## RUMORS OF "PULLING" BROWN DOWN

REPORTS IN CIRCULATION THAT AN EFFORT IS BEING MADE TO GET BROWN TO WITHDRAW FROM THE RACE FOR THE OFFICE OF SHERIFF—THE "ADMINISTRATION" MIXED UP IN THE RUMOR—NOTHING DEFINITE OBTAINABLE.

In an effort being made to induce A. M. Brown to withdraw from the campaign for the shrievalty of the county of Oahu? There are peculiar rumors in circulation regarding an effort to secure his withdrawal, but nothing definite appears to be obtainable on the subject. Brown's nomination papers have not yet been filed with the office of the Secretary, but there are three days yet before the time limit expires. Nomination papers may be filed on Saturday next. As Brown is by no means the only Oahu candidate who has not come forward up to this time, no special significance is to be attached to the fact that he has not filed papers. As usual the "administration" is mixed up in the reports regarding the situation, and it is said that the inducements to withdraw are from the administration, which is well known to have been dissatisfied with Brown's nomination by the Republican, and to be still more dissatisfied with the prospect of his winning by an overwhelming majority, in view of the weakness of the opposing candidate. Brown has not shown any signs of intending to withdraw, and it is not thought by his supporters that he will do so under any circumstances. He is to leave tomorrow morning for a tour of this island, accompanied by the other candidates on the Republican ticket.

## NEITHER POEPOE NOR BROWN ENDORSED

THE EXECUTIVE OF CIVIC FEDERATION REFUSES TO ENDORSE EITHER—THE MEETING TODAY.

The Civic Federation's executive committee finished its secret meeting at noon today and it decided to recommend neither of the two candidates for the shrievalty, Brown or Poepeo, for the suffrages of the Oahu electorate. Neither will it recommend that an independent candidate be chosen to represent the views of the Federation. If the Federation chooses to select one it can do so at the open meeting to be held this afternoon.

In contradistinction to its attitude towards the shrievalty, the Federation's executive recommends both of the candidates for the County attorneyship. Both the Republican choice E. A. Douthett and the Democratic selection E. M. Watson are to be endorsed as good and reliable men.

For the other offices an elaborate report will be submitted a report which in some cases will condemn unsparingly and in other cases will recommend. In several instances the report will lay certain facts regarding the careers of different candidates before the whole body and leave that body to decide. This afternoon's meeting will prove interesting.

## \$1,500 IS SAID TO BE IN SIGHT

REPORT THIS MORNING THAT SOMEBODY WANTS TO BRIBE POEPOE TO GET OUT OF FIGHT.

It was reported about Home Rule headquarters today that somebody as mysterious an individual as the man who hit Billy Patterson a generation ago, had offered to bribe J. M. Poepeo, the fusion nominee for sheriff. The news caused no end of excitement around the Home Rule headquarters and there were some thoughts over the possibility of the money being paid over. The offer is said to have been for Poepeo to withdraw from the nomination for sheriff and run for county attorney. He was given until Friday to make his answer. To whom this answer is to be made is not stated. The identity of the individual or "interests" is a dark secret.

## DOES NOT PLAY IN THE CIVIC BACKYARD

ATTORNEY GENERAL ANDREWS SAYS HE IS NOT ATTENDING THE FEDERATION MEETINGS.

Attorney General Andrews said this morning that he was not attending the Civic Federation meetings at which the political situation is being discussed. Andrews was a prominent member of the federation and took considerable part in its proceedings up to the time when it began to threaten opposition to some of the Republican ticket. Then he announced that if it came to a choice he proposed to stay by his party. "As a Republican committee chairman," said Andrews, "I could not remain in an organization which was opposing any Republicans, and if the federation is going to oppose anyone of the Republican nominees I shall resign from the federation. Under the circumstances I did not think it proper for me to take up the discussion, so I do not know what the federation is doing."

## Russia Wants Japan's Peace Terms

(Associated Press Cable to The Star).

ST. PETERSBURG, June 7.—As a result of the meeting of the Council of Ministers the Russian government has telegraphed to Washington and to Paris asking for a statement of Japan's peace conditions.

