
ITALY'S ROYAL CHRISTENING. Associated Press, Morning Service. ROME, September 17.—The crown prince has been christened Humbert.

THE LOCAL SOLONS

CANDIDATES NAMED FOR THE LEGISLATURE BY THE REPUBLICANS OF OAHU IN THEIR CONVENTIONS LAST NIGHT—FAXON BISHOP, J. M. DOWSETT AND JOHN LANE ARE THE THREE MEN TO RUN FOR THE UPPER HOUSE.

After all the excitement and doing of politics, which has characterized the past couple of weeks of the work of the joint convention of the Fourth and Fifth districts, frustrated last night as above. The convention was held at Progress Hall and next Saturday night the ticket will be raffled at a meeting to be held at the Orpheum.

As was predicted, the fight for the Senatorial nominations was a sharp one. There were four contestants in the field, the three nominated and Cecil Brown but the vote left no possible doubt as to what the meeting desired. It had been expected that E. R. Adams would be put forward as a representative from the Fifth district and had been, he would undoubtedly have made a strong showing. As it was however a caucus was held yesterday afternoon at the King street headquarters of the fifth and a ballot was taken on the names of Adams and John C. Lane. The result was that Lane received 39 votes and Adams 14. Adams at once moved that Lane's choice be made unanimous and that course was adopted.

The convention was called to order promptly at eight o'clock by A. G. M. Robertson, chairman of the Central Committee, the Fourth district delegates occupying the Ewa side of the hall and those from the Fifth the Waikiki side. G. W. Nawaukoa of Ewa was chosen as permanent chairman of the joint convention and the secretaries of the two districts, George Thielan and St. C. Pliannaia were made the permanent secretaries. The roll call showed a full attendance either in person or by proxy, there being 76 from the Fourth and 59 from the Fifth.

George Sea was first on his feet when nominations were called for and he offered the name of J. M. Dowsett for the senatorial ticket, a nomination which was seconded by Lorrin Andrews who ke of Dowsett as a business man with sound sense and a level head. W. C. Roe, offered the name of Cecil Brown who has just entered amid considerable applause and Frank Thompson seconded. J. Kalipoo nominated John C. Lane Faxon Bishop seconding the nomination with an enthusiastic speech. The last nomination was that of E. Faxon Bishop which was made by G. W. Smith.

After the close of the nominations Frank Thompson moved for a recess of five minutes but Lorrin Andrews objected and his view that voting should be immediately proceeded with prevailed. Frank Richardson for the Fourth and Henry Vida for the Fifth were appointed tellers and the first ballot was quickly taken. It resulted as follows: Lane 118, Bishop 95, Dowsett 89, Brown 61. The three nominees were therefore declared to be John C. Lane, E. Faxon Bishop and J. M. Dowsett. They were escorted to the platform and each in turn made a speech thanking the convention for the confidence shown. The convention adjourned in order to allow the District conventions to meet.
