**TOWN TALK**

By The Man About Town.

Superintendent Davis' sudden rebellion against the Carter plan of running all the departments was the surprise of the week. Who would have suspected that the mild mannered superintendent of public instruction who stepped into Atkinson's shoes about six months ago, would suddenly develop official nerve enough to go over and tell Carter he wanted to run his own department affairs and offer his resignation when Carter failed to meet his views? Some say that the resignation was a "bluff" and that Davis was a surprised and deeply disappointed man when he saw the sudden result was to sever his connection with the department. If it was a bluff, of course it was tried on the wrong man. Davis might have known that Carter would very quickly respond with an acceptance. But the matter in dispute had been discussed before, and Davis knew Carter's attitude. It really looks as if he was too independent to pretend to be a head of a department when the governor insisted on running it.

I am given to understand that there is more or less rankling soreness of heart among other members of the Carter Cabinet, over the one-man rule which prevails in the Capitol. No so-called head of a department ever takes any step of importance without an order from the governor. It may be a good system, but it isn't what either Congress or the legislature contemplated.

Mention of the Capitol reminds me of Treasurer Campbell and the New York Life investigation, which was so carefully kept a secret. I am able to assert that but for an accident the fact that grave charges had been filed with a public official against the New York Life would not be public yet. The newspaperman who got the news got it quite by accident. The treasurer had the charges hidden away, or filed away, and like many others the whole incident might have passed on in secret. As soon as the press found out about it, the treasurer easily saw that the papers in the case were public documents and that the whole proceeding should be public.

The Hawaiian Capitol is a huge nest of guarded secrets. When the average public official here has any department business his first dread seems to be that the public will learn what he is doing. I do not know why it is. It is impossible to explain the phenomenon. Perhaps it is the training of a monarchy. All I know is that from the cupola to the basement, excepting the federal offices, the attitude of officialdom is almost uniformly one of sturdy opposition to letting the press have anything about that is going on. The question always is Why should the public be told? other than why should the public not be told? When one department communicates with another, on public business, the communication is often accompanied by a caution—"do not let the news get out."

The contrast between this attitude and the ordinary American attitude is striking. The contrast between the two sets of officials here, the Territorial and the federal, is equally striking in this respect. I do not mean all the Territorial officials, for there have always been some who recognize public right to information about the management of public affairs.

I happened to be talking to Judge Dole the other day on the subject of naturalization of aliens when I mentioned a curious case which had come under my own observation in British Columbia.

A Royal Commission was investigating certain matters in connection with the salmon fishing up there when a big Scandinavian with an atrocious accent came forward to testify. There was a ripple of amusement as he testified to the harm that aliens were doing to the fishing.

He was asked when he had been naturalized himself and replied blandly that he had never been naturalized.

"Ay hane boorn British subject," he said.

"Where were you born?" he was asked.

"Ay hane boorn in Finland" was his answer, and again there was a laugh but the big man made good in his claim all the same for he had been born at Bomarsund in the Baltic during the time of the Crimean war and while the place which had been captured from the Russians was under the British flag. It was held that the man's claim to being a British subject was perfectly good.

"That is very interesting" said Judge Dole "and it seems to me speaking of hand that it is good law." It opens up a possible subject for discussion here in Hawaii. I don't think the point has been ever raised but it would certainly seem that all persons who were born here in Hawaii during the British occupation under Lord George Paulet would also be British subjects if they wished to claim it. Certainly it was an act of force on Paulet's part, but then so was the seizure of Bomarsund from the Russians. The fact that there was no fighting here did not make the seizure any less an act of war.

"No, I do not know if any people now who were born just at that time but I think I had a narrow escape from it myself" said the Judge.

Of course United States Judge Dole is too sedate and dignified to perpetrate a practical joke from the bench consciously, and he has probably not the slightest idea that he ever perpetrated any at all, but there are several young lawyers in town who think they are victims. The Judge had a lot of arrangements the other day and the defendants were without counsel and

without funds. It was evident in advance that the court would have to appoint attorneys to defend them—free. Shortly before the hour for court to convene a number of young attorneys resolved word by telephone that Judge Dole would like to see them. Of course the summons was answered with speed. I know of one attorney who phoned for a hack and hastened full speed to the court, full of expectancy. The lawyers all found that they were simply wanted to be around and available for the bankrupt defendants and some got appointments.

