

# "HI" HENRY TO RUN FOR SHERIFF

## Will Not Say The Civics Nay IF NOMINATION IS OFFERED HIM

THE RICHMOND OF THE CIVICERS SEEMS LIKELY TO BE THE HIGH SHERIFF—INTIMATES THAT HE WOULD CONSIDER THE NOMINATION IF IT WERE OFFERED HIM—SAYS HE DOES NOT SEE WHY MEMBERS OF PARTY SHOULD NOT RUN AGAINST THE REGULAR NOMINEES, SOME TIMES.

"Hi" is the man. The High Sheriff will according to the belief of men in close touch with the political situation, be the nominee of the Civic Federation for the office of county sheriff. The man of the hour is high and Hi will not say the Civickers nay, if they offer him the shrievalty nomination.

But the High Sheriff is coy on the subject and while he does not come out and state in so many words that he is a candidate for the nomination, nevertheless he is walking about with a political lightning rod sticking out of his neck waiting for the nomination lightning to strike. And when it does strike, there will be no cold shivers running down his spinal column. Contrary he will swell with pride and like Job's warhorse scent the battle from afar.

## FEDERATION MOVES IN STRICT SECRECY

MYSTERY VEILS EVEN THE NAMES OF THE COMMITTEE WHO ARE NOW OUT LOOKING FOR A LIKELY CANDIDATE FOR SHERIFF—CAN IT BE HIGH SHERIFF HENRY WHO IS THE CHOICE? HUSH!

Hush! There is mystery in the air! There is a secret committee of the Civic Federation lurking around somewhere in the by-ways looking for a certain man! It may be you, or you, or you for whom that committee is looking. You do not know, how could you? And the worst of it is, you do not know who are the members of that committee! It is by no means improbable that before you know it you will be seized by this committee, gagged, nominated and elected Sheriff of Oahu, hence it behooves every respectable man in the community to keep strictly in the middle of the road and to get home before dusk each evening.

President Castle of the Civic Federation did not come into town today. He remained up at his Tantalus home with a telescope trained on the streets of Honolulu in the hope of seeing a likely candidate pass by.

"No," said D. L. Withington, also of the Civic Federation, "Mr. Castle is not down today. Have we a candidate for the shrievalty? Well, there is a committee specially appointed to look after the matter and I think I may say that we are sure of having a very strong candidate for sheriff and also another to oppose Quinn for supervisor. "Who will those candidates be?" echoed Mr. Withington, with a smile. "Why, I am sure I do not know. The committee has that in hand. No, I am not at liberty to give the names of the members of that committee. I suppose that Mr. Castle is a member as he is president."

Mr. Withington was informed that there was a rumor current to the effect that High Sheriff Henry would accept the nomination of the Federation. "Well I am glad to hear it," he said. "I think he would be an excellent man."

## ONE JUROR AT A TIME

UNITED STATES JUDGE DOLE ADOPTS A NEW PLAN OF FILLING THE BOX WHEN ONLY ELEVEN MEN QUALIFY AND THERE IS TALK OF PILKIA OVER THE EXPENSE ACCOUNTS AS A RESULT THEREOF.

United States Judge Dole has adopted a new method in securing jurors when the court panel is exhausted, a demand upon the marshal to bring in which is the subject of a good deal of discussion among lawyers and may lead to pilikia at Washington. The judge holds that under the law he may only send for one new juror at a time, and this is the program he is carrying out. Instead of sending the marshal out for half a dozen men the judge sends for one man at a time and adjourns court to wait for the one man.

The result is very slow work in getting juries and the piling up of very big expenses in the office of the United States Marshal Hendry. The possible pilikia at Washington will come in when the Department of Justice passes upon Marshal Hendry's vouchers for the expenses.

The new system was carried out in the new trial of Keawe, charged with embezzling post office funds, in which a jury was secured this morning after long effort. When twelve men had passed for cause the peremptory challenges began and when a juror was excused, the panel being exhausted, Judge Dole held that under the statute

he must follow the rule of filling the box from among the bystanders, or by a demand upon the marshal to bring in any citizen who was eligible. This meant an adjournment of court each time until a citizen was found.

Judge Dole's plan is contrary to that followed by the late Judge Estes and by Dole himself in previous cases. It has been the custom heretofore when jurors were lacking to issue a venire for ten or a dozen men, bring them all into court and proceed with the effort to get twelve men for the case at issue. This is all changed now, and whenever the federal court is without a jury, the judge orders one man brought into court. If he does not qualify, another is sent for, a recess being taken in the meantime. If he does qualify and a challenge is made, the course is the same.

A jury was finally secured in the Keawe case and the trial is proceeding this afternoon. The jurors are: E. Lofquist, W. H. Charlack, Jr., W. R. Riley, E. R. Riven, A. R. Gurney, J. Emmelhut, W. W. Hall, A. Gartley, C. Simpson, E. L. Cutley, M. J. Bissell, F. C. Pade.
