CARRINGTON IN FOR LIFE. MANILA, February 21.—Carrington has been sentenced to six years' imprisonment on five charges of twelve years each.

CORTELYOU BACK. NEW YORK, February 21.—Cortelyou has returned from Europe.

MORE TROUBLE IN RUSSIA. ST. PETERSBURG, February 21.—Martial law has been declared at Tsarskoe-selo on account of threatening letters to the Czar. (Tsarskoe-selo is the palace, thirty miles from St. Petersburg, where the Czar went when the strikes became threatening.)

THE GRAND DUKE'S ASSASSIN. MOSCOW, February 21.—The assassin of the Grand Duke Sergius is believed to be a man of good birth. He is not a workman.

THREATENS BALFOUR MINISTRY. LONDON, February 21.—The Irish party demands unconditional home rule. Redmond in the Commons assailed the Government's policy and the ministerial majority is seriously endangered. It is reported that the Earl of Dudley has resigned the Lord Lieutenancy of Ireland.

WHAIVES AND VESSELS ABLAZE. BOSTON, February 21.—A fire at the Charlestown docks has communicated to the Atlantic steamers Philadelphia and Dalton Hall, almost destroying half a million dollars' worth of property.

THE NAVAL PROGRAM. WASHINGTON, February 21.—The House has agreed upon two new battleships and will pass a naval appropriation bill of \$99,000,000.

A TANTALUS TRIP

WEEKLY HAWAIIAN CROP REPORT

For the Week ending February 18, 1905. Honolulu, T. H., Feb. 20, 1905. GENERAL SUMMARY.

Temperatures again fell considerably below the normal during the week, the nights being very cold, although the days were fairly warm and sunny. For this season of the year, remarkably dry weather has prevailed throughout the entire group, no rain of importance having fallen even in the windward districts.

Growing cane and other crops have made moderate progress, but shortage of water has become general, seriously interfering with the harvesting of cane in many sections and causing the entire suspension of cane grinding in the Puna district of Hawaii and the Kipahulu district of Maui. Pastures in all of the islands are dry and short and grazing stock is falling off generally in consequence. Pineapples are growing fairly well, but soil is much in need of rain. The setting out of rice continues, and the shortage of water has apparently not yet affected the growing plants, which are doing fairly well. Coffee has blossomed heavily in the Puna district of Hawaii, but only slightly in Kona, and the trees need rain in all sections. Renewed activity on the part of the leafhopper in the young cane of the Hilo district is reported.

IMMIGRATION IS DROPPING OFF

Copies of the annual report of Commissioner-General of Immigration F. P. Sargent have been received at the local immigration office. The report is very extensive in character being composed of 195 pages of text and tables in addition to numerous charts illustrative of the details of immigration to the United States. The report is for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1904.

The total number of immigrants arriving in the United States during the period was 812,870 a decrease of 44,176 from that of the previous year. Of this decrease considerable was noticed at the port of Honolulu for from 4,550 in 1903, the immigrants admitted at Honolulu during 1904, dropped to 9,854. Of the immigrants admitted at Honolulu 82 per cent were Japanese. The decrease in Japanese immigration was due to the Japanese war.

The number of registered Chinese laborers leaving Honolulu during the year was 287 and returning from China 220.
