COMPROMISE FOR HARMONY

REPUBLICAN TERRITORIAL COMMITTEE AVOIDS A FIGHT ON MATTER OF GOVERNORSHIP.

The Republican Territorial Central Committee on Saturday night passed the following resolution regarding the governorship:

"Whereas, George R. Carter has resigned his position as Governor of Hawaii.

"Resolved, that in the event of his insisting that his resignation be accepted by the President, this Committee does endorse Henry E. Cooper, as its first choice for Governor of Hawaii."

The resolution was framed as a compromise to avoid the party fight that would have developed had an effort been made to follow the example of the executive committee and ask Carter to withdraw his "resignation."

Cooper appeared to be agreed upon generally as a harmonizer. Those who wanted to censure Carter and those who wanted to ask him to remain in office and ask the President to reject his resignation, satisfied themselves with the compromise form of expression that was adopted, and the vote was unanimous.

The action, according to those who took part, is by no means a confirmation of the executive committee action, as stated in the Advertiser account of the meeting. The executive committee openly asked Carter to withdraw a resignation he was supposed to have sent in, and asked President Roosevelt not to accept it if Carter insisted.

Those present at the meeting, in person or by proxy were: Chairman A. G. M. Robertson, Vice Chairman John C. Lane, Secretary W. T. Rawlins H. J. Lyman, W. Horner, George C. Hewitt, G. P. Kamaooha, E. A. Frazer, J. P. Cooke, S. E. Kalama, W. P. Hala, M. K. Nakulua, George H. Dunn, Sam Johnson, Fred Meyer, D. Douglas, Henry Vida, Charles H. Clark, J. H. K. Kaiwi, George W. Mahikoa, W. W. Harris and W. T. Robinson. Meyer is a new member in place of W. W. Goodale, Wailua, whose resignation was accepted. Harry T. Murray was secretary.

At the suggestion of Robertson a committee of three was decided upon, to re-arrange the rules so as to provide for county committees. A resolution expressing regrets at the departure of T. McCants Stewart was adopted, also expressing appreciation of his valuable services to the Republican party.

Sam Johnson wanted an investigation of a report that he had supported Henry on election day, but no one took up his challenge to make an accusation, and the matter was dropped.

DIED.

BOGAERT—At the Malulani Hospital, Wailuku, Maui, on Saturday, June 1, 1905, Rev. Father Oliver Bogaert, in charge of the district of Lahaina. Father Oliver was born in Belgium on October 27, 1857, in the city of Courbray, where his parents are yet living. He arrived here on November 28, 1881 in the company of his Lordship, the present Bishop Albert H. Boeynaems. He worked here faithfully many years, mostly in the district of Kohala, Hawaii.

STALEY—Near New Brighton, Cheshire England, May 4, 1905, Mrs. Staley, relict of the late Bishop Staley, the first bishop of the Anglican church in Hawaii. Anglican Church Chronicle gives the following account of her death: The deceased lady during her residence for eight years in the islands, made many warm friends, some of whom remain today. Warm impulsive and generous to a fault she drew to her both young and old. The Hawaiians fully reciprocated the great affection she bestowed upon them. There is a grave of one of her children in the Nuuanu consecrated cemetery and every year in Decoration Day it has a lei upon it. Since the death of her husband, Mrs. Staley has lived with her son, the Rev. Leonard S. Staley, or with her daughters, Edith and Blanche. Her eldest son, Evelyn, who occupies a high position in India, returned to England in time to see her in her last moments. All her children now in England received the Holy Communion at her bedside. She was in fullest possession of all her faculties up to the very last. They buried her by the side of the bishop, her husband, at Boscombe near Bourne-mouth.

Two daughters were absent from their mother's bedside—Constance, now Mrs. Copeland, who resides in Boston, Mass., and Mildred who is a physician in India. The latter paid a visit to Honolulu, her birth place, a few years ago. Queen Emma was her god-mother.

FOREIGN NEWS BY CABLE

POTEMKIN HAS NOT SURRENDERED.

ODESSA, July 3.—The battleship Potemkin was not surrendered by the mutineers, but has sailed for Sebastopol. A council of the admirals and captains has resolved to draw the fires of the squadron and send the officers and men ashore on account of disaffection.

POTEMKIN MAKES PORT.

LONDON, July 3.—The Potemkin and a torpedo boat have arrived at Kustendji, Roumania, and asked for provisions.

ONE THOUSAND DROWNED IN A MEXICAN FLOOD.

CITY OF MEXICO, July 3.—The city of Guanajuato has been swept away, one thousand people being drowned. Guanajuato, the capital of the state of the same name, is situated on a river in the mountainous portion of Mexico, being about 175 miles directly northwest of the City of Mexico. It is the center of the richest gold and silver mines in the republic. Many of the mines, after being idle for a long time, are now being reopened and this has brought Guanajuato into much prominence recently. The city has a population of 52,112, is on a branch of the Mexican Central Railroad and has, or had a magnificent opera house, costing over a million of dollars.

