**The Lessons Of The Election**

The results of the election are eminently satisfactory. They are worthy of the most intelligent electorate in America, for it is easy to see that the voters of Oahu were not led blindly either by party or prejudice, but exercised their own sound discretion. The Republicans lost where it might consistently have been expected that they would lose. The Civic Federation won such influence as it had a right to win and while establishing a certain measure of strength it received a lesson that was evidently needed by the politically inexperienced element which is largely dominant in its leadership. Even the Advertiser warned the Federation, at the start, that it could not hope to suddenly enter the field with its own candidate, but must take the course of supporting the best men offered by other parties, though the Advertiser subsequently supported the Federation in a contrary course. The Federation may claim some share in the defeat of Booth and election of Trent, though by no means entitled to claim it as a victory of its own. Trent was chosen by reason of the general judgment of the community that he was a better man for treasurer than Booth. Quinn needed no Federation opposition to lose him a lot of Republican support,—partly on account of his campaign methods. The Star has never urged any straight ticket doctrine and the voters of Oahu do not follow such a doctrine. Hence the weak places on the Republican ticket were opportunities for the Democrats and Home Rulers. The voters saw the opening which the Republican convention left in its lines.

As for the main contest, the result is admittedly a vindication of former High Sheriff A. M. Brown. It is in a measure a rebuke of gubernatorial interference in matters which are the province of the local party. Republicans resented the disloyalty of their own executive to his party. Fair-minded citizens of all classes objected to the condemnation of a man known honorably in the community from his youth, on an utterly insufficient basis. Another element was the assistance of "our friends the enemy." Many a Democrat joyfully took advantage of the opportunity to help out in stirring up a Republican family row. Whether it was good politics or not remains to be seen, for it has given the Home Rulers a lesson: They will not forget that after joining issue with them and promising support to Poepoe the Democrats are believed by many to have knifed him in favor of Brown. Will they fuse again?

One lesson for the Civic Federation,—also for the governor,—who should not have needed it,—is emphasizing the old political rule, that those who really have the cause of good government at heart and think they can help, or those who have ideas of their own as to candidates or policies,—which ever the case may be,—ought to come forward and make their wishes known before their party's convention. American government is government by party and party organizations, rightly or wrongly, control the machinery of administration. When the Republicans had held their convention, announced their policies and chosen their leaders, after giving all sides a chance to be heard, they quite naturally refused to allow one Republican, even the governor, to upset all their work, and they refused to listen to a Federation which helped him. They do not oppose the Federation as such, and will welcome it in future deliberations. All that it may have to say will be listened to in campaigns to come. The Federation will be given credit for what it is able to do to help the Republican party to maintain good government. But the Federation must abide by the rules of the game and keep its character clear from suspicions of assisting any individual purpose such as that ascribed to the governor in the campaign just closed, in which he expressed approval of Brown before the convention met, acquiesced in his nomination, and then denounced him afterwards.

The campaign has been a bitter and more or less personal one, as campaigns are apt to be when they are launched by a personal attack on a leading candidate. Some of the bitterness will probably last, but it is hoped not much. Republicans should be able to act together for the task their representatives have before them, supporting and helping the men who have been chosen, all by substantial pluralities, to carry on the difficult task of starting county government. If the election means anything, aside from popular expressions of choices of individual men for office, it means that the Republicans of Oahu want to run their own party, and that they demand that voice in the administration of affairs to which a party organization, through its individual voters' preferences and opinions, as expressed in the regular way, is entitled.

Both the zeal for good government which expresses itself through Civic Federations and similar organizations, and that which expresses itself through loyalty to the party through which it is believed good government must come, have now but one duty to perform—to forget past differences, and unite their zeal and efforts for good government through the men elected yesterday.

**Extra Session Of Congress**

Apparently the representations of members of Congress in favor of postponing the extra session of that body until after the fall elections have received more mature consideration by the President, for it is now announced that the session will not be called in October. The congressmen have argued that the calling of the session while the electoral contests were in progress in the various states would be a hindrance to effective campaign work. At first the President was disposed to think otherwise, but he has now seemingly deferred to the wishes of the legislators. The date fixed upon will probably be November 13; that is, the second Monday of the month. That would allow of just three weeks of work before the regular time of meeting; or, to be more accurate, it would permit of the completion of the organization of the House before the opening of the regular session and save that much time for actual legislative work.

**The Treasury Deficit**

With expenditures over \$2,900,000 in excess of the receipts in May the Treasury accounts at the end of that month—last but one of the fiscal year—showed a deficit receipts for the eleven months amounting to over \$36,000,000. The amount to \$495,473,682, an increase of a little over \$2,100,000 as compared with the corresponding months of the preceding fiscal year. The expenditures amounted to \$532,122,762, an increase of over \$36,600,000 as compared with eleven months of the last fiscal year. Customs revenues showed little change, only a slight increase as compared with the last fiscal year; internal revenues exhibited a somewhat larger gain. In expenditures every item showed an increase, that on account of the navy leading with an increment of a little over \$15,000,000. The results for the month are disappointing to the Treasury officials, who can now hardly expect to see the deficit fall much below \$30,000,000.
