Quonset Sugar Co. has increased its monthly dividend from 30c. to 40c. a share, the first at the higher rate being payable at San Francisco today.

COURT ADJOURNS.

The argument in the case of the Hawaiian-American Engineering Company vs. the Territory was concluded this afternoon in the Supreme Court and an adjournment was taken to tomorrow morning. It is expected that some decisions will be given then. As Justice Foster and Hartwell are to leave for the coast, a long adjournment will be taken.

The will of the late John Morgan has been filed for probate. It leaves the entire estate to J. Alfred Morgan, son of the testator, nominating him as executor without bonds. The will was executed on May 2, 1905, four days before the testator's death, in presence of P. Wandenberg and C. E. Gilbert. In the petition of John Alfred Morgan for probate, the estate is described as consisting of shares in action and personal effects, being valued at \$5000.

KAPEA MAY FIGHT HIS CASE

ASKS THE COURT TO GIVE HIM TIME TO EMPLOY COUNSEL.

Henry Kapea has apparently decided to fight the embezzlement charge against him. He appeared for arraignment in Judge De Bolt's court this morning and asked for time in which to employ counsel. Kapea was the best dressed prisoner who has appeared in court for some time, and he faced the court with the air and grace of a regular heart throbber, his hat held gracefully at his breast, in his left hand. His bearing of self-confidence was quite a contrast to the drooping dejection of the average defendant who is hauled up to hear an indictment.

After the indictment had been read, Kapea was asked, at the request of Peters, what was his true name. This was in order to avoid the difficulty caused by use in the indictment of the phrase stating that defendant's true name "is to the grand jurors unknown." The indictment was found over a year ago. Kapea answered that his name was Henry K. Kapea.

The indictment charges him with embezzling a Waiata bond of the value of \$500, from the Hawaiian Trust Company, on December 14th, 1903.

Kapea was given until next Wednesday morning to secure counsel. His bail was fixed at \$2,500 which is the largest sum allowable under the law. The law provides that the maximum bail that can be required is five times the amount of the embezzlement charged.

FUSION PEOPLE IN CONFERENCE

MET SATURDAY NIGHT TO DISCUSS MATTER OF FILLING POSSIBLE VACANCIES.

A meeting of members of the joint fusion committee was held Saturday evening. Only J. K. Nakaokeo, the chairman of the Home Rule committee, was present from that party. There was a large attendance of Democratic representatives. The matter of filling vacancies for the ticket was discussed.

B. N. Kahalepuna had signified his intention of retiring from the ticket as County Clerk, but after considerable discussion, no action was taken regarding that possible vacancy, the indications being now that Kahalepuna will make the campaign.

There is a vacancy in the nomination of a supervisor for the Ewa district. No decision was reached regarding that place. There has been considerable talk about H. T. Moore not being eligible to run as supervisor from Honolulu. This report is not sustained by a legal inquiry and Moore both can and will make the run.

E. M. Watson, who was nominated for County Attorney is not likely to run. The question of filling that vacancy was also considered. According to a newspaper report there was a plan to pull J. M. Pospoe down as fusion nominee for sheriff and leave that place vacant and give Pospoe the place of County Attorney. No such action was taken at the meeting.

F. R. Terrill resigned as chairman of the joint committee. No chairman was selected, F. R. Harvey being acting chairman.

SHALLOW RIVER DELAYED VESSEL

The S. S. California was to have sailed from Hilo Saturday evening for Delaware Breakwater. The vessel had a load of 8,000 tons of sugar. Of this amount 4,529 tons were loaded at Honolulu, 1,577 tons at Kahului and 1,884 tons at Hilo. The vessel would have sailed on Thursday or Friday from Hilo last week, but she was delayed by the failure of sugar to reach her as

AN OLD CASE.

An ejectment case begun in the Second Circuit (Main) in 1898 has been transferred to the First Circuit Court. It is that of W. R. Kakaokoko against Waiuku Sugar Co. and is for land containing 118.62 acres. As the original papers have been lost, copies of the complaint and answer have been filed by stipulation between C. W. Ashford for plaintiff and Kinney, McClanahan & Cooper for defendant.

JAP CONSPIRATORS.

Eight Japanese of Honolulu Plantation, charged with conspiracy as inciters of the recent strike, were arraigned in Judge De Bolt's court this morning. Hogan appeared for the defense. He announced that he intended to attack the indictments, and the cases were postponed one week.

MRS. GALT WINS.

Judge Lindsay this morning gave a decision in favor of plaintiff in the ejectment suit of Agnes G. Galt vs. Lulla Waiannua. The decision is in accordance with a Supreme Court ruling on points which were reserved for the Supreme Court during the trial of the case.
