Times of the tide were taken from the U. S. Coast and Geodetic Survey tables. The tides at Kahului and Hilo occur about one hour earlier than at Honolulu, Hawaiian standard time is 10 hours 30 minutes slower than Greenwich time, being that of the meridian of 157 degrees 20 minutes. The time whistle blows at 1:30 p. m., which is the same as Greenwich, 0 hours, 0 minutes. The Sun and Moon are for local time for the whole group.

### METEOROLOGY OF SEPTEMBER.

The following data, covering a period of 29 years, have been compiled from the weather bureau and McKibbin records at Honolulu, T. H. They are issued to show the conditions that have prevailed, during the month in question, for the above period of years but must not be construed as a forecast of the weather conditions for the coming month.

Month September for 29 years.

TEMPERATURE, (1880-1904.)  
Mean or normal temperature, 78°.  
The warmest month was that of 1891 with an average of 80°.  
The coldest month was that of 1895, with an average of 77°.  
The highest temperature was 88° on September 9 and 15, 1890; September 29, 1891; September 14, 1892; September 10, 1896; September 12, 1900.  
The lowest temperature was 65° on September 15, 1890.

PRECIPITATION (rain) (1877-1894 and 1904.)  
Average for the month, 1.24 inches.  
Average number of days with .01 of an inch or more, 14.  
The greatest monthly precipitation was 2.95 inches in 1888.  
The least monthly precipitation was 0.35 inches in 1883.  
The greatest amount of precipitation recorded in any 24 consecutive hours was 1.27 inches on September 8, 1888.

CLOUDS AND WEATHER, (1890-1904.)  
Average number of clear days, 13; partly cloudy days, 15; cloudy days, 2.  
WIND.  
The prevailing winds have been from the northeast.  
The average hourly velocity of the wind during September 1904 was 6.5 miles an hour.  
The highest velocity of the wind during September, 1904, was 20 miles from the northeast on the 2nd.



## TAFT CHANGES HIS MIND ON EXCLUSION

SECRETARY OF WAR NOW SAYS THAT LAWS AND TREATIES MUST ALL BE ENFORCED.

SANTA ROSA, August 17.—A letter has been received and published here from Congressman D. E. McKinlay, a member of the Taft party, written aboard the steamer between Honolulu and Japan and forwarded from the latter place. Among other things McKinlay writes of Taft's attitude on the Chinese exclusion question as follows: "At the banquet (in Honolulu) we were all duly informed and impressed with the gravity of the situation and the proposed remedy. Secretary Taft rose to the occasion and answered fully and completely. I believe for all the delegation. The planters are pleading for the limited admission of Chinese, in numbers from 40,000 to 70,000, for a period of from five to ten years, and they assure the delegation they will give a bond of \$1,000 for every Chinaman so brought in.

"No matter what mistake have arisen since Secretary Taft left the East on his journey to the Orient—mistakes of misconception of his plain words and meaning regarding his attitude towards the admission of the Chinese of any class not entitled to enter the United States—his plain, forceful talk to the Hawaiians at that luncheon set all straight so far as California is concerned. He declared to the planters of Hawaii that Chinese labor is now excluded under law and treaty and that the Administration has no desire to change either law or treaty, unless for further and closer restriction, and that those laws and treaties should remain unbroken and that the planters of Hawaii must adapt themselves to the situation as best they can. He left no mis-

take or misconception in the mind of any intelligent listener regarding the attitude of the Administration, it simply being to enforce the laws as they are, but to require from our immigration officials a certain degree of politeness and consideration in their enforcement—such politeness and consideration as an American citizen had a right to expect on a visitation to the country to which the excluded persons belong.
