**LANE LEPER BILL**

The Lane leper bill provides, after the enacting clause:

"That the Board of Health shall make application to any District Magistrate for a warrant for the arrest of any person within his jurisdiction who has the disease of leprosy, such application shall be sworn to and shall state the ground upon which the charge of leprosy is based. And if the magistrate shall be satisfied therewith, he shall issue a warrant for the arrest of such person, directing that he be detained for medical examination at such place as the Board of Health may provide. The Board of Health shall thereupon immediately designate a physician to make such examination. The person so detained shall have the right to choose, at his own expense any licensed physician to act with the physician designated by the Board, and it shall be the duty of these two physicians to choose a third, and the three shall make the examination.

"In the event of a failure on the part of the two physicians to choose a third, the governor shall, upon being informed of such failure, immediately designate the third physician. The decision of any two of said physicians shall be final as to whether or not such person has leprosy."

The bill provides further for the discharge of the suspect in case of the failure of the physicians to agree, and for the pay of the doctors.

**AFTERNOON SESSION**

THE SENATE.  
At the afternoon session the governor's salary bill was referred to the Finance Committee and the departmental expenditures appropriation bill went to the Committee on Public Lands. These were introduced from these committees, passed to first reading and went to the Printing Committee.

Then the Senate seemed to come to a deadlock for a little while, waiting for Paul to purchase some paper upon which he was engaged, and so took a recess for ten minutes.

Achi and Dickey came in during the recess, and were told by President Lauberok jocularly that they would be fined \$5 each for being late. It was suggested by the President that a luncheon fund might be raised by fining senators one dollar apiece for tardiness.

gregate lepers, and it passed first reading, and referred to the printing committee.

Senator Dickey introduced a bill providing for the registration of title to lands by executors and trustees under wills. Passed first reading and referred to printing committee.

Aebi introduced a bill to provide for support of families of persons deceased out of their estates. Passed first reading and referred to the printing committee.

The Senate then adjourned until tomorrow at 10 a. m.

**THE HOUSE.**

In the afternoon, upon the presentation of the Governor's communication respecting appropriations for salaries and departments, Rep. Harris suggested that the list should be printed. Rep. Coelho thought that it would be an unnecessary expense for both Senate and House to have the governor's communications printed.

It was agreed that the matter should be referred to the Printing Committee with the suggestion that the Printing Committee of the Senate should be consulted on the idea of dividing the expense.

Rep. Coelho moved a resolution that the Secretary of the Territory should be asked to provide copies of the Session Laws of 1903.

Rep. Harris seconded the motion but Rep. Smith objected on the score of economy. The copies would cost \$90. The motion carried.

Rep. Kaniho gave notice of motion of bills to repeal the act respecting compulsory vaccination; to prevent any one to treat leprosy without license; to amend the poll tax law; to regulate the sale of goods, wares and merchandise; to license tailoring and dress-making establishments; to repeal the present system of disposition of the school and road taxes. The bill passed their first reading by title.

Representative Kalelopu introduced bills to amend the laws respecting the treatment of leprosy; to amend the laws respecting internal taxes and to amend the laws respecting public lands.

The following appropriations for North Hilo were asked by a resolution introduced by Representative Fernandez: \$2,000 water pipes at Laupahoehoe, \$3,000 widening Laupahoehoe pail, \$3,000 widening Kaawali pail, \$2,000 repairing Waipunale bridge, \$15,000 roads and bridges, general. The House adjourned at 2:55.


