Times of the tide are taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at ahala and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu. Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 36 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time whistle blows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 3 hours, 0 minutes. The Sun and moon are for local time for the whole group.

DEMOCRATS START ON KAUAI

KINNEY DISTRIBUTING LITERATURE AND KOLOA IS ORGANIZING CLUBS ON THE ISLAND.

LIHUE, September 12.—The Garden Island says:

W. A. Kinney, chairman of the Democratic Central Committee, has been on Kauai during the past week doing business and politics.

Mr. Kinney distributed democratic literature which explains so that a child may understand why the Democratic party is the greatest party on earth.

We learn that S. K. Kaloa of Honolulu has been on Kauai for a few days in the interest of the Democratic party, and that he organized a Democratic precinct club at Hanalei Friday evening in which rumor says a number of the former Republicans of Hanalei enrolled themselves. We think this a mistake however. It is learned also that Democratic clubs have already been formed at Hanalei, Kapaa and Lihue. The Democrats are doing their work in such a sly manner that the public hear nothing about these clubs until the work is all done. Indeed so effectual in the secret work of forming these clubs that no person except the brave standard bearer of Democracy who escapes to spread the glad tidings knows an iota about the formation of these Democratic organizations.

CHINESE CAUSE UNEASINESS.
