SUGAR SEASON NEARLY ENDED

VESSELS ARE BEGINNING TO TAKE ONLY PARITAL CARGOES COASTWISE.

Vessels are now beginning to leave port with short cargoes of sugar. The sugar season is now drawing to a close and in future most of the vessels to depart from Honolulu and other ports as well, will take only partial cargoes.

The barkentine Irmgard was the first vessel to leave with a light cargo of sugar. She went out with only 607 tons of sugar, whereas she usually carries about 1,000 tons. The bark George Curtis which is now in port loading sugar for San Francisco, will go out with a short cargo and so will other vessels that are to load. The Emily F. Whitney will probably get a full load at Makawili as she goes to that port from Honolulu.

The bark Amy Turner now loading at Hilo will depart next week for San Francisco with a full load of sugar. The S. S. Arizonan due to depart in a few days from San Francisco for Honolulu, will get a full load of sugar for Delaware Breakwater about the islands.

TO ENCOURAGE CITIZEN LABOR

ACTING GOVERNOR ATKINSON SUGGESTS NEW PLAN AND CRITICIZES PROPERTY HOLDERS.

Acting Governor Atkinson has consulted with Superintendent of Public Works Holloway regarding the sale of some lands suitable for homesteads in Nuuanu valley. The acting governor wants to make an agreement with the purchasers as part of the sale, that they shall erect a home on the land they purchase and shall not employ non-citizen labor in doing so.

Atkinson called attention to several cases in which large building enterprises were carried on by alien labor, in some cases the owners being wealthy people and expressed disapproval of such failure to use citizen labor.

HOSPITAL FUNDS IN GOOD SHAPE

BIENNIAL AND SEMI-ANNUAL REPORTS OF THE QUEEN'S HOSPITAL HAVE BEEN SUBMITTED

The Biennial report of the Queen's Hospital Association has been filed by Treasurer E. F. Bishop with the officers and members. It is for the two years ending July 15 last. The report shows receipts amounting to \$119,998.06 which together with a balance of \$36,998.89 from the former period bring the total up to \$156,996.95. The main items of the receipt account are legislative appropriations, \$37,811.50; pay patients \$26,336.80; interest, \$12,825.53; rents, \$5,304.95 and loans paid in \$32,673.75. The disbursements amount to \$155,528.69, leaving a balance on hand of \$1,468.26.

The new Pauahi wing constructed during the past year was a large item in the disbursements. The contract price for the building was \$53,333.00 and certain extras brought the total up to \$54,596.60. The grading, power service and one-half the builder's insurance amounting in all to \$466.90 must be deducted from this leaving the total construction cost \$54,129.64. The elevators architect's bill furnishings and incidentals bring the cost of the wing up to \$63,788.04.

The assets of the corporation total \$252,279.10 and the balance or operating account amounts to \$52,905.51. The previous balance was \$47,794.47, a gain of \$4,510.54.

The treasurer also submitted the ninety-second semi-annual report of receipts and disbursements for the six months ending July 15, 1905. The receipts for this period were \$28,747.32 which with the balance on hand of \$14,069.22 made a total fund of \$42,816.54. The disbursements for the period were \$41,648.79, leaving a balance of \$1,167.75. The outstanding loans amount to \$25,250.00 and other securities are held to the value of \$10,300.00. Three mortgages of \$7,000.00, \$50,000.00 and \$2,500.00 were foreclosed in the last two years.
