

# JUDD SAYS THERE WAS NO GRAFT

## CLOSE OF EDUCATION INQUIRY

Judd's investigation of the Department of Education closed this afternoon unless there are further developments calling for testimony, and Judd made a statement at once utterly opposing the insinuations of "graft" contained in the Public Accounts committee's report to the House. When the investigation was called this afternoon Judd announced that he was practically through, but J. J. Dunne, attorney for the department, asked for further inquiry into the matter of vouchers. He said that the House committee report insinuated, at least, that in the cases of some vouchers there had been corruption on the part of someone. The matter should be gone into further, said Dunne, if there was any question about it.

Judd replied that his examinations of the vouchers and his investigations of them, together with those of the expert accountant employed, had quite convinced him that there was absolutely no cause for any such imputations. He was ready to officially report on the matter.

Dunne replied that it was very gratifying to hear such an expression, and this practically closed the proceedings. Judd had some questions to ask the auditor, regarding the manner of examining the records of the department.

Judd's report will be made in writing to the governor. It is believed from questions that he has asked, that he will suggest that some of the laws under which the department has proceeded be changed, also that changes be made in the accounts and auditing system.

## HENRY GAVE THE ORDER

INSTRUCTED THE IWILEI WOMEN SOME TIME AGO TO MOVE TO CERTAIN LOCALITIES AND LATER COUNTERMANDED THE ORDER, SAYS CAPTAIN PAUL SMITH—SENATE COMMITTEE MAKING INVESTIGATION THIS AFTERNOON.

The Senate committee on the Iwilei matter had as witnesses this afternoon former High Sheriff A. M. Brown, Captain Paul Smith, who is the officer in charge of the district now, and C. Shiozawa, editor of Hawaii Shimpo. The sessions were private during the early part of the meeting but when a protest was made the committee opened its doors.

Captain Smith testified that Sheriff Henry had given an order that all the women in the district be made to live on the Ewa side of Iwilei road. Smith said that when he took charge Henry gave him a positive order that the women must all remove to the prescribed limits.

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## Imposing Funeral Of Mrs. Stanford

STANFORD UNIVERSITY, Palo Alto, March 24.—The funeral services over the remains of the late Mrs. Jane L. Stanford were held today in the University Memorial Church, after which the body was placed in the mausoleum. Ten thousand people attended. The speakers were Rev. J. W. Dinsmore and Rev. C. C. Brown. The others participating in the services were Rabbi Voorsanger, Bishop Nichols, Rev. Guthrie, Rev. Dille and Rev. Hill. There was only one vase of flowers in the church but the mausoleum was covered with splendid floral tributes.

The memorial church from which the funeral services were held is said to be the most elaborate church in the world in the character and extent of its mosaics and other mural decorations. It was designed by the famous architect Richardson of Boston. To the elaborate decoration Mrs. Stanford devoted the proceeds of her jewels.

The mausoleum, in which the body was laid, is a massive structure in Doric architecture, of Carrara marble and polished granite. Within it repose the bodies of her husband and son. It is about a mile north of the principal university buildings. The Memorial Chapel is within the Quadrangle.

## Henry And Iwilei

DID HE PROMISE NOT TO PROSECUTE IWILEI WOMEN IF THEY WOULD LOCATE IN A DESIGNATED PLACE AND FOLLOW RULES HE PRESCRIBED?—JAPANESE PAPERS HERE CONTAINED THE SUPPOSED ORDERS FROM HIM.

Several months ago the local Japanese press contained statements attributed to High Sheriff Henry to the effect that if the Japanese women engaged in unlawful business in Iwilei district would all move to the Ewa side of the Iwilei road they would not be prosecuted. The papers also informed their subscribers that the sheriff would require them to follow the medical inspection system since established and now being investigated by a Senate committee.

Hawaii Shimpo, edited by C. Shiozawa contained an interview with the High Sheriff on the subject. It said that the sheriff had stated that he would not prosecute the women who occupied the Ewa side of the Iwilei road. He did not want to assume to say that he recognized their business, but he would not prosecute if they complied with his conditions.

S. Anno, editor of Shin Nippon, published a similar statement. It assumed to be the sheriff's directions to the Iwilei prostitutes, that they must all reside on the Ewa side of the Iwilei road and must follow the directions already referred to regarding inspections.

In the hearing yesterday before the Senate committee, Henry denied having given any orders that the women occupy a certain place. The Senate committee, it is said, will call Japanese editors, of the Shimpo and Nippon and other papers which have published articles about Iwilei, as witnesses regarding the alleged directions of the sheriff.

## Refuse To Deliver Cargo Of Nebraskan

THE STEAMER ORDERED TO PREPARE TO SAIL TO NEW YORK TO MAKE DELIVERY THERE—CLAIM THAT THE TRUST DELIBERATELY JUGGLED QUOTATIONS TO GET THIS CARGO AT A LOWER PRICE.

SAN FRANCISCO, March 17.—Business was fairly active, but sales of stocks were largely confined to small parcels. Values, however, were with few exceptions, well sustained and the market, while quiet, was not devoid of interest.

Sugar stocks were represented in the sales to a moderate extent only, holders generally refraining from offering and having ideas of values considerably above the present quoted rates. Probably the most interesting feature was the refusal of the owners of the cargo of raw sugar which arrived on the steamer Nebraskan on Tuesday to deliver to the purchasers here on the ground that the quotation was a fake figure, juggled intentionally by the sugar trust for the express purpose of making the price on this particular cargo 4 7/8c. per lb. The owners promptly ordered the steamer to make ready to sail for New York and make delivery there. In order to show how completely the sugar trust is manipulating prices it may be stated that yesterday the price on raw sugar was advanced to 5c. in New York and as that market rate is the governing element in paying for the cargoes arriving at this port it is probable that the Nebraskan's cargo of about 7000 tons will now be delivered here. It is also worthy of note that the sugar trust did not want the Nebraskan to sail for New York. The voyage would require quite a long time and the trust is well aware of the fact that raw sugar is almost sure to be considerably higher about the middle of the year. Hence the sudden advance to 5c. yesterday. The day's advices from New York stated that regned sugar was unchanged and in good demand while raw sugar was also steady. Beet sugar was advanced 3-4d. in London for spot cash sales, while April delivery was steady.
