Senator-elect John C. Laine called on Governor Carter yesterday to announce his intention of resigning his seat in the Board of Health.

The banquet of the Yale-Harvard men will take place at the Young Hotel on the evening of November 16. Other college men will be present.

A pretty dance was given at the Royal Hawaiian Hotel last evening by Col. Macfarlane in honor of the ladies and officers aboard the United States army transport Sherman.

D. M. Kupieha, defeated candidate on the Home Rule ticket, stated yesterday that the Home Rule party would reorganize and plan its work ahead for the county campaign.

Jesse P. Makimal, one of the former leaders of the Home Rule party, a defeated candidate on the Representative ticket in the Fifth on Tuesday, came out as a Republican.

Republicans will probably ratify the victory of Tuesday by holding a monster mass meeting at some convenient place, centrally located. The Orpheum has been suggested, but it is thought it will be too small for this occasion.

Governor Carter, after consultation with District Magistrate Lindsay yesterday issued a commission to Albert F. Judd as Second District Magistrate of Honolulu. The appointment is made to provide against any temporary disability or absence of Judge Lindsay.

The lower section consisted of cement loose in bags, and the upper portion of pounded cement. The water has undermined the wall and the lower part has been washed away. The Ala Moana road is being gradually washed out. Repairs to the wall will probably be made without delay.

GRAFTON'S TRIP POSTPONED

STRAINED RELATIONS BETWEEN RUSSIA AND JAPAN KEEP HER AT ESQUIMAULT.

VICTORIA, B. C., October 28.—The cruise of H. M. S. Grafton, the flagship of the British Pacific squadron, to Honolulu has been indefinitely postponed. According to the programme arranged by Commodore Goodrich some time ago, the Grafton was to leave on this cruise on Tuesday next.

The plan has been cancelled and the date for sailing has not been announced. No reason is given for this officially, but it is understood to be due to the present strained relations between Great Britain and Russia in consequence of the North sea incident.

Unquestionably Commodore Goodrich has received instructions from the admiralty warning him to keep the battleships in his command well in hand pending an emergency.

A full supply of coal was taken on today, however, in spite of the change of order. H. M. S. Bonaventura, now in drydock, is undergoing a slight overhauling, and work on her is being rushed. She will leave the dock tomorrow.

LABEL CASES WERE CONTINUED TODAY

ATTORNEY FOR PROSECUTION GETS ANOTHER CONTINUANCE IN POLICE COURT TODAY.

Another continuance in the libel cases of Charles Nottley, Stephen Umanum and J. Nakookoo the Home Rule politicians was granted this morning by Judge Lindsay in the police court. The continuances were again granted at the request of J. J. Dunne the attorney for the defendants. Dunne was present in court however this morning as was W. A. Kinney attorney to assist in two of the prosecutions. Curtis P. Lauken who had been attacked by Nottley in the alleged libel and Frank Harvey who had been attacked by the other defendants, were present in court. Other leaders of the local Democracy were also present.

Kinney announced to the court that Dunne desired another continuance and the prosecution was willing for such continuance to be granted. The court therefore, continued the three cases until November 17.

There were a number of small offenders in the court for trial. A visit to the Kakaako district was made last night by the High Sheriff in search of Porto Rican vagrants. Several were gathered in and were in court today. Four Porto Ricans were fined \$3 and costs each for having played 7-11.

WANT TO CALL FOREMAN TUCKER

WAIALUA RIOT CASE BEFORE GEAR—QUESTION AS TO NAMES OF DEFENDANTS.

Judge Gear's court had a short session this morning. The Waialua riot case was again up, this time on a motion by the defence for a directed verdict discharging the prisoners on the ground that their names are not correctly given.

Assistant Attorney General Prosser moved that the case of the prosecution be re-opened so that the evidence of Foreman Tucker of the Grand Jury as to the names of the accused as given by the witnesses before the Grand Jury may be put in.

Judge Gear took the matter under advisement and took a recess until this afternoon.

DRIVEN OUT OF HIS HOME

FATE OF A NATIVE WHO HELPED TO EXHUME THE BODY OF YONEHARA.

The Grand jury was in session again this morning when the matter of the killing of the Japanese Yonehara at Waimanalo on the 3rd inst was under discussion. The evidence of several Japanese who were present when the deceased had his fight with Kawano and Iyogo was taken and the report of Dr. J. R. Judd the autopsy surgeon was also submitted. This showed that death was due to bleeding from a slash across the face with some sharp instrument which had completely severed the large artery beside the ear.

From some of the native witnesses who came over from Waimanalo this morning to testify it was learned that a curious fate has overtaken one of the natives who assisted in the exhumation of the body of the murdered man. The body had been buried without examination by a medical man and this necessitated Dr. Judd taking a trip to the scene last Monday in company with Chester Doyle of the Attorney General's department. The Japanese laborers at the plantation refused point blank to have anything to do with the digging up of the coffin and it was only on the inspiration furnished by a little Dutch courage that some natives were

persuaded to do the disinterring. Even then only one, a man named Ku could be had to assist the surgeon in handling the body. The result of this has been that Ku has been utterly ostracised, even his own family refuse to have him in his house and nobody will eat with him.

THE TEXAN IS GOING DIRECT

AMERICAN-HAWAIIAN STEAMSHIP ON HER WAY TO THE FAR EAST.

SEATTLE October 30.—The Hawaiian American Steamship Company's big freighter Texan sailed for the Orient at an early hour this morning with a cargo of American products, largely Puget sound, valued at \$1,000,000. Her heavier and more valuable shipments are billed to Japan, though she has more or less freight for the principal ports of China and the Philippines.

Of steel plate alone the Texan has 1,200 tons, consigned to Japan. Her flour shipment totals 300,000 sacks. Of this Seattle contributed 180,000 while the rest was loaded at Tacoma. Other large Texan shipments were 1,000 bales of cotton, 550 tons of oats, 243,000 feet of lumber, 700 tons of salt salmon, 20 tons of railroad locomotives 570 packages of beer. All told the vessel has a dead weight of 12,000 tons.
