SURGEON GENERAL WYMAN IS HERE

ARRIVED BY THE TRANSPORT SHERIDAN TO SELECT A SITE FOR MOLOKAI LEPROSARIUM.

Surgeon General Walter Wyman of the United States Marine Hospital Service, arrived this morning by the transport Sheridan for a brief visit to Honolulu. The arrival of General Wyman who is at the head of the medical service of the United States, has been awaited with special interest as he was to come here to select the site for the United States laboratories and hospitals at the leper settlement.

"My visit," said General Wyman this morning "is principally to arrange for the selection of the site for the proposed government laboratories and hospitals and other buildings necessary in the work at the leper settlement. Congress appropriated \$100,000 for the purpose of establishing a place at the leper settlement where a scientific study of the disease could be made. In addition to that sum an additional \$50,000 was appropriated for the maintenance and cost of operation of the place for the first year.

"I expect to visit the Molokai Settlement with Governor Carter and select the sites for the location of our buildings. We are to have at least a mile square. I propose to work in perfect harmony and accord with the local Territorial board of health in this matter of the selection of the site and certainly do not anticipate selecting any sites, that would seriously interfere with the operations of the settlement.

"After the United States station is in operation, we propose to treat a limited number of patients. Nobody will be forced to undergo treatment who does not desire to do so, but naturally, it is desired to have patients so that the study of the disease can be better made.

"While leprosy is generally supposed to be a disease that is incurable and for which no specific has been secured, still there have recently been two treatments discovered for which great results are claimed. I believe that a Dr. Rost an English physician of standing in India has discovered a method of treating patients. I have communicated with him on this subject. We do not pretend to have any positive cure for the disease but it is our hope that the investigations at the new station will result in something being found that will help cope with the disease and eventually secure the specific for it.

"I expect to return to San Francisco by the vessel leaving here on next Tuesday so my visit will be very brief. During my stay in Honolulu I will inspect the quarantine station at this place."

Congressman Hepburn the chairman of the Inter-State and Foreign Commerce Committee of the House, arrived by the transport with General Wyman. Congressman Hepburn is the man who introduced the leprosy study bill and pushed it successfully through the House.

HENRY KAPEA GETS MORE TIME

HAS NO COUNSEL AND SAYS HE WANTS TIME TO "FRAME A PLEA."

Henry Kapea appeared in Judge De Bolt's court again this morning without counsel and at his request was granted another postponement. Kapea told the judge that he wanted to "frame a plea" of his own, and wanted a week or so in which to prepare it for delivery to the court. He said he hadn't got his ideas in shape yet for proper presentation.

Kapea said that he had been told by his father that J. J. Dunne would appear for him. Dunne, however, was not in court and Kapea didn't know whether he had taken up the case or not. Kapea finally said that he would like to leave the attorney out of it altogether, and frame his own statement for the court, if given until next week. Peters proposed a continuance until tomorrow, when the matter of legal representation might be settled. Kapea asked for more time and again declared that he wanted to leave the matter of an attorney out, and make his plea. He was then given until Friday.

Irwin and her daughter, Miss Helen Irwin, are among our prominent San Francisco society people who are at present enjoying a week or ten days' stay at Del Monte. The interior of this handsome home is even more beautiful than the exterior, and is filled with carvings and rare brasses brought from different countries.

APPEALS IN FISHERIES CASE

Nineteen motions for new trials of fisheries cases were filed this afternoon by Attorney General Andrews, in cases within the first circuit. It is the intention of the department to make similar motions in all the sixty or more cases which have been heard, and to take appeals to the Supreme court in case the new trials are denied. The motions are based upon technical grounds which are set forth as follows: "1st. That the decision and judgment rendered in said cause are contrary to the law.

"2nd. That said decision and judgment are contrary to the evidence.

"3rd. That said decision and judgment are contrary to the law."

The nineteen motions are all set for hearing before Judge De Bolt at ten o'clock next Saturday morning.

BERTELMAN ACQUITTED.

F. C. Bertelman was acquitted of a second charge of impersonating an internal revenue officer this morning. The jury took the case at about a quarter past eleven and found a verdict of not guilty. There are two more indictments against Bertelman for a similar offense and the next case was set for tomorrow morning.
