

RAWLINS FOR SHERIFF

PRESENT DEPUTY SHERIFF WILL ACCEPT NOMINATION IF CIVIC FEDERATION DECIDES TO NAME A TICKET-GOVERNOR CARTER, IT IS SAID, FAVORS RAWLINS AND WILL SUPPORT HIM FOR THE OFFICE OF SHERIFF.

Rawlins for Sheriff! This morning W. T. Rawlins consented to accept the nomination of the Civic Federation if it was offered to him and the meeting of the Federation, which has been called for Wednesday afternoon, will simply place him at the head of the ticket. It has not yet been decided whether to run a complete ticket under the Federation banner or whether to endorse a certain limited number of those already on the Republican ticket and the Federationists were busy this morning and afternoon canvassing the situation. As a matter of fact the only office that the Administration cares about is that of Sheriff and it will be quite ready to throw its influence in for any candidates that the Federation may particularly desire. The alliance has been beautifully mapped out and Wednesday afternoon is to see it consummated. William Rawlins has been favored of the gods. He has always been well up in the councils of the party. He was made chairman of the Oahu board of registration and when the turn-over in the police department was made he succeeded the hawk-eyed Hater as Deputy to the newly appointed High Sheriff Henry. Hater only held the job for a few hours as the party would not stand the passing of such a plum as the deputyship to a malihin.

WILL SAIL UP LEeward SIDE

PLANS FOR THE GOVERNOR'S CUP RACE HAVE BEEN CHANGED BY THE LOCAL YACHTSMEN.

The yachtsmen are going around the other way, that is to say that instead of starting on the race around Oahu by going up the windward side of the island, they will sail up the leeward side and return by the windward. The four yachts entered for the Governor's cup are: La Paloma, schooner; Gladys, sloop; Spray, sloop, (flag) and Hawaii, sloop. The start will be made from Honolulu harbor from an imaginary line between the Heialani boat-house and the lighthouse at 8 p. m. on Saturday. Once clear of the harbor the racers will head for Barber's Point and it is expected that they will make Waiakua by Sunday morning. The time of arrival of the different yachts will be noted by Frank Halstead and on each yacht there will be a member of the regatta committee. Three of these will be Jock Carter, H. D. Cousins and Leslie Scott. The time of arrival will of course be counted in on the finish. There will be a celebration at Waiakua on Monday morning at 9 and Honolulu should be reached by Monday evening down the windward coast of the island. The race is a race test of seamanship for the course is over 120 miles, in a straight line, on the open ocean.

BALLOU ON WITNESS STAND

HEARING BEFORE JUDGE LINDSAY OF HIS LIBEL SUIT AGAINST SAM PARKER.

S. M. Ballou was on the witness stand all this morning in his suit against Samuel Parker for \$50,000 damages for libel. He was examined by A. G. M. Robertson, counsel for plaintiff, Magoon, Breckons and Whiting appearing for defendant. Ballou denied that he, or the firm of Kinney, Ballou & McClanahan, had ever been attorneys for Parker, as stated in Parker's document containing the alleged libel. He said he had nothing at all to do with Parker in the Hamakua ditch proposition and that in the Hawaii ditch company affairs Parker had his own counsel all the time, though Ballou's firm had consultations as representatives of the general ditch proposition. Kinney had nothing at all to do with the matter in any way, said Ballou, and McClanahan and himself did not advise Parker at all. Ballou said that no fee had ever been paid by Parker to the firm of Kinney, Ballou & McClanahan and no agreement for a retainer had ever been made. A number of alleged libelous statements were read to Ballou and he denied them.

BERTILLION SYSTEM FOR PAKE IMMIGRANTS

IMMIGRATION OFFICIALS HAVE RECEIVED APPARATUS AND WILL BEGIN TO USE IT.

The apparatus and directions for using the Bertillion system of identification have arrived at the immigration station. P. M. Bechtel will not inaugurate the use of the system until the new station will have been opened. The Bertillion system of identification will be a new thing for Hawaii. The system is sent ostensibly for the better identification of Chinese but it will be used in taking descriptions of other immigrants that the immigration authorities may desire to have recorded.

