

BUYING HOTELS

REPORT THAT ALEXANDER YOUNG HAS SECURED A CONTROLLING INTEREST IN THE HAWAIIAN HOTEL ALSO AND WILL RUN IT IN CO-OPERATION WITH THE YOUNG AND MOANA, CLOSING IT PART OF THE YEAR.

According to a persistent rumor in Honolulu, Alexander Young has bought the Royal Hawaiian Hotel as well as the Moana, or has acquired a controlling interest in the Hawaiian and intends to run all three establishments in co-operation. The plan is said to be to close the Hawaiian entirely during eight months of the year, opening it for the tourist season, as is done with many hotels in Florida and other tourist resorts, where many of the largest hotels are only open four months in the year.

O. Carter, who has just been made treasurer of the new Hawaiian Hotel Company stated that there had been no dealings with Young in the matter at all. "There has not even been a negotiation with Mr. Young as far as I am aware," he said. The report is that Young has acquired interests of bondholders of the Hawaiian sufficient to control the concern. The bonds, in view of the sale under foreclosure, are practically dead and useless, but the holders of them will be the holders of stock in the new corporation now in process of formation. By acquiring the interests of the bondholders therefore, Young might be in a position to control the new company. Mark P. Robinson has been chosen president and J. O. Carter treasurer of the new corporation.

SCHILLER CENTENNIAL

ANNIVERSARY OF GREAT POET WILL BE CELEBRATED BY LOCAL GERMANS NEXT SATURDAY.

The Schiller centennial anniversary will be celebrated throughout the world on Sunday. Schiller's name is always coupled with that of Goethe, as the two greatest German poets, and Schiller is perhaps the more popular. The anniversary will be celebrated locally by the German School Association on Sunday, May 7, from 3 to 5 o'clock in the afternoon. The program will include numbers by a quartette composed of W. H. M. Noel, Carl Busch, H. Puck, and Representative Carl Smith of Hilo. Their numbers will be a Sonata from Hayden, and a Sereno from Mozart. A. Falke will be the pianist and accompanist, and Carl Busch the leader. Other numbers on the program will be a duet by Mr. and Mrs. A. Constable, a violin solo by Carl Busch, and an address by Pastor Felmy. Refreshments will be served and all Germans interested are invited.

FIGHTING FOR CUSTODY OF CHILD

MRS. HALL CLAIMS THAT HER HUSBAND FORCIBLY TOOK THELMA AWAY FROM HER.

An application was made to Judge Lindsay this morning by Wilhelmina B. Hall for an order restraining her husband J. K. Hall from taking away from the islands their daughter Thelma also for the payment of attorney's fees and temporary alimony. According to the allegations of the complainant Mrs. Hall filed an action for divorce against Hall on March 20. Until May 3 she had the custody of their daughter, Thelma on that date Hall is alleged to have forcibly taken the child away from the mother and since kept the child. The libellant claimed that she feared Hall intended to remove from the jurisdiction of these islands and she asked for the custody of the child and an order restraining Hall from taking the child away. The temporary order was issued and the hearing set for May 8.

APANA MUST QUIT

Apana, the Chinese police officer, will have to retire from the force, it is said, as a result of his being adjudged guilty of unlawful cohabitation. He pleaded guilty to an indictment for this offense this morning in the federal court, and was fined \$100 and costs. Apana's case has been well known for some time, but he has remained a member of High Sheriff Henry's force, but now the law will compel his retirement. The federal statute says that no man found guilty of the offense for which Apana was fined shall be eligible to hold any office.

JUDGE GEAR RETURNING

FRIENDS SAY HE MAY RUN FOR SUPERVISOR OF OAHU COUNTY—HE IS TO RETURN TO HONOLULU ON THE STEAMSHIP KOREA WHICH IS DUE TO LEAVE SAN FRANCISCO TOMORROW.

Ex-Judge Gear is coming back to Honolulu on the Korea next week, and it is said that he will go into politics and run for supervisor of Oahu county. The judge has been in San Francisco for over 3 months, during which his term as judge expired, and it was reported that he intended to remain there and enter the law business. A report has now been received, however, that he has arranged to come back here, and will leave on the steamer which starts tomorrow.

JAPANESE HAVE ROW AT PUULOA

CLAIMED THAT NUMBER OF MEN FROM AIEA ATTACKED A JAP AT PUULOA—TRIAL AT EWA.

Trouble occurred at Honolulu Plantation on April 23 growing out of some sort of difference between the Japanese laborers. It is claimed by the Japanese living at Puuloa that a number of the Aiea Japanese went to Puuloa after a man named Nakamura whom they assaulted. There was some misunderstanding growing out of a small sized strike. About 25 men are alleged to have been in the crowd that went after Nakamura. A number of the alleged assailants were tried at Ewa last Tuesday and a decision will be returned tomorrow.

SEABURY WILL TAKE A VACATION

Captain W. B. Seabury of the Pacific Mail liner Korea has been granted six months' leave of absence, and will go into the mountains on a vacation trip, after many years of service as the commodore captain of the Mail line. His absence extends over two voyages of the Korea to the Orient. His place on the big steamer, first of the modern liners to run out of this port, has not been filled, and officials of the company said yesterday that the selection of a temporary commander might not be made for several days. It was, however, stated that the man under consideration was at present out of the city, and might not be here in time to take out the Korea.—Chronicle.

KILAUEA STILL ACTIVE. HILO, May 2.—Madam Pele is still doing her duty to the patrons of the Volcano House. During the last two weeks the display has been the best that has manifested itself during the series of recent eruptions. Two places are plainly visible, one on the Puna side and one nearer the Volcano House side of the pit. The latter place is spouting to the height of 40 or 50 feet every few minutes. During the last two months the floor has filled up about three hundred feet, and there seem to be no indications of a cessation of the eruptions.

JOHN WISE'S LUAU. John Wise gave a large luau at Waimea last evening in celebration of the finishing of the Waimea reservoir, of which he was the contractor. It was given during the presence of Inspector Guy H. Gere of the Superintendent of Public Works department, who is on a trip of inspection around the island.—Hilo Tribune.

VILLARD THOUGHT TO BE LEAKING

VESSEL IS REPORTED TO HAVE BEEN SPOKEN MONTHS AGO WITH A SMALL LEAK.

While no details have been received of the mishap to the ship Henry Villard or the extent of the damage she sustained, it is thought that she had to put into Melbourne on account of a leak. According to a report, the ship was spoken some time ago about 1000 miles out from New York. The captain stated that his vessel was leaking, but he thought he would be able to keep the leak under control and would go to Honolulu by way of the Cape of Good Hope.

The next news received was to the effect that she had to put into Melbourne when 114 days out, in distress. It is more than probable that the leak got so serious that the captain decided he would put into port and have repairs made. It is more than likely that the cargo which is a very valuable one, will be discharged at Melbourne and the vessel be put into the dry dock and be recaulked and coppered.

MEHEULA'S CASE

The Meheula trial for gross cheat is drawing to a close this afternoon. H. Rapal of the Treasurer's office was placed on the stand to testify as to the cashing of the warrants for the books which it is alleged Meheula never secured. The prosecution expects to close during the afternoon, and it is said that the defense will offer any testimony. The case may therefore go to the jury today.

BERTLEMAN ON TRIAL. United States Judge Dole this afternoon began the trial of the case of Bertelman, charged with impersonating a federal officer. Bertelman is alleged to have represented himself as an internal revenue officer. J. J. Dunne is prosecuting and J. W. Catheart and L. M. Strauss are defending.
