lors, one each for Maui and Hawaii and the other for this island and city and Kauai.

The three inspectors had had the duties prescribed by statute for the inspector general, said Atkinson in reply to questions, except that they had not the power of discharging teachers. The inspector for this island hands in a daily report, when in Honolulu, of his observations in the schools. When away he sends in a distinct report from each school, besides filling out a printed form which I prepared, and sending it to me by the first mail he can catch. The other inspectors do the same. "The reports are on file and may be seen by anyone who wants to see them," said the Superintendent. "I have regularly received the reports and replied to them."

The inspectors also report on the conditions, sanitary and other, of the schools, upon the efficiency of the teachers and all other matters connected with the schools. As to the relation between the inspectors and school agents the Superintendent said that the school agent and inspector combined, could if satisfied that it was proper to do so, suspend a teacher subject to the approval of the Board of Education. They consulted with one another.

Atkinson said he would like to supply a copy of his instructions and regulations for inspectors, prepared when they began work, and a copy of the document was sent for.

"What are the functions of a school agent?"

"To look after school buildings, sign pay rolls and report to me or the Board of Education. I should say, any dereliction of duties on the part of teachers, or any other information proper for us to receive."

Atkinson stated that when he was inspector it was not possible to visit each school more than once a year, but under the present plan inspectors were able to make an average of three visits a year. "It is utterly impossible for our men to visit all the schools as I tried to do when inspector."

AFTER THE KENNEDY

PETREL LEFT MIDWAY LAST NIGHT AND WILL SEARCH FOR SCHOONER.

The gunboat Petrel left Midway for Honolulu last night at 7 o'clock. The vessel will not come straight to this port, however, but will take about ten days to the run, as she is to search for the missing schooner C. Kennedy which is considerably overdue. Many people are beginning to fear that the Kennedy has been wrecked on Laysan Island if not a worse fate overtaken her.

Should the Petrel find no trace of the schooner, the search is not to be given up. The revenue cutter Bear will be dispatched on a search for the schooner if the Petrel reports finding nothing of the little vessel. The Bear has been on duty here for some months and the possible cruise to the westward will be the most extensive trip she has taken since stationed in these waters.

get at the guilty party who, under the cloak of his official capacity as a member of the Board of Health was making a profit for himself, yet the Federal legislation was sufficient. If the place was being conducted so as to create abuses, it should be notified. They could reach the parties without going at it in that public manner.

Paris said that in that matter he thought it was the duty of the Senate to take it up, no matter how repugnant it might be. It might fairly be given to a committee.

HENRY ON IWILEI

"I have held the matter of these prostitutes in abeyance," said High Sheriff Henry today, "until the Legislature should meet and take some action if it desired, in enacting laws governing them. I believe that the prostitutes should be segregated. Captain Paul Smith has been placed in charge at Iwilei and told to require the women to have cards showing that they had been examined by a physician. So far as their having been forced to go to Dr. Cooper by the police that is untrue. I do not care who they go to, but I believe that they should go to some doctor. I have desired to keep them in one section as much as possible."

OPPOSES SECRET INVESTIGATIONS

REPRESENTATIVE NAKUINA DECLARES HIMSELF ON METHODS OF THE JOINT COMMITTEE.

Representative Nakuina is opposed to the holding of any secret investigation of the affairs of the Department of Public Instruction.

He stated this morning that he had used very means to persuade the committee to open the doors during the present enquiry but without success. He handed representatives of the press the following statement for publication:

"I am in favor of a public investigation and am still urging the committee to allow the public to be present at all of its meetings, for the following reasons:

"1. The Grand Jury report on the Department of Public Instruction having been published in the newspapers it is therefore public property.

"2. Nothing can be gained by secret meetings, but they may give the impression that whoever in under investigation is being unfairly dealt with, not being allowed a hearing, or having a chance to contradict or explain some supposed damaging evidence.

"3. Testimony that can not stand the light of publicity is not worth considering, nor is it creditable to the person or persons giving it.

"4. I was publicly charged in the Legislative hall, that I am unfit to investigate charges against the Department of Public Instruction because I am related to one of the officials. A public investigation will absolve me from such a charge, but a secret meeting will give the impression that I am helping to suppress any evidence that might be damaging to my supposed relative.

"5. The public are more interested and have more rights as a collective whole in the investigation of the Board of Education now taking place than either the legislature or the administration. Then why have secret sessions?"