## NORWAY AND SWEDEN SEPARATE

CHRISTIANA, Norway, June 7.—The Norway Storting met today and declared the union of Norway with Sweden dissolved and deposing King Oscar as the ruler of Norway. An address was adopted declaring that the best of feeling was entertained toward the former joint nation. The present state council is now governing Norway under authority from the Storting. King Oscar telegraphed his disapproval. Oscar has been asked by the Storting to co-operate in the selection of a Prince of the House of Bernadotte to occupy the throne of Norway.

Sweden, Norway and Denmark were united in one Kingdom in 1397. The Swedes recovered their independence in 1521 and the crowns of Sweden and Norway were united on November 4, 1814. Although thus united, the countries were supposed to be independent, the king ruling according to the constitution of each country. In Sweden the king has absolute veto against any enactment of the Diet, in other respects the legislative power is vested in the Diet, which is composed of two elected chambers.

In Norway the executive power was vested in the king and the legislative power in the Storting, a single chamber which, however, is divided into two sections, the Lagthing and the Odelsthing. There are three times as many members of the latter as of the former. Norway has a population of 2,240,000 and Sweden 5,140,000. One of the principal causes of friction between the Norwegians and the Swedes, it is understood, has been the unsatisfied demand of the former for foreign consulates, independent altogether of those of Sweden. The Bernadotte family which has held the united throne for several generations, is descended from Marshal Bernadotte of Napoleon's armies. He was a country attorney at the time of the French revolution but by his mastery ability won his baton. From a kindness shown to a Swedish embassy to Napoleon, he was invited to take the throne when Sweden looked for a king. He accepted and later turned the Swedish arms against his old master.

## SHERIDAN BROKE TRANSPORT RECORDS

LOWERED THE RECORD FROM SAN FRANCISCO BY TWO HOURS—BROUGHT PROMINENT PEOPLE

Smashing all records for transports between San Francisco and Honolulu, the Sheridan, Captain Peabody, arrived off the port this morning before daybreak. She made the run in 6 days and 17 hours, cutting down the best previous record, held by herself, by

two hours. The vessel left San Francisco May 31 and had pleasant weather throughout the entire passage. She brought four days later mail from the mainland. The Sheridan will remain in port until 4 o'clock tomorrow afternoon. She is to load 700 tons of coal. She goes to Guam and Manila. The vessel brought as passengers for Honolulu Surgeon General W. A. Wyman, who will stop over for six days

## HATTER'S REPORT

IT IS SAID CARTER THREATENS TO PUBLISH IT

The story current on the street this afternoon was to the effect that Governor Carter is holding over the head of Arthur M. Brown, the Republican candidate for sheriff, the report submitted to him secretly last fall by Detective Hatter. It is said that he has informed Brown that in the event of his (Brown's) refusal to withdraw from the ticket, he will publish this report for the purpose of discrediting the former High Sheriff in the eyes of the entire community.

Brown, it is further alleged, has defied the Governor and has told him to go ahead with the publication of the Hatter report at the same time informing the Governor that he will hold him personally responsible, as man to man, for anything that he may say in a derogatory way. Just what truth there may be in these rumors it is impossible to ascertain at this writing, but it is certain that Brown and Carter had a long interview late last week in the Governor's chambers and that yesterday Carter called to see Brown but did not succeed in finding him. It has been stated that the report filed by Hatter contains much that respects the private affairs of the former High Sheriff but the friends of Brown laugh at the idea of its bearing any weight in view of the utter discredit which has attached to the investigations of the so-called detective Hatter. Every case but one which he investigated has fallen flat and that one was a Chinese case when the man was convicted in the absence of his counsel. He has been given a new trial. The McDuffie case has failed.

## OBJECT TO A HORSE HOSPITAL

RESIDENTS OF KINAU STREET SIGN A PETITION TO THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

Residents in the neighborhood of Kinau street between Keatimoku and Pihou streets have entered a protest with the Board of Health against issuing a permit to Dr. W. T. Monsarrat for a building to be used as an infirmary for the treatment of diseased horses, mules, cows, dogs, etc.

A petition to this end has been signed by a large number of residents of that region. The petition sets forth that "the maintenance of such an institution may endanger the public health and become a public nuisance."