SWEDEN'S NAVAL PREPARATIONS.

STOCKHOLM, July 3.—The Government has made proclamation declaring Stockholm, Karlskrona, Gothenburg and Farosund to be war ports and excluding foreign warships therefrom. Stockholm is the capital of Sweden and is situated on the east coast of that country, directly across the Baltic Sea from the Gulf of Finland. Faroo, probably close to Farosund is on an island of Gothland about 100 miles south of Stockholm. Karlskrona is near the southeast extremity of Sweden. Gothenburg commands one of the narrowest portions of the Cattagat between Sweden and Denmark, and is directly open to attack from the Norwegian coast across Bolms Bay.

EMPOWERED TO CONCLUDE PEACE.

OYSTER BAY, July 3.—It is officially announced that the plenipotentiaries, Muravieff, Rosen, Komura and Takahira, are empowered to conclude a treaty of peace. M. Muravieff is the Russian Minister of Justice and Baron Rosen was Russian Minister at Tokio before the outbreak of the war. Baron Komura is the Japanese Minister of Foreign Affairs and Mr. Kogoro Takahira is the Japanese Minister to the United States.

ARMISTICE BEING ADVANCED.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 3.—Negotiations for an armistice are making progress. THE CZAR THREATENED.

ST. PETERSBURG, July 2.—The resignation of Minister Bouligan is impending. A number of bombs have been found in the rear of the palace of Tsarskoe-selo. The domestic situation is growing worse every day.

PROVISIONS FOR THE POTEMKIN.

ODESSA, July 2.—Provisions have been sent to the surrendered battleship Potemkin. The exodus from the city continues.

CHICAGO INDICTMENTS.

CHICAGO, July 2.—Seventeen prominent butchers, including the Armour and the Swifts, have been indicted by the Federal grand jury for violation of the anti-trust law. Thirty participants in the recent teamsters' strike have likewise been indicted.

THE MOROCCO CONFERENCE.

PARIS, July 2.—It is believed in diplomatic circles that, in its essential details, the conference upon the Morocco question has been substantially agreed upon, and that only some details remain to be arranged.

CHINESE FAVOR THE BOYCOTT

SHOW SYMPATHY WITH THE REPRISALS WHICH CHINA IS COMMENCING ON AMERICAN TRADE

The meeting of Chinese on Saturday evening for the purpose of protesting against the treatment of Chinese by the United States was well attended and the speeches made against exclusion were vigorous and full of the Oriental view of the situation. Among those who addressed the gathering were Akana, Ng Ping, Kong Mau Tak, Ching Kim, Rev. E. W. Thwing, Lau Kan, Kukwai Long, Lee Khai Fai and Choy Wan.

The following resolution was adopted by a unanimous vote and amid enthusiastic cheering: "That we the Chinese population of Hawaii, in mass meeting assembled, do hereby oppose the signing and ratification of the exclusion treaty by our government and heartily endorse the action of our countrymen in the Empire of China;

"And, that a copy of this resolution be sent to the Foreign Office in Peking and all the principal cities, merchants, guilds and chambers of commerce throughout China."

TRIPLETS ON MAUI.

KIPAHULU, Maui, June 30.—At noon Thursday, June 27, Mrs. Antone Madeiros, wife of a Portuguese Luma for Kipahulu Sugar Co., gave birth to triplets of two girls and one boy. The boy died the following day, and one of the girls died later. The other girl is not expected to live. Mother doing well.

A CONSUL MARRIED.

KIPAHULU, Maui, June 30.—On the 24th Mr. H. W. Schmidt, formerly Consul for Norway and Sweden, and of Honolulu, was united in marriage with Miss J. H. W. Schmidt of Honolulu. Miss Schmidt arrived here on the 22nd on the steamer Maui from Honolulu. Mr. Schmidt is the manager of the Kipahulu Sugar Co.'s store.

ANCIENT TEMPLE FOUND.

Thomas G. Thrum has made an interesting discovery of an ancient heiau, or temple, near Waimoa point, about four miles from the Haleiwa Hotel. The place though partially in ruins is in fair state of preservation.

WIGHT APPOINTED.

C. L. Wight, who has been for many years manager of the Wilder Steamship Company, has been chosen by Acting Governor Atkinson to succeed Dr. W. D. Alexander as a member of the Board of Education. W. H. Farrington was appointed to succeed himself. Professor Alexander has been in the department for eighteen years and has devoted much attention to developing the system. He retires at his own wish and will devote more time to his work as a member of the Board of Archives.

MAIL STEAMERS DUE.

The S. S. Nebraska is expected to arrive this afternoon from San Francisco with nine days later mail. The S. S. Korea is due tomorrow morning from the Orient en route to San Francisco and the S. S. Sierra is due tomorrow from the Colonies. Both vessels will sail in the afternoon for San Francisco.
