**DESPERATE STOWAWAY**

JAPANESE JUMPED OVERBOARD AS MONGOLIA WAS LEAVING—WAS CAUGHT BY PILOT BOYS.

A lucky catch was made for the S. S. Mongolia just before the vessel dropped Pilot Macaulay yesterday afternoon. The Japanese stowaway who had disappeared aboard the vessel and was the cause of the boat being held up for several hours, attempted to escape ashore by jumping overboard. He was caught and returned to the vessel.

The Jap had evidently been helped by somebody aboard the vessel. As the boat was being turned around in front of the Pacific Mail wharf, people on the port side noticed a Japanese attired in drawers and an undershirt standing at the edge of an open port. Passengers recalling the fact that there had been a missing stowaway aboard, surmised that perhaps the scantily attired Jap was the missing man and when the fellow suddenly plunged overboard and started to swim away from the vessel, a shout was sent up that the missing stowaway was trying to escape.

The vessel was stopped and Pilot Macaulay ordered the pilot boat boys to row after the Jap and capture him. The fellow was caught and brought out to the vessel which waited off the mouth of the harbor. The Jap was put aboard the vessel and placed in irons, as it was decided unwise to risk taking him ashore to transfer to the S. S. Coptic as he might escape. He will be returned to Japan on the Mongolia by the next outward trip.

The Jap seems to be a dangerous character and out of the nine Japanese stowaways, appears to have been the only one who really wished to leave Japan. The other claimed that they had been drinking sake in Yokohama before the departure of the vessel and fell asleep and were carried away. They expressed a desire to be returned to Japan.

Had the man escaped the vessel would have been fined \$500 by the immigration officials.

**JAPANESE SAILOR LOST AT PAPA KOU**

BOAT FROM STEAMER KAULANI WAS UPSET ABOUT DAYBREAK LAST MONDAY AND MAN LOST.

A Japanese sailor of the steamer Kaulani was drowned at Papekou Monday morning about daybreak. In company with four other Japanese the man manned a boat from the vessel to go ashore. A second boat manned by natives followed that manned by Japanese.

The first boat was capsized by a heavy sea and thrown on the rocks and smashed. One of the Japanese was drowned and nothing was seen of his body. He may have been struck on the head by an oar or some other object that was thrown out when the boat capsized. The other men were rescued by the second boat, one of the Japanese being caught by the hair just as he was sinking the last time.

**MAUNA LOA HAD TERRIFIC SEAS**

EXPERIENCED WORST TRIP IN NUMBER OF YEARS—HAD TO STOP WORK.

The steamer Mauna Loa, arrived this morning from her run to Maui and Hawaii ports after the roughest trip she has experienced in several years. Work was very difficult along the Hawaii coast owing to high winds and tremendous seas. At Punaluu on Monday work had to be stopped entirely owing to the big seas that were breaking at intervals over the landing.

Coming from Honouliuli to South Point a floating spar with some rigging, evidently a topsail yard was seen floating in the water. Spar had been in the water some time for it was covered with barnacles and moss.

Purser Conkling makes the following report: "There has been no rain in Kau and the high winds are drying the cane. Honouliuli mill has been hampered by lack of water which accounts for our light load of sugar. "In Kona showers have been frequent."

**LAVINIA BATTLING WITH HAWAII GALES**

OLD VIKING HAVING HARD TIME TO LAND HIS FREIGHT AT PUNALUU—LOST FORE SAIL.

According to news brought today by the steamer Mauna Loa the schooner Lavinia and Captain Weisbarth were having a hard time to land 14,000 feet of lumber and some feed at Punaluu. The schooner Lavinia with Captain Weisbarth, two sailors, two whines and a supercargo left Hilo with two days provisions on Thursday of last week. The vessel carried 14,000 feet of lumber to build the new Pahalua jail and 25 tons of feed. The vessel arrived off Punaluu on Friday but was

She then picked up the wind and started around for Punaluu again but according to the advices received yesterday, had been unable to make a landing.

**FLYING FISH ATTACK STEAMER**

CLOUDS OF FISH FLEW UPON THE MAUNA LOA AND KNOCKED DOWN MAN AT WHEEL.

The steamer Mauna Loa was attacked by a cloud of flying fish off the Kau coast this week. The fish flew over the bow and starboard quarter of the vessel. Hundreds upon hundreds of them flew on the vessel. Several flew into the pilot house and struck the man at the wheel and knocked him down. Captain Simerson's cap was knocked off. Many of the cabins were reached by the flying fish. It was the first occurrence of the kind in the eventful history of the vessel.

**NEWS OF MARTHA DAVIS.**

Advices received today by C. Brewer and Company and others regarding the fire that destroyed the bark Martha Davis in Hilo harbor last Saturday night are to the effect that the fire started in the forward hold of the vessel and was discovered about 10:30 o'clock at night. The tug Charles Counselman went to the assistance of the vessel. The flames got beyond all control and the vessel was a mass of flames by 2 o'clock and burned until Sunday night. The fire is said to have started in the line.
