WILL EXHUME MURDERED MAN

PIECE OF CARELESSNESS REPORTED FROM OTHER SIDE OF ISLAND

Chester Doyle and Dr. Judd left this afternoon for Waimanalo for the purpose of exhuming the body of a Japanese who is said to have been murdered by a companion at that place last week. According to the Attorney General's Department, there was a very serious mistake committed by somebody on the other side of the island.

Although the man died it was charged from the effects of wounds inflicted by a countryman and the latter was arrested on a charge of murder and brought to this city absolutely no steps were taken to have any autopsy performed or to secure any medical evidence regarding the nature of the injuries that had caused the man's death. The body was buried without this very necessary fact being ascertained.

Inasmuch as the Jap charged with the crime has to be prosecuted, the attorney general's department has rushed Doyle and Dr. Judd to Waimanalo for the purpose of exhuming the body so that the missing evidence can be secured. It is claimed that the Jap died from wounds on the head inflicted with a bottle.

A HILO VERDICT IS SUSTAINED

TWO JAPANESE CONVICTS FOR MANSLAUGHTER ARE UPHOLD ON APPEAL.

The Supreme court this morning gave a decision overruling the exceptions in the cases of Watanabe and Tatsuro, two Japanese convicted of manslaughter in Hilo. The syllabus contains rules on many points, as follows:

"It is not error to disallow on cross-examination a question asked for the purpose of laying a basis to impeach the witness on an immaterial matter."

"Because of evidence on which doubt of guilt might be based, the court can not say that such doubt ought to have been produced in the minds of the jury."

"The practice of referring to papers filed in a case as part of a bill of exceptions instead of incorporating in the bill copies of papers relied upon is objectionable."

"It is neither requisite nor proper to present for the consideration of the exceptions in this case the exhibits, such as swords, kimonos, etc., which were filed in the trial court."

"It is not error to admit evidence of facts showing motive, or which are part of the transaction, or exhibit a chain of circumstantial evidence of guilt, although such facts showed former offenses of the defendants."

"The court can not pass upon exceptions not presented by the papers in the case. If papers relied upon which were on the files are not there, the defendants' attorneys, on discovering their absence, should apply to the trial court to re-face them. A new trial is not granted on a bill of exceptions on the ground of absence of papers relied on in the bill."
