FOREIGN NEWS BY CABLE

OYAMA ADVANCING. TOKIO, May 7.—Oyama's extreme right and left have been materially advanced.

OYAMA IN CONTACT. FENSHUSIEN, May 7.—Oyama is ready to take the offensive and is in contact with the Russians between Fakoman and Bashiachen.

THE RUSSIAN FLEETS. ST. PETERSBURG, May 7.—A junction between Nebogatoff and Rojestvensky is assured.

PLOTTING AGAINST BRAZIL. MADRID, May 7.—Senor Herrera, a former attache of the court, has been arrested on complaint of the Brazilian Minister for plotting the overthrow of the Brazilian Republic.

THE PRESIDENT'S HUNTING TRIP. GLENWOOD, Colo., May 7.—The President will start for Washington on Monday. Ten bears have been killed by the hunting party, the President getting four.

QUIETER AT CHICAGO. CHICAGO, May 7.—The strikers are comparatively quiet. It is believed the crisis has passed. Arbitration may follow.
