**ANOTHER BOOST FOR GENERAL WOOD**

HIS FRIEND PRESIDENT ROOSEVELT IS SAID TO BE INTENT ON MAKING HIM A MEMBER OF THE GENERAL STAFF—STRONG FEELING THROUGHOUT THE ARMY AGAINST THE PROPOSAL.

WASHINGTON, D. C., August 1.—Major-General Leonard Wood is once more a bone of contention in the army. Having forced his confirmation as a major-general, President Roosevelt is now reported to be trying to make Wood a member of the general staff against the wishes of that body and Lieutenant General Chaffee.

As a result the army is gnashing its teeth in rage. In the meantime General Wood is somewhere in Massachusetts recuperating after an operation for a thickening of the skull due to a slight blow suffered some months ago.

Army officers say Wood always was lucky. That influence have been brought to bear on the president to induce him to boom Wood once more is evidenced by the fact that within a day after the promulgation of orders by the general staff, which did not mention General

Wood, the President suspended the orders, and the sole reason given was that the health of General Wood might prevent his return to the Philippines. Up to the receipt of the order of suspension nothing was known of the really precarious state of General Wood's health and the indications are that he went over the head of everybody to make his condition known direct to the President.

As the result of the President's stand there are now three recognized candidates for the position on the general staff made vacant by the assignment of Brig.-Gen. Trasker H. Bliss to other duties. When the vacancy occurred Lieut.-Gen. Chaffee named as his candidate Brig.-Gen. W. H. Carter, now in command of the department of the Visayas, Philippines. General Carter is the man who drew up and passed through congress the bill creating the general staff. For his activity in this respect he was dubbed the "legs of root" and among the opposition in the army to the general staff measure, has few friends. The remainder of the general staff recommended Brig.-Gen. Thomas H. Barry, now with the Russian army in Manchuria, as its candidate. The board directed to choose between the candidates consisted of Generals F. D. Grant, J. F. Bell, A. L. Mills, John C. Bates, chairman, and Col. Mills. This board overruled Lieut.-Gen. Chaffee and chose Barry. As a compromise General Carter was to be transferred to Chicago as the commander of the department of the great lakes.

The President has the final approval of assignments of generals in the army. Whether or not he approved the choice of Barry and the assignment of Carter and Bliss is unknown, but the fact remains that such an order was promulgated from the War Department last Thursday and General Barry was elected head of the war college, a post which goes along with the appointment of a general to the general staff. The next day the order was suspended by order of the President and everybody has been told to keep mum about it.

The fact that General Wood was overlooked in the rearrangement of commanding generals by the general staff would make it appear that the staff would be glad to see General Wood remain in the Philippines indefinitely. He has been there less than two years and has just concluded a triumphant campaign against the Moros, with small loss to his own troops and great loss to the enemy. The army does not understand why he should want a transfer. Whispers around the War Department are to the effect that the President would like to see General Wood come to Washington. Army officers are reticent about discussing the matter, but underground mutterings show a plain resentment on their part to the forcing of Wood to the front over the heads of other men of larger experience, as was done when Wood was made a major-general.

**THE MOON ONCE IN THE PACIFIC**

PROF. PICKERING ADDRESSES THE RESEARCH CLUB AT THE RESIDENCE OF DR. ALEXANDER

There was a large attendance at the meeting of the Research Club at the residence of Dr. and Mrs. W. D. Alexander, Punahou, last evening. W. H. Pickering, astronomer of Harvard gave a talk on the geology of the moon. He came to Hawaii to study our volcanoes for the light they might throw on the volcanoes of the moon. He says he has found much of value.

He advanced the hypothesis that the moon was thrown from the earth at least 50,000,000 years ago. By possibility the material which now forms the moon occupied the space that the Pacific Ocean does now.

**DEATH OF MISS DAVIS.**  
News has been received from Modesto, Cal., of the death of Miss Frankie Davis sister of Mrs. Thomas Wall of this city. She was a victim of pleurisy which developed into heart failure and caused sudden death. She had been ill only a week. She was 21 years of age.

**DESERTED BLIND WIFE.**  
Kelupaina Namakakapu Ah Sing has brought a libel for divorce against her Chinese husband, Ah Sing. The parties were married January 1, 1902, and last lived together at Kailhi. The wife alleges desertion as follows:  
"That while they lived at said Kailhi plaintiff was unfortunately stricken with blindness in her eyes that she could hardly see anything for some time. She was deprived of her eyesight. And that during her time of blindness she was taken care of by her family and that her said husband, knowing that plaintiff was helpless left and deserted her in the month of June of the same year (1902) and since that time the said defendant has been separated from plaintiff for more than three (3) years." J. Mokuohai Poepoe is attorney for plaintiff.

**YOUNGREN FELL OVERBOARD.**  
While the S. S. Enterprise was lying off the harbor yesterday afternoon waiting for the tug Fearless to take the barge Santiago outside so that the Enterprise could send the tow line to the barge, Captain Youngren the commander of the Enterprise lost his balance and fell overboard from the bridge. He was rescued. The vessels departed for Hilo where the Enterprise will receive a load of bananas and then resume the voyage to San Francisco.
