

MAGOON AND KINNEY HAVE A HOT TIME

LEADING COUNSEL IN THE PARKER RANCH CASE SPEND THE MORNING IN A SHARP EXCHANGE OF QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS—KINNEY TRIES TO SHOW THAT HAMAKUA DITCH CO.'S INTERESTS WERE BEHIND BRINGING THE SUIT.

The liveliest hearing yet in the Parker Ranch case took place this morning when W. A. Kinney proceeded with the cross-examination of J. Alfred Magoon. It was give and take all morning. Kinney started out to show that behind the plan to proceed against Guardian Carter of Annie T. K. Parker, minor, the real influence was rather the wishes of the Hamakua Ditch Company, than consideration for the interests of the minor, also to show that Magoon was acting as counsel for both the minor and Sam Parker, though their interests were hostile.

The first questions asked related to the right of the mother of the minor to act as next friend. It appeared that in securing the appointment of J. S. Low, for the purpose of bringing the suits as next friend, the mother had not been consulted. Magoon admitted her right to act, but said that Low also had a right to act. There was no impropriety in Low taking the matter up. "Did you not recognize that the mother had the first right to act in such a matter?" asked Kinney. "There is no first right about it," said Magoon. "The court would recognize anybody who had a right to act, whether it was the mother or a first or fourth cousin or an entire stranger. The in-

terests of the minor are what the court looks at." Magoon said he recognized that the courts pay close attention to the wishes of a father or mother in such a matter. There was no legal reason for putting in his petition the reasons why the mother had not been consulted, which were that she was biased in favor of the guardian.

"Was there any motive to conceal the matter from her?" "None whatever. It would have been impossible, for she was named in the pleadings."

"That was after the appointment of Low had been secured, was it not?" Magoon replied in the affirmative.

Magoon said in answer to questions that there was no design or motive in keeping the proceedings from the mother. He denied that he had feared that she would oppose the appointment of Low, and said the court would not bear a controversy as to who should be a next friend. It never occurred to him that she would protest, and if he had secured any advantage by not notifying her of what he was doing, such advantage was inadvertently secured.

PASSENGERS WERE LEFT BY MONGOLIA

ABOUT 14 MEN CAME ASHORE THIS MORNING AND WERE NOT PERMITTED ABOARD AGAIN.

About fourteen passengers on the S. S. Mongolia were left behind in this port by the steamer today. It was charged that they had violated the instructions regarding the quarantine of the vessel and so were not permitted to return to the vessel.

Most of the men were members of the crew of the Pacific Mail Steamship Barracuta which was captured by the Japanese off Sakhalin Islands, on a charge of carrying contraband of war. They, in company with some other passengers in the steamer, left the steamer and came ashore. They claim that they had not been told they were to remain aboard, but when they went to the gate of the Hackfeld wharf this morning to return to the steamer, they were informed that they would not be allowed aboard.

They sent word to the officers of the vessel, but got no satisfaction and were told in effect that they had made their beds in Honolulu and that they would have to lie in them, so far as the Mongolia was concerned. They were charged with violating the quarantine order as the steamer passengers were not permitted ashore. There was nothing for them to do but to allow the steamer to go away without them.

Some of them applied to E. M. Watson asking if they could not prevent the departure of the steamer, but Watson advised them that the only redress they might have, lay in an action for damages. "The men claim that they have been dumped on the town practically, for few of them have any means. It is stated that they will be allowed to resume their voyage to San Francisco by the next steamer from the Orient."

TWO LOCAL HOTELS AGAIN REPORTED TO HAVE BEEN PLACED UNDER ONE CONTROL.

The rumor of the consolidation of the Alexander Young and Royal Hawaiian Hotels is again current in Honolulu. There is a report on very excellent authority that the two institutions are about to become substantially one in management, both under the ownership of Alexander Young. Fred Church, manager of the Hawaiian Hotel, is to leave that institution next week. This much is known. Who will be his successor is not known definitely. The consolidation with interests which own the Young is said to be practically complete, and the new manager will be an employe of Young, it is stated. Manager Bidgood of the Haleiwa Hotel may take the Hawaiian.

Dr. Knudsen Arrested In New York

KAUAI MAN WHOSE FRIENDS FEAR THAT HE HAS BECOME INSANE.

One of the San Francisco Examiners of recent date has a sensational story about Dr. Knudsen, formerly of Kauai and a brother of the speaker of the House. The doctor is said to have gone out of his head, and was arrested, it is stated, while running on the streets of Harlem on disheveled, and throwing money and jewels away. He left here recently, after being under medical attendance some time.

On Kauai, proceedings have begun to have the doctor placed under guardianship. This was before the New York episode. He was engaged to be married here, but the engagement was called off, as stated in The Star two days ago. Knudsen's friends fear that he has become insane.

REVOLUTION IN COALING VESSELS

L. MARKS LEFT FOR MAINLAND TODAY FOR PURPOSE OF TRYING TO SECURE PATENT.

Louis Marks departed today by the S. S. Mongolia to be absent about seven weeks on the mainland. He is going for the purpose of trying to secure a patent on a new mechanical contrivance for handling coal rapidly on vessels. His apparatus will put coal into a ship at the rate of 100 tons an hour and is said by those who have had the details of the mechanism explained to them, to be a very ingenious thing. Should Marks secure his patent it will prove of the utmost benefit to the steamship people, especially as the coaling which now requires a large force of men, can be done with a limited number of stedevoers and in much faster time.

TROOPS FOR HONOLULU

SAN FRANCISCO, October 16.—The War Department has issued the following orders for troops to sail on the transport Logan December 5th to take station at Honolulu. Companies I and K, Tenth Infantry are to go to Honolulu. They will be relieved from duty at the Portland (Or) Exposition in November and proceed at once to San Francisco to remain in camp until the sailing of the transport.

INTER-ISLAND CLAIMS \$20,000

AS ITS SHARE IN PULLING THE FRENCH SHIP ERNEST REYER OFF DIAMOND HEAD REEF.

The Inter-Island Steam Navigation Company has at last put in a claim for salvage against the French ship Ernest Reyer. The company has named \$20,000 as the amount of money that the services of the steamers Like-like and Nilhau are worth for assisting in pulling the ship off the Diamond Head reef. The company has had the matter of the amount of salvage under consideration for some days and it was only yesterday that a final decision in the matter was reached.

J. A. Kennedy the president and general manager of the company was asked this morning regarding the report and stated that he had nothing to say for publication on the subject. "The matter is in the hands of the attorneys of the company," he said "and they are now looking after our interests."

The sum named by the Inter-Island is the same as that claimed by the tug Fearless. It is probable that there will have to be some tall old dickering before the claims are finally adjusted.

The local agents and the captain of the French ship are not disposed to pay any large claims for salvage. It is understood that they claim that the vessel was in no imminent danger at the time she was on the reef.
