THE CHINESE BOYCOTT.

SAN FRANCISCO, July 30.—Getz Brothers of this city have received a cablegram from their Shanghai agent asking them to cancel all their Chinese contracts on account of the boycott against American goods.

OYAMA NOW MOVING TO ISOLATE VLADIVOSTOK.

KHERSUB, Manchuria, July 30.—The Japanese forces are concentrating for the purpose of operating against Kirin and cutting General Linevitch's army off from Vladivostok.

NEW YORK FEARS PANAMA FEVER.

NEW YORK, July 30.—Seventeen of the passengers and the crew of the mail steamer which arrived from Colon, Panama, yesterday have been detained in quarantine for observation.

BENNINGTON INQUIRY MONDAY.

SAN DIEGO, July 30.—Two more of the men injured in the Bennington disaster died yesterday. The inquiry will begin Monday.

COURT-MARTIAL FOR MUTINEERS.

ODESSA, July 30.—The naval authorities are preparing to court-martial the mutineers from the battleship Kniaz Potemkin.

REJECT ENGLAND'S OFFER.

BASLE, Switzerland, July 31.—The Zionist Congress here, after a very tumultuous session, has rejected Great Britain's offer of a tract of land in East Africa for a site for a colony.

CONY ISLAND, July 31.—During a thunder storm here, lightning killed six persons and seriously injured twelve others.

YELLOW JACK INCREASING.

NEW ORLEANS, July 31.—Twenty-seven new cases of yellow fever and three deaths are reported.

LONDON, July 31.—A strike of 60,000 cotton operatives is threatened because of the refusal of employers to grant an advance in wages.

FIGHTING IN STREETS OF SAGHALIEN.

The following cablegrams were received by the Japanese Consul yesterday from Japan's Minister at Washington: Washington, July 30th, 1905.

The Saghalien army reports that an independent cavalry force, which entered Louikov on the afternoon of July 27, withdrew that night owing to grave unrest in the town.

The army's left column commenced a movement at 3 a. m., July 28, for the occupation of Louikov, and its advance guard with cavalry, after attacking the enemy on the north side of Louikov, entered that town, where street fighting ensued at 8:30 a. m. Louikov was completely captured.

The army's right column, after defeating the enemy near Wedernikovski, pressed hard upon him and his main force has been in disorderly flight southward since the night of the 27th.

A detachment sent for pursuit met him on the 28th at a point eight kilometres south of Louikov. The enemy's infantry was about 800 strong, of whom 200 were killed and 500 finally captured.

The enemy, who has confronted our right column since the 28th, consists of 30,000 infantry with eight guns, while that confronting our left consist of 20,000 infantry and four guns. HIOKI.

OCCUPATION OF LOUIKOV.

Washington, July 30th, 1905. To the Japanese Consul-General, Honolulu.

The Saghalien army reports that it commenced its march at dawn on July 27, pressing hard upon the enemy. At 3 p. m. the advance-guard occupied Derbenkoye, while cavalry entered Louikov.

A detachment which advanced eastward via the district near Novomich Aelovskoye, defeated the enemy, consisting of infantry and artillery near Wedernikovski at 3 p. m., July 27, and immediately started in pursuit. HIOKI.

FAMOUS "BLIND" LOAN HAS BEEN PAID

Said to Have Been Made by Alexander and Jordan or by Their Agents.

NEW YORK, July 21.—The World says that the loan of \$685,000 to the Equitable Life Assurance Society by the Mercantile Trust Company has been paid.

The World says: This payment was made last Friday by former President Alexander and former Controller Jordan, or by persons unknown for their account.

Jordan, when called upon the telephone last night at his summer home, refused to say a word in regard to the matter. James W. Alexander is very ill at a retreat near Babylon. His attorneys, when asked concerning the payment, declined to make any statement.

State Banking Superintendent F. D. Kilburn said to the World correspondent at Albany last night:

"The loan was made by the Mercantile to James W. Alexander, president of the Equitable, and Thomas D. Jordan, controller of the same company."

"Was there any security?"

"No; it was a note made by them as trustees. I ordered it paid and it was taken up on July 14th by them, or on their accounts. I believed that it was mixed up with the affairs of the Equitable and should not be carried."

"Do you know for what purpose the loan was made or for what the money was used?"

"I do not."

SHOOTING AT THE TARGETS

If arrangements can be made for accommodation the Hawaiian National Guards' rifle team which is to compete in the national matches at Seagirt, N. J. will sail on the transport Solace or if not then they will go on the Alameda.

The would-be representatives of the territory have been practicing steadily over the Kahauiki range and despite the tricky nature of the wind there have been piling up some good scores. Yesterday for the first time they took up the skirmishing practice advancing from the 600 yard butt to 200 yards and then retiring firing two shots at each range in limited time. The practice was good.

The men who are practicing in hopes of making the team which will consist of twelve men and three alternates are as follows: Col. Soper, Captains Sam Johnson, Merle Johnson, Rose, Coyne and J. A. Thompson; Lieutenants Wise, Coster, Cummins and Whitehead; Sergeants Devauchelle and Ellis, and Privates Gouveia, Ferreira and Todd.