One of the soldiers from Camp McKinley who is now under arrest for possessing counterfeit money, dropped into the police station during one of the nights when Rawlins was Deputy High Sheriff, and surrendered himself. The soldier had a crying jag. With tears of alcohol and remorse he declared that he had come to confess to a murder. Would the police please lock him up and see that he was duly hanged for his crime? Rawlins listened to the story, found out by questions that it was apparently a true one, and sent the man below for the night. When morning came some more questioning was done. The final result was a discovery that the soldier had shot a nigger in Alabama and had been tried and acquitted.

A friend has given me a problem for our mutual friend, the Rev. Sereno Bishop and I hasten to pass it up to that distinguished representative of the cloth. The question is, what right has a church to advertise an entertainment, peddle tickets for it, and then neither give the entertainment nor return the money for tickets sold on the strength of the advertised entertainment.

"I bought a ticket for that Ewa church show," said my friend. "It was represented to me that there was to be a dance, and I gave my good money, as did several others I know. We were expecting to go, but just on the last day before the show the Rev. Sereno Bishop disapproved the dance and an announcement was made that there would not be any. If a private theatrical or other concern did a thing like that there would be a mob at the box office or perhaps a prosecution for gross cheat. Is not the church expected to keep good faith in money matters? I am simply out the sum I paid for my ticket, like a number of others are. I have been buncoed by a church. It must be all right, somehow, but I would like to know how the Rev. Dr. Bishop and those who acted with him reconcile their religious and moral principles with such a method of imposing on the public."

Of course I can't answer such a question. It is good to know that the church entertainment was successful beyond the numbers of actual attendance. And the tainted money question was decided against Dr. Gladden anyhow.

What sort of a Jonah is there presiding over the fair repute of the esteemed Hi Henry that he should meet trouble every time charges are made

against Brown? It is very strange. I think there must be a terrible hoodoo somewhere. When Brown was charged with failing to stop gambling forward came witnesses to tell of bucking the tiger under Henry and Henry got it worse than Brown, except among the little headed fakes of the Advertiser. Now Vida is charged with making an assault in the police station. "Nothing at all to what happened when Henry was there," is one of the answers,—quite irrelevant, it must be admitted. But it would have done the civic Federationists' hearts good to see a picture of a certain supervisor and another official assuming the other day to describe Hi Henry's interview at the station with an untruthful witness. It was necessary to do some high jumping to illustrate the alleged Henry methods. I don't believe the story, because there would have been a dead man in the police office if the story were true. Henry is a heavy man and if he had done a clog dance all over a man after knocking him down there would unquestionably have been results. So I discredit the whole story.

So M. B. Curtis, Sam'l of Posen, managed to settle his affairs in the Colonies and leave for his home, wherever that is. He said something about losing \$4,000 on his last venture. I did not know that his propertyman carried that much stage money. It merely shows how unkind those Colonial authorities are, taking all that money away. If it had been in the United States, Curtis could probably have saved that \$4,000 by claiming that it was a part of his outfit and was exempt from seizure. But maybe he meant that he had lost the \$4,000 that he might get.

My esteemed friend the Princess Theresa is quoted as saying that she is not a princess. I do not credit that report. In the first place I never believe anything I see in some papers and in the second to lose the Princess would be to lose, what shall I say, not a familiar old land mark, but rather a memory of departed glory. No indeed, Princess she was, and Princess she must remain. The days of the French Revolution have passed, we cannot call her Citizeness Theresa. No, better that she remain Princess Theresa. This is a matter that the Promotion Committee should take up. Tourists visiting our fair land expect to eat dog at a native luan and they also have the right to be entertained by princesses. Who can perform that duty of graciousness any better than the Princess Theresa. None. Therefore public duty requires her to retain her title.
