WILL ENLIGHTEN NAVAL CHAIRMAN

CONGRESSMAN FOSS WILL BE AMONG THOSE TO VISIT PEARL HARBOR ON THE IROQUOIS.

There is one member of the Tift Party, who will come in for more earnest attention than almost any other members of the crowd that will arrive here tomorrow on the Manchuria. He is Congressman George E. Foss the chairman on Naval Affairs. Captain H. W. Lyon the commandant of the naval station, has been appointed by the committee of arrangements to take charge of the entertainment of Chairman Foss and, with the assistance of Lieutenant Commander Niblack of the U. S. Iroquois, will do all that is possible during the stay of the party in Honolulu, to enlighten the Congressman on the needs of Hawaii as regards naval matters.

Chairman Foss has already expressed a desire to visit Pearl Harbor, so in the afternoon, he together with other members of the party, will be taken to that interesting part of Oahu. They will go in the Iroquois, leaving Honolulu about 2:30 o'clock in the afternoon.

Captain Lyon and Commander A. P. Niblack will explain to Chairman Foss the necessity of having the navy improvements begun at Pearl Harbor. The various sites for the navy yards will be pointed out and the advantages of the place explained.

TO RESERVE FOREST LANDS

GOVERNOR ATKINSON HAS CALLED A PUBLIC HEARING ON THE MATTER OF RESERVE.

A public hearing on the question of the reservation of the forest lands between the lava flow of 1855 and the Hilo-Hamaku district boundary line has been called by Governor Atkinson, acting under Chapter 28 of the Revised Laws of Hawaii.

The section proposed for the reserve will include a large tract of land in the upper heights of Hawaii which now act as a reservoir for a vast amount of water. A heavy forest of koa covers the land.

The meeting is called for Wednesday July 19 at the office of the Board of Agriculture and Forestry, King street when any person having opinions on the advisability, or otherwise, or constituting the reserve will be heard.

The calling of the meeting is rather a pro forma matter as in the different cases previously disposed of there has been no protest against reservation lodged.

THE DOLLAR CASE

John C. Bruce, captain of the Stanley Dollar, with E. C. Peters as attorney, has filed an appearance in the federal court in the matter of the libels brought against the steamer by Japanese who took passage on her. Bruce appears as representing the owners of the vessel and asks for a ten days' postponement of the proceedings against her. No bond has been filed as yet in the case of the last 36 Japanese who brought a libel against the vessel.

NEW TREASURES FROM THE ARCHIVES

WORK ON THE ARCHIVES BUILDING HAS BEGUN—WHAT THE ARCHIVES ARE YIELDING UP.

Work on the new Archives building has begun. The contract has been let to the Hawaiian Engineering and Construction Company and will cost \$50,000. It will be at least six months, it is said, before it will be completed. The feature of the building is the fire-proof fixtures. The building itself will be fire-proof and so will all the furniture except the chairs.

The appropriation for taking care of the archives is only \$75 a month, which is far too small for the purpose, it is said. It is believed by the commissioners that many of the archives to be made available, should be, not type-written, but printed in cheap pamphlet form. This will make them much more available than if type-written merely.

Dr. Alexander who has already delved deeply into the treasures that are being brought to light, says that much that is of important historical value is being found. For instance there is correspondence between Lord George Paulet and Admiral Thomas with the Minister of Foreign Affairs of Hawaii, after the restoration of the Kingdom and the events of 1842. The existence of this correspondence has not been known to any historian of the Islands. In this correspondence, Lord George Paulet expresses a change of views as to the matters with which he dealt and regret that they had been misrepresented to him, so as to lead him to take the action he did.

In this correspondence besides, there is much to throw light on acts and motives that have hitherto been matter of conjecture.