PLENTY OF VESSELS WILL SOON DEPART

SUGAR CARGOES ARE TO MOVE THIS WEEK AND TOMORROW FOUR BOATS WILL LEAVE.

The bark Andrew Welch will probably get away tomorrow for San Francisco with a full load of sugar. She was to have sailed today but it was ordered yesterday that she take on a special consignment of Paauhau sugar from the steamer Claudine, so a delay ensued.

The schooner Georgiana will begin to load sugar for San Francisco on Wednesday.

The schooners Aloha and the Alice Cooke are loading sugar, the former being almost ready for sea.

The S. S. Enterprise is to sail tomorrow morning for San Francisco with about 2,000 tons of refined sugar from the Honolulu Plantation.

The S. S. Rosecrans which arrived yesterday morning from Monterey towing the oil ship Marnon Chilcott will start back to Monterey tomorrow towing the oil ship Marion Chilcott will ed cargoes of fuel oil at this place.

The steamer Maui arrived yesterday morning from Hamakua ports with 10,650 bags of sugar, 1,400 of which she put into the S. S. Alameda.

STOCKS THIS AFTERNOON.

INSPECTED NEW LIGHT AT LAHAINA

CAPTAIN NIBLACK RETURNED FROM MAUI YESTERDAY—WILL PUT NEW LIGHT NEXT WEEK.

Captain A. P. Niblack lighthouse inspector, returned yesterday morning from inspecting the new light house at Lahaina. He arranged the red sectors in the light to indicate the reef line and arranged the white light so that the anchorage place will be seen. The light is not one intended for sea lighting but is ostensibly a harbor light that marks the breaks in the reef and shows where there is safe anchorage.

Captain Niblack will leave in the U. S. S. Iroquois next week for Lahaina to do some buoy work at that place and sound in at the anchorage grounds. The new light will then be lighted.

Seven members of the crew of the Iroquois left for the rifle range for target practice this morning. They will be absent about a week.

LYLE DICKEY FOR COUNTY ATTORNEY

"ET TU BRUTE" SAY REPUBLICANS TO RAWLINS

SHOULD THE DEPUTY HIGH SHERIFF ACCEPT THE NOMINATION OF THE CIVIC FEDERATION FOR COUNTY SHERIFF, IT IS CLAIMED THAT HE WOULD BE GUILTY OF AN ACT OF POLITICAL TREASON.

Strict party men are asking by what species of political gymnastics can W. T. Rawlins accept the nomination of the Civic Federation for sheriff in opposition to the regular Republican nominee. Rawlins is a Republican and has always been a Republican. He was elected county attorney two years ago on the Republican ticket and since that time has been a prominent factor in the councils of the party. People who are not strong Brown men and yet are strict party men, say that under no circumstances would they loyally permit Rawlins to accept the nomination as the hands of the Civic Federation, if Rawlins were to accept such nomination it would, it is contended, commit an act of political treason to the party, the party which nominated him once and on the strength of being a member of that same party he was made deputy high sheriff of the Territory.

NAONE GETS THE LIMIT

HARD LABOR FOR TWENTY YEARS FOR THE KILLING OF HIS WIFE. DE BOLT SAYS THE FACTS CALLED FOR A VERDICT OF MURDER IN THE SECOND DEGREE—WANTS TO VISIT FAMILY.

Twenty years at hard labor was the sentence imposed upon Philip H. Naone this morning for the killing of his wife. This is the highest penalty allowed by the law for the crime of which he was declared by the jury to be guilty—manslaughter in the first degree. Judge De Bolt expressed the opinion in passing sentence that a verdict of murder in the second degree would have been more in accordance with the facts. The defendant's father and mother and little children were in court when sentence was passed. Naone showed more animation than he has displayed throughout the long trial. During the trial he was seen to weep.
