

## WILLIAM'S BIRTHDAY

IMPERIAL GERMAN CONSUL H. ALEXANDER ISENBERG RECEIVES AT THE CONSULATE IN HONOR OF THE DAY—THE ENTIRE BUSINESS COMMUNITY PAYS ITS RESPECTS—GOVERNOR CARTER ONE OF THE EARLY CALLERS.

The annual reception by the German consul in honor of the birthday of Emperor William was held this afternoon at the Hackfeld building from the hours of 12 to 3 p. m. The affair, as usual, was attended by the leading men of the community, there being representatives from the army and navy, territorial and federal governments present, as well as leading professional and business men. The various foreign consuls also called and paid their respects.

The reception was held in the two handsome office rooms in the Waikiki mauka end of the building. H. A. Isenberg, the German consul, received, assisted by J. F. Hackfeld, the former German consul at this place. On the walls were displayed pictures of the Emperor and Empress and also of the Emperor's father accompanied by his military staff during the Franco-Prussian war. Wreaths of mail were about the pictures of Emperor William and Queen Auguste Victoria. At a table were refreshments while cham-



pagne was served to the visitors by attendants. The health of the Emperor was drank by the visitors.

Cigars and cigarettes were served in the other room where the visitors registered their names. Photographs of the members of the royal family including the Crown Prince and his fiancée were displayed.

Emperor William is 46 years of age today and ascended the throne in 1888. It has been the custom for the last 34 years for the local German consul to officially observe the birthday of the German ruler and every year the reception, while held for only a brief time during the day, attracts representatives of the business community to the consulate office. The German flag was displayed on the Hackfeld building today out of honor to the Emperor while the flags at the other foreign consulates were displayed. Among the callers of the diplomatic corps were F. A. Schaefer, the Italian consul and dean of the consular corps; H. Focke, Chilean consul; A. Vizzavona, French consul, and Dr. Marques, secretary to the French consulate; Miki Saito and the vice Japanese consul; Bruce Cartwright, Peruvian consul; W. Lanz, Mexican consul; Chang Tso Fan, Chinese consul, and secretary; W. Pfotenauer, vice consul for Sweden and Norway; H. M. von Holt, consul for the Netherlands; A. Canavaro, Portuguese consul. Governor George R. Carter was among the first callers at the consulate.

Among the naval officers who called were Captain Lyon, commandant of the Naval Station; Lieutenant Commander Sherman of the gunboat Petrel, Lieutenant Commander A. P. Niblack of the U. S. S. Iroquois, Dr. Rossiter, Paymaster Brown and Major Fuller of the local Naval Station, Lieutenant Fewell, Ensign G. P. Brown of the Petrel, and Captain Hamlet of the revenue cutter Bear. Among the army men were Lieut. Colonel John McClellan, Capt. A. B. Farrar, Lieut. W. W. H. Hamilton of Camp McKinley and Capt. Humphrey, depot quartermaster. Dr. Cofer of the Marine Hospital was a caller, as was Collector Stackable. Other Federal officials including District Attorney R. W. Breckons and Marshal Hendry were among those who called and paid their respects. The Hawaiian National Guard was represented by Col. Jones, Col. Soper and other officers. His Lordship Very Rev. Libert and Father Valentin called. The band was in attendance and played during the reception.

This evening a reception and dance will be given at the Moana Hotel by the hotel management. Consul and Mrs. Isenberg will be present but the affair is not an official consulate reception.

# New Senator From Washington

OLYMPIA, Wash., Jan. 27.—S. H. Piles was today elected United States Senator from the State of Washington.

Ten days ago the dispatches said that there had been no choice in the balloting for senator, that Senator Addison Gardner Foster was leading in the balloting and might succeed himself. The dispatch today proves that this hopeful prognostication was not realized for him. The defeat of Senator Foster will be regretted by very many here. He was here two years ago with Senator Burton of Kansas and Senator Mitchell of Oregon, and made a very good impression on the people here. He was born in Belchertown, Mass., January 28, 1837, but lived his boyhood in Illinois. He went to Minnesota in 1859 where he was active in business and in 1875 he went to the then new country of Washington where he has been active in lumber and in the development of coal mines. He was elected to the United States in 1899.

