Times of the tide are taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at Kahuili and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu, Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 30 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 30 minutes. The time whistle blows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 0 hours, 0 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.

U. S. Department of Agriculture, Weather Bureau.

The following data, covering a period of 30 years have been compiled from the Weather Bureau and McKibbin records at Honolulu, T. H. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed during the month in question, for the above period of years, but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

Mean or normal temperature, 73.
The warmest month was that of 1893 with an average of 75.
The coldest month was that of 1895, with an average of 71.
The highest temperature was 86 on April 25th, 1892.
The lowest temperature was 59 on April 21st, 1899.

Precipitation (rain 1877-1894 incl.)
Average for the month, 2.55 inches.
Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more 13.
The greatest monthly precipitation was 7.95 inches in 1890.
The least monthly precipitation was 0.75 inches in 1883.

Clouds and Weather (1883-1904, incl.)
Average number of clear days, 11;
partly cloudy days 13; cloudy days, 6.
Wind (1875-1904, incl.)
The prevailing winds have been from the northeast.

THE HOUSE.
The health committee reported favorably on Coelho's bill for the appropriation of a sufficient sum to pay government physicians throughout the territory.
The Judiciary committee reported on Broad's bill relating to the manufacture of pol, with minor amendments.
A resolution was introduced by Long to the effect that as it is reported that a natural reservoir exists at the head of Manoa Valley from which a large amount of water could be obtained at small cost by gravitation, a special committee of three members be appointed to visit the spot and report on all matters concerning the place and the probable cost of its acquisition.
Harris' bill respecting the relief of private corporations from the necessity of filing annual statements of their affairs with the Treasurer, which was debated yesterday came up for third reading. Harris moved the bill's passage and Rice moved indefinite postponement. Rice's motion was lost and the bill was further deferred until Monday on Harris' motion.
The House was notified of the Governor's veto of Senate bill 39 relating to the protection of owners of marked bottles, boxes and similar retainers. Action on the veto was deferred for a day.

TO BEGIN HARBOR WORK.
Lieutenant Slattery has been ordered by the War Department to proceed with the plans and specifications for the dredging of Honolulu harbor and the survey for improvements at Hilo Harbor.
