serpent and official recognition. The French Academy of Science is on the verge of admitting its existence, but lack of verification of its features makes such an authoritative step of doubtful propriety. The monster is as shy, however, as a debutante, and a photograph cannot be had. The Academy discussed the serpent at its full length at the last meeting. On the testimony of two men of honor, whose habits and temperance were vouched for, it seemed impossible longer to doubt. Lieutenant East, of the French vessel Decidre, reports having seen one last February 25th in the Bay of Oolong at Tonking. Its appearance was reported to him by several men of the crew, and he saw, as well as they, a great mass floating on the water that seemed at first like a monster turtle. The animal plunged and re-plunged several times, both to the starboard and port of the vessel. He says it measured about 100 feet in length and 14 or 15 in diameter. Its skin was black, with yellow spots, and its head gray and scaly, something like that of a turtle. It undulated vertically and horizontally. This description of Lieutenant East's the Academy found, allied almost exactly with that of Captain Lagrassille of the Avalanche, who, in 1890 and 1893, saw such an animal in the same locality. An attempt was made to photograph the legendary animal, but it eluded the camera like a timid girl. It is thought that the sea-serpent must be one of the gigantic saurians, last descendants of the antediluvian ichthyosaurs.

CRUISERS AT KIAUCHAU. Associated Press, Morning Service. CHEFOO, August 12.—The Russian cruisers Ashild and Novik entered Kiauchau harbor last night and saluted the German flag. These cruisers escaped from Port Arthur. Under the rules of international law they must leave a neutral port within twenty-four hours or submit to being dismantled and laid up until the end of the war. Kiauchau is a port on the Yellow Sea in southern Shantung and belongs to Germany.
