Times of the tide are taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at Kahului and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu, Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 26 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 20 minutes. The time whistle blows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 9 hours, 0 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.

U. S. Department of Agriculture, Weather Bureau.

The greatest monthly precipitation was 11.29 inches in 1855.
The least monthly precipitation was 0.23 inches in 1878.
The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 5.58 inches on May 10, 1855.
