# KONA IS SUFFERING FROM BAD DROUGHT

# THE AUTHOR OF BEN HUI IS DEAD

GENERAL LEW WALLACE, A SOLDIER OF TWO WARS, FAMOUS AS AN AUTHOR, WORTHY AS AN EXECUTIVE, RESPECTABLE AS A DIPLOMAT, AND DISTINGUISHED AS A COMMANDING OFFICER PASSES AWAY AT HIS HOME.

CRAGFORDSVILLE, Ind., February 14.—General Lew Wallace is dead.

General Lewis Wallace, better known as "Lew Wallace" was one of America's most distinguished citizens, a soldier, statesman and author of great ability. He was born in Brookville, Franklin Co., Ind., April 10, 1827, being the son of Governor David Wallace. He was self-educated and early began the study of law. This study was interrupted by the Mexican War in which he served as 2nd Lieut. in Co. H, First Indiana Infantry. After the war he resumed his law studies and located in Covington and later in Crawfordsville, Indiana where he resided until his death.  
In 1852 he married Susan Arnold Elston. At the outbreak of the great Civil War he was among the first to enter the service. He was almost immediately appointed Adjutant General of the State of Indiana, his experience in military and legal matters making him a most valuable man. Soon after he was appointed colonel of the 11th Indiana Volunteers. He served in West Virginia and was promoted to Brigadier General of Volunteers September 3, 1861, and commanded a division at Donelson. On March 21, 1862 he was again promoted, this time to be Major General. He commanded a division at Shiloh.  
In 1863 he prepared defenses at Cincinnati and saved the city from capture at the hands of General Edmund Kirby Smith. Later he was made commander of the Middle Department and the 8th Army Corps and performed conspicuous service in intercepting the march of General Jubal Early on Washington. He forced the Confederate general to fight the battle of Monocacy and saved the national capital, July 9, 1864. Gen. Wallace was the second member of the court that tried the assassins of President Lincoln and was president of the court that tried and convicted Henry Wirz, commandant of Andersonville prison. He was mustered out in 1865.  
He was Governor of New Mexico in 1878-81, U. S. Minister to Turkey, 1881-85. He will be principally remembered for his books. Among them were "Ben Hur, A Tale of the Christ," 1880; "Life of General Benjamin Harrison," 1888; "The Fair God," 1873; "The Boyhood of Christ," 1889; "The Prince of India," 1895; "The Wooing of Malkatoot," 1898. A few months ago it was announced that the general was suffering from cancer and that he was doomed. Like General Grant, with the consciousness that he had but a few weeks to live, he spent his last days in trying to complete his autobiography. Whether he won the race with death is yet to be learned.

## PACIFIC HEIGHTS SALE CONTESTED

DESKY CLAIMS THAT THE PROPERTY DID NOT BRING A SUFFICIENT PRICE.

Judge Robinson gave a hearing yesterday afternoon to settle the question of the confirmation of the sale of Pacific Heights, a protest against confirmation having been filed by Desky, on the ground that the price realized, \$1,500, is insufficient. The commissioner who conducted the sale, M. T. Simonton, reported against confirmation on the same grounds.  
The sale of the property for \$1,500 leaves a deficiency of \$56,163, on the bonds and interest on account of which the foreclosure was undertaken. C. G. Ballentyne was the purchaser of all the property except a condenser which A. Dreier bought for \$100. The property includes wires, tracks, motors, right of way, etc., and is declared by Desky in his protest against the confirmation to be worth much more than the amount bid for which it was sold.

## YESTERDAY IN THE LEGISLATURE

THE SENATE.  
President Isenberg called the Senate to order yesterday afternoon at 2 p. m. Senator Gandall, for the committee on rules asked for time until this morning to report, which was granted.

Senator Achi wanted to know if there was any reason why bills might not be introduced before the Governor's message was received.  
The President did not know of any rule to the contrary, but thought it would be only proper to wait until the legislature was organized and ready for business, as well as be in possession of the governor's message.

Senator Paris moved to adjourn till tomorrow morning, but accepted an amendment offered by Senator McCandless to adjourn for one hour which carried.  
Senator Dickey gave notice that he would introduce bills as follows:  
A local option bill.  
A bill to provide for the trial of juvenile offenders.  
A bill to provide for the incorporation of cities.  
A bill relating to the examination of trial jurors.  
A bill relating to spitting.

Later, under suspension of rules, Senator Dickey introduced the Cities, the Jurors and the Local Option bills in the order just given.  
Senator Achi in the meantime was interrupted, when asking leave to introduce a bill, by the announcement of a message from the Governor. It was a bill to amend Sec. 202, Civil Laws, relating to income from public lands.  
Senator Bishop introduced a bill to set apart certain land as public parks. All of the foregoing bills went on their being with first reading, by title, all other being referred to the printing committee.  
The Governor's message having been received, an attempt to dispense with the reading of it in its entirety, as was done in the lower house, proved unsuccessful. Assistant Clerk Silva went to work on the reading and was later assisted by Senator Dickey. They had read 20 pages when four o'clock came and the Senate rose until 10 this morning.

At yesterday afternoon's session of the House on the balloting for Messenger there were thirty-one votes cast and Speaker Knudsen made a novel ruling by instructing the Clerk to draw out one of the ballots and throw it aside. This was done, and the unlucky one was A. Recard who thus lost a vote. Duncan was elected with 10 votes, Recard getting 9. Only for the mistake he would have tied Duncan. Karratt scored 4 and Kahalekaula 4.  
For Janitor the following were nominated: F. K. Corbett, J. K. Palaina, S. H. Meekapu, J. K. Naholo and Naholowa. Meekapu was elected by 12 votes, Naholo standing second with 7.
