## IN THE SENATE

on the table to be considered with the bill.

Dickey introduced a bill to compel the placing of fire escapes on buildings. Passed first reading.

Hayseiden introduced a resolution for the appointment of a committee of five to confer with the House health committee to seek to arrange for an amicable settlement of the Molokai Junket tangle.

McCandless opposed the resolution. The House had already turned the Senate down in this matter. He did not think it was dignified for the Senators to go on their knees and ask to be allowed to go on a boat where they were not wanted. The Senate could charter a steamer and go itself for \$100 paying its own fare.

"If the House wants the Senate to go, it is up to the House to ask us," said Paris. "The overture should not come from us."

Hayseiden defended his resolution in the interest of peace. He said the House had asked the Senate to take part in the trip, but the assertion was questioned.

It seemed to Paris that the Senate would be placed in rather a bad position to appoint another committee, after the House had already tabled one resolution. The Senate should preserve its own dignity. It was the duty of the House to take the first request of the Senate from joint action from the table.

Achl sided with Paris and McCandless charging the House with discourtesy and disrespect for the Senate. He thought if the Senate wanted to go, it should charter a steamer of its own. Dickey spoke for the Hayseiden resolution in the interest of peace and then on motion of Paris the resolution was tabled.

McCandless introduced a joint resolution to change the name of the avenue leading from King street to Kapolani Park to Kalakaua avenue in honor of the king's memory. Passed without dissent.

Dowsett introduced a bill to amend the game law. Read first time by title.

Governor Carter's veto of the leprosy divorce bill was first on the order of the day. The message was read and Achl moved the passage of the law over the veto, claiming that the governor was wrong in stating that the bill was not properly drawn. According to Achl's argument there is no law now for holding leper suspects and in admitting that persons suspected were being held the governor admitted that his agents was violating the law.

Hayseiden said that Achl was right and Bishop wanted the message read again. Then it was discovered that the Senate had no copy of the bill as it finally passed and action was deferred until tomorrow.

Senate Bill 54, the branch bank license bill, came next on third reading. Bishop as the introducer of the bill offered an amendment permitting the license to be fixed in the regular license bill. This makes the bill simply one to authorize the establishment of branch banks. The provision excepting Hilo from the operation of the law was also stricken out. The bill then passed third reading. Brown, Hayseiden and Hewitt voting against it.

Senate bill 70, the second hand dealers' license bill, on third reading was referred to the judiciary committee.

Senate bill 78, to provide for the appointment of a Board of Immigration, passed third reading without dissent.

## SIBERIA WITH SEVENTY PEOPLE

with the county act is now before the house and has to be passed upon before we can do anything. Supposing such a committee should be appointed and should go to the bankers what would be the result? They would ask what amount would be realized by taxation in the various counties, and as we are now, the committee could not answer the very first question. I move that the resolution be tabled.

"Kokun," shouted the House and there was another of the Senate's innocents slaughtered.

Treasurer Campbell submitted a report respecting the number and names of applicants for liquor licenses in Hawaii.

A communication was received from the Senate relative to Senate bill 35, a bill respecting the duties of registrars of conveyances. The amendments made by the House did not suit the Senate and a conference committee consisting of Senators Achl, Dickey and Brown was appointed. The House on Harris' motion, authorized the Speaker to appoint a similar number to act on the committee.

Speaker Knudsen appointed Long, Kaleiopi and Kaniho as the House's members of the committee.

The Committee on Public Lands and Internal Improvements reported on the following matter:

For repairing Puuhoo-Kawaihae road, \$15,000. (Kanlio). Recommended.  
For improving Lahaina water works, \$3,000. (Pali). Recommended.  
For macadamizing Pahoa-keohe road, \$8,000; for constructing Malama-Ophika-Kamali road, \$5,000; for Pohiki-Kaimu road, \$6,000. (Lewis). Recommended.  
For macadamizing Road E off Sheridan street, Honolulu, \$1,500. (Harris). Recommended.

For maintaining and improving Moehau Park, Hilo, \$5,000. (Lewis). Recommended that \$3,000 be appropriated.

The Finance Committee submitted a letter received from the Clerks of the Circuit Court of the First Circuit submitting that as clerks they receive no perquisites but that what extra work they do is done in their own time without interfering with their duties.

Kalio introduced a resolution for the purpose of taking three physicians to the Leper Settlement in order to examine any persons there who may wish to be examined.

Greenwell drew attention to the fact that the visit to the Settlement would be but of a few hours duration and suggested that it would be better to send the doctors at some time when they would be able to make a complete examination.

Action was deferred for a day.

The Health Committee reported that it had made arrangements for transportation to the Leper Settlement on the steamer Kinau on the terms previously reported. The boat will leave here at 10 p. m. on Saturday, March 18, returning leaving the Settlement at dark Sunday evening.

"And," added the report, "as this mission is to a certain extent a matter of common interest, the committee recommends that this House, through its clerk, extend a hearty invitation to the President and members of the Senate to join us in this trip of investigation."

The House grinned to itself over the neat reproof administered to the august body upstairs and passed the report.

The Finance Committee recommended the indefinite postponement of Holstein's bill exempting from license fees those who sell salted, corned or jerked beef. The report was tabled to be considered with the bill.

The Finance Committee recommended the passage of Holstein's bill to repeal Sections 94 and 95 of Act 64, 1896, with the amendment that Section 1406 of the Act be stricken out.

CoeHo made a feeling allusion to the late Mrs. Stanford and moved that when the House adjourned today it should do so until 11 o'clock tomorrow in order to permit members of the House who had been students at Stanford University or who wished to do honor to the memory of the deceased lady by attending the services.

Holtsein acknowledged that every respect should be shown by the House to Mrs. Stanford's memory but thought that the business of the House should be continued. He moved that a select committee of three should be appointed to represent the House.

CoeHo refused to make the matter a subject of debate and withdrew his motion.

Judge Mathewman has grown tired of his billet and wrote to Governor Carter recently stating that he intended to resign in the near future.

The governor said this morning that he had not yet selected a successor to District Magistrate Lindsay, who has been nominated for the second circuit judgeship of the First Circuit. It is believed that Mathewman would have a good chance to get the position if he

## DID NOT DIE OF STRYCHNINE

Dr. David Starr Jordan today expressed his positive opinion that Mrs. Stanford did not die of strychnine. Dr. Jordan is a doctor of medicine as well as a doctor of philosophy, and as such he reached the conclusion from a study of the symptoms in the case that death was not due to strychnine poison. This opinion has been confirmed by the facts which have been adduced showing the smallness of the amount of strychnine taken by the deceased.

"Since I have learned that not more than an ordinary medicinal dose of strychnine was taken," said Dr. Jordan, "I have been confirmed in the opinion I had formed from the symptoms, that the case was not one of strychnine poisoning. This, of course, accords with my personal feelings."

## IN SUGAR TRUST AWAITING TEXAN

The price of sugar has dropped considerably within the last few days. There is a tendency on the part of some to assign this change in quotation to the fact that the S. S. Texan with a big cargo of 11,000 tons of sugar is nearing the market. However the Texan is not within three weeks of Delaware Breakwater so this charge against the Sugar Trust of forcing the price down in order to depreciate the

value of the Texan's cargo, is not apparently well founded.

There is a glut now in the shipment of Ewa sugar. The railway warehouses contain a large quantity of Ewa sugar and the warehouse at the plantation is also being used to store the stuff. There are no bottoms in the harbor at present to take the sugar so the stuff is piling up. However the glut will soon be relieved by the arrival of vessels after sugar cargoes.
