Times of the tide are taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at ahulu, and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu. Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 39 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time whistle blows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 2 hours, 0 minutes. The Sun and moon are for local time for the whole group.

LAHAINA LOCALS.

H. F. Sturtevant, formerly a teacher at the Lahainaluna School, after a long absence is again on duty at that school. At present there are about 210 pupils in the government school—a larger number than at any previous period. The number of voters registered in Lahaina on Wednesday was about 240. Two years ago it was 219. Governor Carter has given the town a new flag, and has authorized the laying of water pipes in the courthouse enclosure.

PERRY AS A PRACTITIONER.

The name of Antonio Perry late associate justice of the Supreme Court, appeared this morning as attorney for the plaintiff in the suit of the Portuguese Mutual Benefit Society of Hawaii against Mary Ann Kahanaikaikai for \$1,000 and interest from February 20, 1902. The money is alleged to be due on a note.

BADLY INJURED BY HORSE.

Fred Melville a youth, sustained a bad compound fracture of one of his legs week before last near Punaluu, Hawaii. His horse fell on him, breaking the leg. He was a mile and a half from any house and lay for four hours, with the horse on him before help came.

IROQUOIS THEATER OPENED.

Associated Press Morning Service. CHICAGO, September 20.—The Iroquois Theater has been reopened with vaudeville.

Late in December of last year the Iroquois Theater, a vaudeville house, was practically destroyed by fire. The fire occurred during a matinee. The flames broke out on the stage and through the failure of a fireproof drop curtain to work, spread to the auditorium of the theater. A panic resulted and 571 people were either suffocated or trampled to death.
