

LIDIPUDZY, Manchuria, June 19.—The Japanese forces are reported to be moving northwest from Korea in three columns, including 50,000 infantry and corresponding forces of cavalry and field artillery. These forces will complete Marshal Oyama's line of front from the province of Mongolia on the west to the sea on the east.

COULD NOT COPE WITH GAMBLERS

HENRY'S WRITTEN ADMISION THAT RESORTS EXISTED IN SPITE OF HIS EFFORTS.

In his last report to the Attorney General, transmitted to the governor and covering the period up to December 31, 1904, High Sheriff Henry not only practically admitted that gambling had not been suppressed by his three months' special activity against it, but he declared that it could not be suppressed under the present laws. He asked for a piece of legislation which the governor naturally forbore recommending. Henry wanted the police given authority to break down and enter any locked houses, and he wanted a law to make the mere presence of heavy locked doors an evidence of crime.

Henry's report contained the following language:

"While the law is positive upon the invasion of houses without legal process, still, I believe that some statute should be enacted giving the police discretionary authority to enter places where there is strong reason to believe that the law is being violated. The Chinese gambling resorts are protected by means of a series of heavy iron barred doors which frequently frustrate the police in their efforts to view the scene of the actual law breaking where evidence of gambling can be secured. Entrance through sky lights and other uncertain routes are precarious to the officers and uncertain in results. If it be deemed constitutional it would be well for a law to be enacted whereby it would be held that the presence of such doors was evidence of the intent to commit crime and the mere fact of their existence should be admitted as a part of the evidence for the prosecution in the case against any person or persons found in such building and charged with gambling."

JUDGE DOLE AND THE FIGHT

THINKS THAT THE EXECUTIVE INTERFERENCE IN COUNTY MATTERS IS A SERIOUS MATTER

"I am not in politics nor do I intend to get into politics," said United States District Judge Sanford B. Dole this morning "hence I do not wish to mix up in the present contest in any way but it seems to me that both sides in the present controversy have missed and are missing the most serious feature of the whole situation. This, to my mind, is the part taken by the executive of the Territory in a county contest. It is a rule and a proper rule that Federal officers shall not interfere in state politics and it seems to me that exactly the same rule applies to keep the executive of the territory out of county politics."

EVIDENCE CLOSED

Ex-Governor Dole, now United States Judge, was called as a witness this morning in the Ballou-Parker libel case. Dole was wanted in rebuttal, to testify regarding the scope of the ditch company enterprises discussed with him when he was governor. The last witness for the defense was Col. Parker, defendant. E. B. McClanahan was called as the first witness in rebuttal. This afternoon counsel will settle instructions with the court and on Wednesday the case will be argued. The trial is now in its third week.

TO SELL REAL ESTATE.

Judge Lindsay has granted an order to show cause why J. O. Lightfoot, guardian of Samuel Wilder King should not be allowed to sell certain real estate. The order is returnable on July 17.

CIVICS SAY POEPOE IS WINNER

TWO PAID WORKERS OF THE FEDERATION PREDICT HOME RULER'S VICTORY.

Two of the workers for the Civic Federation, who are speaking at street corners for Henry and are currently reported to be receiving salaries for so doing, on Saturday made the statement that J. M. Poepeo would probably be elected sheriff. They are Robert N. Boyd and George Markham.

Boyd declared on Saturday afternoon his opinion that it was beginning to look like Poepeo. "I shouldn't be surprised," he said, "if Poepeo was to slip in."

George Markham was much more emphatic. He was at the Republican meeting on Saturday evening at Aala park. Markham arrived at the outskirts of the crowd quite late and he approached with the shout "Poepeo's the man."

CIVICS WANT THE HELP OF JIMMY BOYD

ONE OF PROMINENT WORKERS OF FEDERATION OFFERED VIDA'S PLACE TO BOYD.

Efforts were made by the Civic Federation to enlist the services of James H. Boyd under its banner to work against A. M. Brown and the Federation did not go empty handed. It went with the offer of a fine fat job in exchange for Boyd's political influence. The position of second deputy high sheriff formerly held by H. C. Vida was offered to Boyd if he would get in line for Henry.

The offer was made to Boyd before Vida had been discharged. A prominent worker in the Civic Federation ranks and a man who is incidentally one of the strongest supporters of Governor Carter, made the offer. The Civic Federation representative informed Boyd Saturday morning that Vida was to be discharged from the police force and said that if Boyd would only espouse the cause of the Federation and come out for Henry against Brown the position held by Vida would be given to Boyd. The latter refused the offer. The particular significance of the offer lies in the fact that although Boyd according to the Civic's organ, is all that is bad in politics and administration, the Federation is perfectly willing to openly seek the services of the man that its paper denounces and the attempt to secure his services were accompanied by an offer of political office.

HEAVY DAMAGE SUIT.

The Kaneohe Ranch Company has brought suit against Nannia R. Rice for \$10,750 damages, on account of alleged failure to protect a lease for lands to which the defendants is said to have guaranteed the title. The lands were leased from J. P. Mendonca in 1903 at \$6,000 per year. Mrs. Rice having, as is alleged, guaranteed the title. Since then an effectment suit brought by the heirs of Nancy S. Ellis has been successful and the land is in possession of the Ellis estate. The loss of control of the lands, it is claimed, has damaged the Kaneohe Ranch Company to the extent of the sum claimed. Holmes & Stanley are attorneys for plaintiffs.
