## COULD NOT GET CITIZEN LABOR

From private advices received in the city today it was learned that the Young Men's Republican Club of Hilo has changed or is changing its views on the question of employing any but citizen labor on the new roads on Hawaii. The point that they concede is that there is not enough citizen labor available at present in order to finish the work a contract time and the necessity of having the roads constructed is seen to be paramount. Superintendent Holloway however has had no different instructions in the matter and only this morning he telegraphed to Hilo to have the work stopped if Japanese were employed. "I do not know how things are going on there," he said "but I should get some news by the mail on Saturday."

## CAPTAIN DELANO GOT A DUCKING

The S. S. Hawaiian arrived this morning from Puget Sound ports, after an uneventful trip. It was not until she got alongside the Railway wharf that anything exciting occurred. An Captain Delano was climbing down an ordinary ladder that led from the deck of the steamer to the wharf, he slipped and tumbled into the water between the side of the ship and the wharf. He had a narrow escape from striking his head on either object. He was dragged out of the water and escaped with no mishap, other than a ducking.

The vessel left Tacoma and Seattle August 8 and came down in 3 1/2 days. She sighted the S. S. Argyll yesterday. The Hawaiian brought 2,500 tons of cargo. She will load 4,000 tons of sugar at this place and then go to Kahului and Hilo for 4,000 tons more. She will sail for Kahului in about a week's time. She will take sugar to Delawara Breakwater, being the last vessel of the American-Hawaiian fleet to go to the Breakwater this season from Hawaiian ports.

## HIS LICENSE TAKEN AWAY

There was an echo from the noise which arose over Strauch's Co-operative Home Purchasing Company's affairs heard in the Executive Chamber of Governor Carter this morning when Senator Aoch appeared with former Notary Public Silva under his care. Silva was accused of having misrepresented the character of a paper which he caused the wife of one of Strauch's clients to sign. She thought it was a mortgage but it turned out to be a deed. The Attorney General took the matter up in the Governor's absence and decided to cancel Silva's license but at Aoch's request he allowed matters to stand until the Governor returned. After considering the evidence carefully the Governor stated that he saw no reason to interfere with the action of Attorney General Andrews and here the matter ended.

"I am sorry for Silva," said the Governor this morning "and I have no doubt that there are others as careless as he was but the trouble is that we have got to put a stop to such cases by notice and this may be a lesson. I do not think that there is any ground

# THESE CHINESE WERE VERY CANDID

Judge Humphreys secured today the hospital of nine Chinese charged with gambling. The case was before Judge Lindsey. Police Officer Akana Espinda was the only witness placed on the stand by the prosecution. The witness was not able to bear up under the cross examination of Humphreys and contradicted the direct testimony. In fact, Espinda got quite mixed. Espinda testified though that the defendants had been gambling for money. The nine defendants took the stand and admitted playing pai-ko but claimed that it had been done for pastime and not for profit. They had not been gambling.

## THE HOME RULE CAMPAIGN PLAN

The Home Rule campaigners who left here on the Kinau this week are to make a general stamping tour of all the islands before they return to do campaign work on Oahu. They will attend the district nominating convention in Hilo and on Maui, in which legislative tickets are to be named. The general Home Rule convention held in Honolulu put up a platform and nominated a candidate for delegate to Congress, but did not name men for the legislature.

The campaigners are Senator Kalaue-Kalani, Charles Notley, candidate for Congressional Delegate; J. M. Poepeo, Representative Jonah Kumalae, and D. H. Kahaulahe. William Moseman was to have gone but he declined, and David Kahaulahe took his place.

The first landing place will be at Mahukona, from which Niuli will be the first visited and the speakers will travel all through Kohala, to Waimea and through Hamakua into Hilo, arriving there in time for the nominating convention. From Hilo into Puna, including Olaa, then to Kau and the Kona, to be at Kailua in time for its convention. At these conventions, candidates for both the Senate and House will be nominated.

Leaving Hawaii, Maui will be visited by calling at Wailuku and the surrounding points. Lahaina and Kaunapali will come next then to Molokai and the Leper Settlement. Kauai will be next visited, and on returning from its invasion: Hana and all points on East Maui will be the last to be visited direct from Honolulu. After stamping East Maui, the Home Rule men will then return and center their last efforts on this island.

Mrs. Notley accompanied her husband on this campaign tour and may stay over at either Waimea or Paouli.

## LIKELIKE HAD POLO PONIES

The steamer Likelike arrived last evening from her run to Maui and Molokai ports. She was late returning to port owing to her having a special shipment of coal for Kahului. The vessel brought down 16 polo ponies belonging to the Maui polo team. The ponies will be ridden in the coming polo contest with the Kauai team. The Kauai ponies were brought here Sunday on the steamer W. G. Hall.

The Likelike had a shipment of 20 boxes of coral. J. Stokes and Dr. Good of the Bishop museum, have been at Pukou and vicinity gathering coral specimens for the museum. They succeeded in securing a fine assortment. The vessel brought a number of passengers.

The steamer sails at 5 p. m. today for Lualaba, Maui and Molokai ports.

## NEW ARMORY FOR POLICE

An armory is being fitted up in the police station. The armory will be located in the Waikiki side of the building, in some of the cells on the cellar floor. The guns have heretofore been kept in cells on the office floor. Officer Elvin has had to do his work of repairing guns and attending to other details of that work, in a narrow little passageway back of the Deputy Sheriff's office. There has not been sufficient room for Elvin to perform his work. In the new quarters there will be ample room for this work.

## PINE PIECE OF INLAID WORK

Thomas C. Thrum, former registrar, has completed a handsome piece of inlaid wood work. The work is designed for a French table top. The top is composed of 250 pieces of wood. There were 55 different varieties of Hawaiian woods used. Thrum has been about two years on the work.
