ARMY MAN IN PRISON CELL

NEPHEW OF ROOSEVELT LANDS IN JAIL AFTER STRIKING A HACKMAN.

Lieut. Fortescue who figures in the incident described as below in the Call, is well known in Honolulu. He spent some time at the Moana Hotel when here. The Call says:

Lieutenant Granville R. Fortescue of the Tenth United States Cavalry, a nephew of President Roosevelt, who returned on the steamer Doric from the Orient on Monday after spending some time with the Japanese forces as a special representative of the army, with the object of making a report to Washington on the progress of the war, had the unenviable experience of being confined for six hours in a cell at the City Hall police station yesterday morning. He was arrested on a charge of disturbing the peace, and failing to appear in Judge Cabanis' court yesterday forenoon his bail of \$10 was declared forfeited.

The lieutenant, dressed in a tuxedo suit, had been making a disturbance in Techau's Tavern, on Mason street, and was finally induced to leave about midnight. A hack was standing in front of the entrance and the lieutenant jumped into it. S. G. Lowenberg, the hackman, was in the act of closing the door when the lieutenant came out and demanded to see Lowenberg's license. Lowenberg showed him his badge, but that did not satisfy the lieutenant.

"What are you giving me?" he said, as he shot out his right hand and caught Lowenberg on the jaw. Lowenberg returned the blow and was getting the worst of the encounter when a man with a black mustache went to his assistance. This man was knocked out of business in quick order by the lieutenant, who abruptly left the scene and walked toward Eddy street. He was followed by a crowd, which attracted the attention of Policeman F. W. Handley.

Handley pushed his way through the crowd and asked the lieutenant what was the matter.

"There is nothing the matter," said the lieutenant.

"Well," said Handley, "you seem to be the center of attraction, and there must be something the matter."

"Arrest me, arrest me," angrily retorted the lieutenant. "I am the nephew of the President. I want you to lock me up."

"I shall certainly arrest you," said Handley, "if you don't tell me what's the matter."

The lieutenant again demanded that the officer arrest him, and Handley complied. While waiting for the patrol wagon the lieutenant said to Handley, "I will give you a merry time for this," and Handley told him to go ahead. The lieutenant was driven in the patrol wagon to the City Hall station, where a charge of disturbing the peace was booked against him. He gave his correct name and his occupation as a "soldier." He was locked in a cell, but was released on \$10 cash bail shortly after 6 o'clock in the morning.

FUNERAL OF SHERWOOD.

The funeral of the late Isaac H. Sherwood was held yesterday afternoon from the home of Solomon Mahelona in Kailih. Rev. Mr. Kaubi conducted the services. The following acted as pall bearers: Lieut. T. P. Cummins and Lieut. Dan Kekaulike of the National Guard; Henry Vida and A. St. C. Pihana for the Fifth District Committee; Sam Dwight and James I. Holt of the Order of Kamehameha; G. W. Desha of the Young Hawaiians' Institute; G. W. R. King for the Auditor's office. The line officers and Company C of the National guard were present. The interment was in Nuuanu cemetery.

DEMOCRATS NO LONGER IN IT

THE POLITICAL FIGHT IS NOW BETWEEN THE REPUBLICANS AND HOME RULERS.

There was a representative gathering of Republicans at Emma Square last evening, Clarence Crabbe presiding. A. G. M. Robertson, who was the first speaker, declared that the Democrats are now absolutely out of the fight and that the issue lies now between the Republicans and the Home Rulers. He called on all Republicans and amiable Democrats therefore to vote the straight Republican ticket as voting the Democratic ticket simply meant a help for Notley.

Frank Andrade spoke in both English and Hawaiian making a fervent appeal for support for the straight ticket. Faxon Bishop, Jack Lucas and William Aylett followed along the same lines, the latter making an attack on the so-called Good Government Club which he said was a collection of nobodies. W. W. Harris wound up with an assault on the Home Rule party, which he said had accomplished nothing when it had the power in the house to do much. He pointed out the uselessness of sending a Home Ruler or a Democrat to Washington and concluded with an appeal for the straight ticket.

Cheers for the candidates were given as the meeting broke up.

HISSES GREET BRYAN'S WORDS

NEBRASKA ORATOR MAKES AN UNHAPPY COMPARISON IN SPEAKING OF ROOSEVELT.

KANSAS CITY, Mo., October 27.—William J. Bryan tonight addressed a meeting in Convention Hall.

Part of Bryan's remarks on the Philippine were misunderstood by a large portion of the audience, and it was greeted with hisses which drowned the sound of his voice. Bryan said: "Occasionally I go to Washington city, and I may go there again before next March. If I were walking down Pennsylvania avenue and should drop my pocketbook with my name stamped upon the outside cover, and the President should come along and pick it up, he would keep it if he should treat the matter as he has the Philippine question. He would doubt if I could properly spend my own money to the best advantage to myself, and he would put the pocketbook in his pocket and carry it off, and have a commission appointed to examine it, just as he did the Philippine Islands. He would pay the commission out of the pocketbook, and if the commission reported that it would be unwise to let me have my own money he would keep the pocketbook, just as he has the Philippine Islands."

"The crowd seemed to get a wrong idea of the first part of Bryan's statement, and when he said, 'The President would keep the pocketbook,' he was greeted with loud hisses.

QUITS NAVY FOR PACIFIC MAIL

LIEUTENANT-COMMANDER JUNGENTZ PLACE WITH COMPANY.

NEW YORK, Oct. 25.—Dissatisfied with the compensation given by the Government after thirty years' service in the Navy Lieutenant-Commander Charles Williams Jungentz, executive officer of the battleship Kentucky, will retire from the service and take a high position with the Pacific Mail Steamship Company. Jungentz finds that his salary of \$3500 a year is inadequate pay for the responsibility of caring for a war ship valued at \$5,000,000 and the safety of several hundred lives.


Jungentz is offered a salary far in excess of what he could ever get in the navy and has applied for leave of absence without pay to accept it. Graduated from Annapolis in 1872, he was on the Maine when she was blown up, and was awarded medals for bravery in the Spanish-American war. Though today he expressed regret at leaving the service, he said it was the only course for a man who wanted to amount to anything.
