**SUBPOENAED HERE FROM SAN DIEGO**

**SUMMONS FROM LOCAL COURT FOR CORPORAL HITCHINGS OF 38TH COAST ARTILLERY.**

A federal subpoena is out for Corporal Hitchings, formerly of Camp McKinley and now of San Diego, California, to appear in the court in Honolulu as a witness before the next Grand Jury. The subpoena is in the hands of Marshal Hendry, like all other subpoenas, but of course he cannot go to San Diego to serve it. It will have to be served by mail, and there is a question as to whether Hitchings will have to answer it. He is wanted in connection with the prosecution of Corporal Hamilton, in the counterfeiting cases. If Hitchings has to answer the summons, the government will have to pay his fare from San Diego and back. It will probably cost the government about \$300 to get the testimony of Hitchings.

**FUEL GAS AND PUBLIC HEALTH**

**BOARD OF HEALTH IS WONDERING WHAT ITS RIGHTS AND POWERS ARE.**

Is fuel gas a proper subject of Board of Health anxiety? Is a question that has been passed up to Deputy Attorney General W. S. Fleming and on which he is writing an opinion. When the new gas company began to lay pipes under its franchise, its operations were watched by the department of Public Works, as a matter involving the use of streets and because the franchise of the company specifically states that the pipe connections, etc., shall be under the supervision of that department. Recently, however, the Board of Health has begun to wonder if the gas pipes may not have an effect on public health if they are not properly connected, and it has asked the attorney general to define its powers in the matter.

The tracing of the respective authority of the public works and health departments in the matter appears to involve some rather fine legal discrimination. Leaking gas pipes might cause sickness, it is argued, hence the Board of Health, by virtue of its general powers and duties, ought to look after the gas pipes. On the other hand the franchise law places their supervision with the superintendent of Public Works.

**CASE WILL NOW BE SUBMITTED**

Board of Supervisors of the County of Oahu his demand in writing, against the County of Oahu for the sum of fourteen and 25-100 dollars (\$14.25) for expense of labor incurred by him as such Superintendent of the Police and Fire Alarm System during the month of July, A. D. 1935, as set out in paragraph II hereof, a copy of which demand is hereby attached, made a part hereof, and marked "Exhibit A."

That on the 16th day of August, A. D. 1935, the Board of Supervisors of said County of Oahu adopted the following resolution:

"Be it resolved by the Board of Supervisors that we hereby appropriate from general fund for an account to be known as the 'Expense Police and Fire Alarm System' the sum of fourteen and 25-100 dollars (\$14.25) for the month of July, and the Auditor and Treasurer are hereby notified that fourteen and 25-100 dollars (\$14.25) is the maximum amount allowed for Expense Police and Fire Alarm System during the month of July, 1935."

The legal questions that the said parties to this proceeding desire to submit to the Supreme Court of the Territory of Hawaii are:

(1) Whether the defendant, as Treasurer of the County of Oahu, has the right to refuse payment of the warrant in question upon the grounds stated by him as above set forth, to wit: that the services and labor performed were not performed by the said W. L. Frazee personally, but by the said John Hapu and Charles Pilmoku, under his direction and control.

(2) Whether or not the said defendant as Treasurer of the County of Oahu has the right, in any event, to refuse to pay a warrant in due form issued by the Auditor of the County of Oahu under the direction of the Board of Supervisors of said County; and,

(3) Whether or not the Board of Supervisors of the County of Oahu has the power and authority to authorize said W. L. Frazee as Superintendent of the Police and Fire Alarm System of the County of Oahu to collect from the County of Oahu, and after such collection disburse to the parties entitled thereto the sums of money represented by the labor and services so performed by the said John Hapu and Charles Pilmoku, under his direction and control.


