CARTER ADVISED G. P. WILDER AND OTHER DELEGATES IN THE CONVENTION TO VOTE FOR BROWN—HE WITHDREW HIS OPPOSITION AFTER THE THREAT TO PUBLISH THE HATTER REPORT, BUT RENEWED IT WHEN TOLD THAT ALEC ROBERSON SAID BROWN COULD BE ELECTED ANYWAY.

To those who have had an insight into the facts and circumstances pertaining to Governor Carter's present strenuous opposition to A. M. Brown in his candidacy for the office of Sheriff of the County of Oahu, Carter's position appears to be wholly untenable.

Wilder and his friends accordingly voted for Brown and thus helped to secure Brown's nomination. After Brown had been nominated, in fact, after he had made known his position with regard to the administration to the county committee and to the public, the Governor summoned Brown to the carpet of the robin's-egg-blue chamber and demanded that Brown should publicly announce that in the approaching race for the sheriffship he did not desire any anti-administration votes.

ESTIMATES OF TO-DAY'S VOTE

Estimates of the vote of today were made yesterday afternoon by leaders of each of the elements in the local campaign. It appears to be agreed that there will be about 5,500 votes cast. The Republican estimate, by County Chairman Waterhouse, is as follows:

- Brown, 2,850. Poeppoe, 2,100. Henry, 550. The Home Rulers are inclined to agree with this estimate, though some of them change the relative positions of Brown and Poeppoe. J. K. Nakookoo, one of the Home Rule committee, when asked for an estimate, said that he agreed with the Republican estimate. Charles Notley gave the following as the Home Rule expectations: Brown, 2,000. Poeppoe, 2,400. Henry, 1,000. Chairman Parish of the Democratic County committee gave the following as his estimate of the result: Poeppoe, 2,550. Brown, 2,000. Henry, 1,400. The Civic Federation estimate differed vitally from all the others. It was given out at Henry's headquarters as follows: Henry, 2,370. Poeppoe, 2,100. Brown, 1,400. "Brown is beaten," said Senator Achi, who was one of those present when this estimate was given. "I have reports which show that he is very weak indeed." "There is plenty of money to be had to bet five to one that Henry will be third man," said one of those present. The Civic committee appeared to be "jolted" by the remark. Achi remarked that he wished he had some money to bet. No one offered to put up anything on the proposition. Bets were made yesterday that Henry's vote would not exceed 800. There were takers at this figure, also at 1000, but no one was ready with any money to oppose the proposition that Henry would be third when the count was over.

POEPOE HOPES FOR A RESTORATION OF LILUOKALANI

IN HIS SPEECH AT AALA PARK LAST NIGHT HE SAID SO—THE WISH APPLAUDED.

"I would like to be elected," said J. M. Poeppoe at the Aala Home Rule meeting last night, "in order to show the people of America that there are people of dark skin in this country who can govern themselves, who can hold important offices and fill the duties thereof. It may be that the time will come when this is seen to be the truth, when they will put the Queen back on the throne."

A few cries of "poi-oi!" greeted this passage during the speech of the Home Rule candidate for sheriff. Poeppoe made quite a long speech. He began with an appeal for support of all the fusion ticket. Then he remarked that there was friction between the Republican candidate for sheriff and the governor, and said that it was best to have a complete straight ticket of the same party, so that the officials could work in harmony. He asked for votes for Watson, referring to him as one of the authors of the County Act and mentioned most of the fusion ticket. Then he discussed his own candidacy.

"The sheriff will have to prosecute all cases," he said, "and I am able from experience to do this. There is a report going around that if I am elected I will be led by the nose by W. R. Castle and the governor. I assure you that this is not so. I assure you that if elected I will run the office for myself and that I will need no help from W. R. Castle. 'Poi-oi!'" "If I am elected I will run the office for the benefit of the people. I did not care for the office and did not want to run for sheriff. It has been reported that my vote was to be bought for tomorrow, but I am in to stay." Here Poeppoe made the remark already quoted, as to the ability of the dark people to govern themselves.

Poeppoe urged the straight fusion ticket and then gave some advice in poetic style: "You think the rain comes from heaven," he said, "but it does not. It is from the earth and only falls back to earth. Just so your own good government must come from you. You are to establish county government here and each and every ballot counts. If you vote well and establish county government well, it will succeed. If not, it will fail."

BOAT CREWS NOW PRACTICING. The Myrtle and Healan's boat crews are practicing now at Pearl Harbor for the approaching Fourth of July races. All of the crews have taken quarters at the Peninsula and the members regularly do down by train every night to practice.
