**KICK AT FREE IMPROVEMENTS**

THE KNOCKER KNOCKS EYEN AT THE BISHOP LOT PARK SCHEME.

The improvement of the vacant lot opposite the Young Hotel is proceeding in good shape and it will not be long before the place will be one of the prettiest spots in the city. This morning a row of young nonclann reginas was planted along the Bishop street frontage. It had originally been intended to plant royal palms but it was thought that the red flowering punctanas will look even better in the position.

"I am surprised to see that the cleaning up of the vacant lots has excited some opposition," remarked Secretary Atkinson this morning, whose idea it first was to make the places attractive. "It is true that the different lots are not owned by the Territory but the work that is being done on them does not increase their value as building properties by a cent. The Territory, by the way, is a tenant at will of the lots so improved. WELL KNOWN ATTORNEY AND POLITICIAN LEFT SUDDENLY ON CHINA.

northern and southern limits, and diving under the East River, make the extreme eastern skirts of Brooklyn as accessible to the great business districts as the apartment-house-crowned heights of Harlem. It is estimated that over this vast system, and those of the Metropolitan Street Railway Company and the Manhattan Elevated Company, will pass annually more than 900,000,000 of passengers. Crossing this huge system of public utilities will be the great \$50,000,000 private tunnel of the Pennsylvania Railway Company, which, crossing the Hudson river from the Jersey shore to Manhattan Island will go under the city dive under the East River and furnish an exit to the great Long Island country. Other links of this giant system are the New York and New Jersey tunnel, the Hudson and Manhattan Railroad tunnel, the New York and Queen's tunnel, the New York Central Terminal tunnel, the Williamsburg Bridge, the Manhattan Bridge and the Blackwells Bridge, involving all told an expenditure of about \$250,000,000.

The rapid transit system proper, however, which includes the present subway and its extensions already authorized, is owned by the city of New York. It has not expended a dollar in its construction, but, as has been said loaned the money for the construction, and the terms provide that it shall be operated by the contracting builders for a period of fifty years, with the privilege of renewing the lease for twenty-five years longer.


