MOSQUITO WORK AT WAIKIKI

A POND FULL OF WRIGGLERS IS BEING GIVEN TREATMENT THIS AFTERNOON.

Mosquito Inspector Hall is giving some scientific treatment this afternoon to a pond of water on Saratoga street, Waikiki, which he has found to be thick with mosquito larvae. The pond is covered over with moss and contains a lot of stagnant water. Hall secured some samples of the water and found it to be about as full of the little wrigglers as any water he has seen in Honolulu.

The treatment being given to the pond is what is known as "permanent treatment" being an improvement of conditions which is lasting, and does not require the constant watching necessary in the cases of small breeding places near the residences. Drainage canals are constructed allowing fresh water to enter the pond, the moss and surface weeds are cleared away, and the pond is stocked with fish of a kind which eat the larvae. After this treatment the pond will cease to be a nuisance as a breeder of mosquitoes. There is no doubt that it has been turning out millions of them in Waikiki district. Hall proposes to do a lot of this permanent work, regarding it as a very important feature of the anti-mosquito campaign. It has been found that such ponds when stocked with fish cannot breed mosquitoes, for the fish eat the wrigglers before they get a fair start in life.

The Honolulu Mosquito committee has become a member of the International Society of Mosquito Exterminators, and is exchanging correspondence with that society regularly. The mem-

in any way on Toma, but in all fairness to his client the court should not employ a member of the police department to translate in such a serious case as this. He submitted that the court should have an official interpreter who would by nature of his oath be as much an officer of the court and as impartial as the judge himself.

Several names were suggested, among them being that of Chester Doyle, formerly official interpreter, but now with the Attorney General's department, but he too was objected to on similar grounds. An attempt was made to secure Shiozawa, the Japanese editor, but he could not be secured, and half a dozen other pursuits for interpreters were fruitless.

Judge Gear ordered a recess, commenting that it was a penny wise policy which cut off the pay of an interpreter and then paid a whole panel of jurors \$2 a day for sitting round doing nothing.

"We could pay an interpreter for a whole year with the money thus wasted at a single term," he said.

Some of the unfortunate jurors wandered out into the corridors for a smoke, others stretched themselves out on the benches for "forty-winks" and others amused themselves with magazines with which they had thoughtfully provided themselves.

Then, shortly before noon F. B. Kuroda was brought into court. He is a Japanese who speaks good English and there being no objection by the defence he was sworn and the work of getting a jury to try Hayahsida for his life was commenced.

CRUISER AT SAN FRANCISCO

out by way of Cape Horn instead of through the Suez Canal or around the Cape of Good Hope. Some time ago Charles R. Flint of New York purchased two cruisers from Chili. Those cruisers were purchased for Russia, but they have never been delivered. One is the Esmaralda, a fine armored cruiser, and the other a protected cruiser. It is not by any means improbable that the Baltic fleet may go out round Cape Horn, pick up those two Chilean vessels and proceed to the Orient. The Lena may have been sent from Vladivostok in connection with such a policy and after coaling at San Francisco may go south to Chili and await the arrival of the Baltic fleet.

"Both of these explanations are of course dependant upon whether the vessel disarms in San Francisco. If she disarms in that city, then her going to that place may have been dictated by other causes. If she coals and leaves port, however, I will be inclined to the belief that the Russian authorities had one or the other of these ends in view in dispatching her to the American coast.

"The statement that the Baltic fleet consists of nine battleships, five cruisers and several torpedo boat destroyers, is misleading. Russia's Baltic fleet is not by any means so formidable as the dispatch would indicate. As a matter of fact Russia has only four new first-class battleships in that fleet. They are the Borodino, Alexander III, Suvaroff and Orel. The Navarin and Sissoi Veliky are old types of battleships, while the Oslabia is officially classified as an armored cruiser. She is a sister ship to the Pobiedia and Peresviet of the Port Arthur fleet. These latter vessels are, however, usually referred to as battleships. Any other vessels in the Baltic fleet that may be classed as battleships are old relics of less fighting value than even our own Texas.

"Of the cruisers in that fleet there is the Aurora, a sister ship to the Pallada and Diana. The Almaz, a sister ship to the Novik, with a speed of 26 knots is also in that fleet, as are two other cruisers, sisters to the cruiser Boyarin, a type larger than the Novik, but three knots slower. The Dimitri Dionski is an old cruiser. It will be seen from this list that the Baltic fleet is not nearly so strong as the dispatches would indicate. Against these Admiral Togo has a fleet of five battleships, eight armored cruisers, and numerous protected cruisers. He has been using two of his newest armored cruisers in line with his battleships, so it can be seen that his preponderance of armored vessels is considerable. Had the Port Arthur fleet managed to account for two or three of the Japanese battleships even at the cost of their entire strength there would have been some chance for the Baltic fleet, but they have apparently been defeated without inflicting any adequate damage in return.

THE CIVIL CASES.

Both Judge De Bolt's and Judge Robinson's courts were in session this morning in preparation for the hearing of the civil list. Judge De Bolt's jury list was called and the jurors were dismissed until tomorrow as the Keonini divorce case is still going on. In Judge Robinson's court the jury was also called but after the usual weeding out process had been accomplished only nine remained and a special venire for fifteen more was issued. The first case set for hearing, Wong Win against Loo Joe has been settled out of court and that of George A. Davis against Libana de Nobrega will be called first.
