

# CARTER AND HIS RESIGNATION

## Startling Rumors Of Carter's Intention

THE GOVERNOR SAID TO BE CONSIDERING WHETHER HE SHALL CONTINUE TO HOLD OFFICE AFTER THE VOTE OF YESTERDAY— CONFERENCES WITH PARTY LEADERS WHO ASSURE HIM OF SUPPORT THOUGH AGAINST HIM YESTERDAY.

Governor Carter this morning had a conference with Lorrin A. Thurston, W. O. Smith and A. F. Judd, followed by another meeting with F. T. P. Waterhouse and Speaker Knudsen. Reports are current all over Honolulu, and even on the other islands, as to the withdrawal from office. It is said that several conferences during the last of A. M. ## HENRY SEES BREAKERS AHEAD

THINKS THAT COUNTIES WILL HAVE TROUBLE WITH TERRITORIAL INSTITUTIONS.

High Sheriff Henry does not think that the new county officials will have plain sailing, by any means. In fact he sees breakers ahead, especially for the supervisors.

"As one example" said the High Sheriff today "of the difficulties that will come upon the boards of supervisors, I will call your attention to the fact that the county does not possess a single jail, or prison apparatus, that the patrol wagon and horses and harness here for instance, belong to the Territory. The county government will have to buy such apparatus and outfit outright, for it can not be turned over to the county by the territory."

"The county will also have to make some provision through the supervisors to pay the Territorial government to care for the county prisoners similar to the arrangement of the United States authorities. As High Sheriff, I will have the appointment of all jailors in the Territory."

## SMITH FOR CHAIRMAN

OAHU SUPERVISORS-ELECT WILL BEGIN TO HOLD MEETINGS BEFORE COUNTY ACT TAKES EFFECT, IN ORDER TO PREPARE FOR THE CHANGE TO TAKE PLACE ON JULY 1—SMITH MAY BE CHAIRMAN.

George W. Smith is spoken of for chairman of the Oahu board of supervisors. Smith is a prominent business man and is regarded as specially fitted for the duties which will devolve upon the chairman of the board. There is a disposition among the other members to make him the chairman and the present prospect is that this will be done.

The supervisors-elect will meet as soon as they can get together and make arrangements for inaugurating the new form of government on July 1. There are only ten days in which to perfect these arrangements. A place of meeting for the board is to be selected and officers are to be appointed who will take hold at once when the county act takes effect.

The arrangement of police affairs is one of the matters requiring advance action, it is held. Under the county act all the county police, until the supervisors appoint more, are the sheriff and deputy who have been elected. These two are scarcely sufficient to police the island of Oahu, but at midnight on the last day of June they will be about all the police left, for the Territorial force is reduced to little more than a High Sheriff. It is therefore up to the board to have a new force ready at once, and preliminary sessions to settle matters will be held, so that formal resolutions may be passed as soon as the board becomes a legal body.

### RAW SUGAR TAKES A JUMP.

The Planters Association today received cable advices of a rise in the price of raw sugar, 96 centrifugals. The price went to 4.3125 cents a pound which is an advance over the last quotation. The price of London beets was 11 shillings, 10½ pence.

### NO STOCKS THIS AFTERNOON

There were no stock sales at the afternoon session of the stock exchange today.

The British bark Landskrona arrived today 73 days from Newcastle, with a cargo of coal aboard.

## TO TRY THE TAX APPEALS

ATTORNEY GENERAL ANDREWS AND DEPUTIES WILL HAVE TO LEAVE FOR OTHER ISLANDS TO TRY THE TAX APPEALS IN THE VARIOUS CIRCUITS—TAX APPEAL COURTS TO SIT IN ALL THE CIRCUITS AT ONCE.

Attorney General Andrews and deputies are preparing to divide up the work of handling tax appeal cases, which means a lot of traveling about the islands, under the new provisions of the law. The tax appeal courts are to sit simultaneously in all the circuits so that there will have to be a general scattering of the forces to take the Territory's side of the cases. Attorney General Andrews will go to Maui himself, and will handle the cases there. Prosser, who has handled the matter here with the treasurer, will remain with him and handle the Oahu end of the proposition. Peters is to have the Hawaii business which means covering a lot of territory. Fleming will go to try the cases on Kauai.

## RESULT ON HAWAII

REPUBLICANS LOSE SHERIFF AND SUPERVISORS AND ELECT SOME DEPUTY SHERIFFS.

Sheriff Searle of Hawaii was defeated for sheriff of his county according to a wireless received this morning from Hilo. Searle was recently appointed sheriff to succeed L. A. Andrews, and was nominated on the Republican ticket for sheriff. Searle's opponent was Lieutenant Ben Keolanui, who was an officer under Andrews and ran against him in the last county election, being elected then.

Keolanui's majority over Searle was 25. The Democratic and Home Rule ticket were in most of the cases. C. K. Maguire, Democrat, won for auditor against John Wise, the Republican nominee, and Charles Williams, also a Democrat, beat W. S. Wise for county attorney. For treasurer the Home Rule-Democratic candidate, T. K. Lobbaka, defeated Republican Lyman. The supervisors elected were Home Rule or Democrat.

Successful Republicans were W. A. Fetter, for deputy sheriff of Hilo; J. Mattson for deputy sheriff of North Hilo, and W. J. Rickard for deputy sheriff of Hamskua.
