COMMENCEMENT AT PUNAHOU

SERVICES AT THE CENTRAL UNION CHURCH LAST NIGHT AND EXERCISES AT COLLEGE.

The closing event of Oahu College's commencement week, took place at the Central Union Church last evening when the class of 1905 attended in a body and a large number of the undergraduates of the schools occupied seats reserved for them in the body of the church.

President Griffiths of Oahu College presided. After a musical service which was entered into with great thoroughness, the address was delivered by Dr. Doremus Scudder who took as his subject "The Student's Reatitude."

The benediction was pronounced by Rev. Dr. Kincaid. The service was in succession to the closing exercises at Punahou when the nineteen graduates were presented with their diplomas and D. L. Withington delivered an address on "The Growth of Thought."

ACCOUNTS APPROVED.

Judge Lindsay approved the report of W. R. Sims, master, on the accounts of the trustees of the estate of S. C. Allen, deceased, and allowed the master a fee of \$200. H. E. Cooper appeared for the trustees. The trustees charged themselves with \$596,121.01, of which \$443,456.02 was principal, \$123,610.29 income and \$29,654.70 miscellaneous receipts. They asked to be allowed \$550,846.89, according to schedule of disbursements. This item includes \$420,747.82 of principal investments, \$18,829.20 commissions to trustees and \$9,269.87 net income paid to Mrs. B. M. Allen.

ROBERTS WAS A "BLEED."

And He Bled Some More Last Friday.

J. C. Roberts a private soldier of the 25th Company of Coast Artillery, shot himself in the breast Friday night at Camp McKinley. The wound was not serious however. It is said by some that the man was simply bluffing. In any event he was locked up to await the action by the police regarding an alleged burglary of which Roberts is supposed to have some knowledge.

Several months ago Roberts was granted a furlough and went to San Francisco. During his presence on the coast, the apartments of one Lawson on Victoria street San Francisco were entered and robbed of considerable clothing. Roberts is said to have been seen later with some of the stolen articles in his possession. After Roberts came to Honolulu he was placed under police surveillance and learning the fact Friday, he went to Lieutenant Trotter at Camp McKinley surrendered himself. Roberts shot himself with a pistol. Roberts will probably be surrendered to the San Francisco police when his company returns to the mainland, provided there is any case against him. Roberts is said to have dressed well about Honolulu and to have made quite a stylish appearance.

PAYMENT OF WATER RATES.

As provided for in Chapter 45 of the Revised Laws of Hawaii, 1905:

All persons holding water privileges or those paying water rates are hereby notified that the water rates for the six (6) months ending December 31st, 1905, will be due and payable at the office of Honolulu Water Works on the 1st day of July, 1905.

On all such rates remaining unpaid on July 15th, 1905, an additional charge of 10 per cent will be made.

All privileges upon which rates remain unpaid to August 15th, 1905, (30 days after becoming delinquent) are subject to immediate shut off, without further notice.

The outside men have been instructed to shut off all delinquent privileges as fast as possible after August 15th, 1905.