Senator Burton has since been indicted and convicted in connection with receiving bribes for his influence as a senator for the benefit of one of the St. Louis get-rich-quick concerns. Senator Mitchell, the other one of the three senators who came here on the Senatorial Commission, has also been indicted for accepting bribes for using his influence as a senator in the land department, but has not been tried or convicted yet. Now Senator Foster is defeated for re-election.

### LONDON BEETS.

# EVIDENCE IN JONES TRIAL

DEFENCE WILL ADMIT NOTHING AND THE PROSECUTION HAS TO PROVE THE ACCURACY OF THE PLAN OF THE KINAU STREET HOUSE WHERE MRS. JONES AND HER MOTHER WERE SHOT TO DEATH—KANAKANU ON THE STAND.

Owing to the request of the jurors that they be allowed to attend to their private affairs, the taking of evidence in the Jones murder trial did not commence yesterday afternoon as was expected but at ten o'clock this morning the trial proper commenced before Judge Robinson.

Deputy Attorney General Peters opened the case with a long statement as to what the prosecution would prove

# ALLEGED CASE OF CHINESE SLAVE HOLDING

POLICE MAKE RAID ON CHINESE RESORT LAST NIGHT AND UN-EARTH WHAT MAY PROVE SERIOUS VIOLATION OF THE UNITED STATES STATUTES—CHINESE ACCUSED OF OWING SLAVE.

The police have discovered what may prove to be a case of peonage and the matter has been brought to the attention of the Federal authorities.

Soy Lan a Chinese woman, was discovered with a Chinese man last night and the pair arrested on a charge of fornication. The woman who was about 17 years of age, claimed that she was a slave to a Chinese named You Hee. She said that Hee was keeping her in bondage and compelling her to lead a life of shame and turn

her earnings over to him. She claimed that she had been sold to Hee about a year ago.

High Sheriff Henry caused the man to be arrested and has brought the attention of the United States authorities to the matter as the Federal laws provide for the punishment for such offenses. The woman was prosecuted in the police court this morning on a charge of immorality. Her alleged owner was taken into custody to await an investigation by the authorities.

## ALLEGED CONFESSION

H. W. Kinney, a reporter on the Bulletin, went to Attorney General Andrews this morning and stated that Geneau, the U. S. sailor who was fined a dollar for the killing of "Useless" Harris, confessed to him the day after the shooting that he had killed Harris in mistake for Kinnard. He also said that Geneau had a clear recollection of the event the next day so that Geneau's testimony that his mind was a blank must have been false. The Attorney General had the matter placed before the Grand Jury. Kinney was present all through Geneau's trial but made no move at the time to give any evidence. He also professes to have received a confession from Jones who is now on trial for killing his wife.

### PEONAGE CHARGED

Lau Hee, a Chinaman charged with peonage in having kept a woman named Soy Lan in slavery here, was before U. S. Commissioner Judd this afternoon and was demanded for examination until tomorrow. The woman is held as a witness against him.

### TAKES UP WAIALUA BONDS.

The Bank of Hawaii has taken off the hands of Castle & Cooke, all of the bonds of the Waialua Plantation. The bonds secured by the bank were valued at \$275,000 and were bought at par. C. M. Cooke president of the bank stated that the bonds are for sale at 1 1/2 per cent premium. The reason the bank secured the bonds was because it was short of that character of collateral. There is a great demand for bonds now.

### HITCHCOCK HAS RESIGNED.

Rex Hitchcock has resigned as deputy sheriff of the island of Molokai and Lieutenant Sam Leslie has gone to Molokai to take charge of police affairs until a successor to Hitchcock will have been appointed.
